NISEI TROOP TO LEAD V-J DAY PARADE IN ITALY TO BEGIN SEPTEMBER 13

LEICHRN--Some 3,000 Nisei troops, bearing their historic battle flag with its three Presidential unit citation streamers and a single white combat streamer, were designated today by Gen. Francis H. Oxx, area commander, to lead the V-J Day parade here. Altogether 15,000 GI's will be in line.

The Nisei troops will be in the van in this victory march as they were when they spearheaded the attacks that opened the Vosges Mountain doorway to Strasbourg last October and when they snatched the Thirty-sixth Infantry Division's lost battalion of Texans from the encircling Germans. These two actions, incidentally, cost them 2,300 casualties in three weeks.

Col. V.R. Miller of Winneconne, Wis., who commands the Nisei will lead them in the march.

FEDERAL HOUSING UNITS OFFERED IN S.F. TO FAMILIES OF NISEI G.I.'S

One hundred low-cost housing units in San Francisco have been made available to families of Nisei soldiers provided the families take occupancy between September 3 and 6, Project Director L.T. Hoffman announced today.

Ten 3-bedroom apartments renting for \$38 per month, 50 two-bedroom apartments at \$35, 25 one-bedroom apartments at \$32.50 and 15 apartments without bedrooms at \$27.50 have been set aside on this basis by the regional director of the Federal Public Housing Authority

The first group movement which will include involuntary relocators back to the west coast is scheduled to leave here on September 13, announced Miss Leah Dickinson, relocation division chief. Such individuals and families who will leave on that day will be notified on August 28, two weeks prior to the departure date provided temporary housing is available by that time.

TIMES TO END PUBLICATION

With the August 31 issue, the Topaz Times will suspend publication. However, the Relocation News will still continue to disseminate center news.

Relocation of staff members and shortage of workers has made it impossible to continue the Times.

PUBLIC LIBRARY TO CLOSE AUGUST 31

The public library located in the Science building will close on August 31.

All those who have books out are requested to return them before that date.

Special coaches are being scheduled to leave for San Francisco on every Thursday of September and October to relocate approximately 300 to 400 persons each week.

Special coaches are also scheduled to leave for Chicago every Tuesday beginning September 4.

A quota of approximately 500 terminal departures a week for the last six weeks will have to be met in order to insure closing of the center by November 1. Where quotas are not met the balance will be filled with involuntary relocators. However, it is believed that the quotas in September will be largely met by voluntary relocators.

Involuntary relocatees were again assured that they will not be sent into districts where at least temporary housing is not available.

IKEDA, TABATA REPORT PLEASANT TRIP TO COAST

Two well-known Topazans who were aboard the special train to San Francisco last week already have reported on the trip.

Kihoh Ikeda, former legal aide to the Project Attorney and now a special relocation officer in San Francisco, wrote Project Director L.T. Hoffman:

"We had a very nice trip all the way. We arrived at Sacramento at 9:15 PM where we were received by WRA officials and the returned leaders. We arrived at the destination at 1:15 AM. All of the returnees to San Mateo district were transferred to the hostel....."

"Mr. Nobuo Tabata former assistant Community Analyst, wrote the Reports Office:

"After a slow trip taking 40 hours we came home to San Mateo. It was a great and glorious feeling and everybody in town is nice and courteous. This should dispel those Topaz rumors that the evacuees have a tough time."

BUDDHIST HOSTEL OPENS IN LODI

LODI--A hostel has just been opened in the Buddhist Temple at 23 North Stockton street in Lodi, California, with Naotaro Horimoto in charge.

Fifty people can be accommodated. At present no meals are being served and evacuees are asked to furnish their own linen. Preference will be given to former residents of Lodi and Acampo, but it is expected that some space will be available for others. The charge will be 50 cents per night.

FORMER TIMES BOSS PROMOTED

Russell Bankson, former Topaz reports officer, has succeeded Frank C. Cross as head of the WRA's publication division.

Bankson was promoted to the Washington reports office last September.

WRA CRITICIZED

CHICAGO--The American Council on Race Relations this week severely criticized the War Relocation Authority, the principal government agency responsible for the relocation of Japanese American citizens who were evacuated from their West Coast homes following the Pearl Harbor attack, for its insistence upon "carrying out its own liquidation program." The criticism was continued in the August issue of the Council's monthly News Letter.

Claiming that "WRA seems fully convinced that its record depends primarily upon the closing of all relocation centers by the end of the year," the American Council News Letter pointed out that "The government, which assumed full responsibility for moving them (Japanese evacuees) out of their homes should assume equal responsibility for facilitating their return."

The American Council also voiced the belief that in the event the WRA liquidation program is carried out by December 31, the Japanese relocation problem will be increased because of a lack of housing and employment opportunities for the relocatees.

"Five hundred housing units in the Bay area on the West Coast, which were supposed to be available to returning evacuees, have not materialized," the American Council News Letter declared, "and there are still a number of employment opportunities closed to the Nisei despite the fact that Japanese in the Hawaiian Islands have been permitted employment on similar jobs."

"It is also true," the News Letter continued, "that although various governmental agencies have strengthened their stand in behalf of the return of loyal Japanese to the West Coast, so civic action by such agencies must be immeasurably fortified of all Japanese who wish to return are to do so peaceably and equitably by the end of the year."

A number of non-governmental agencies that have cooperated with the WRA in its relocation program thus far are said by the American Council to be in agreement that WRA is being too hasty in its attempt to close by the end of the year. Among the agencies named in this connection are the Committee on American Principles and Fair Play and the Federal Council of Churches.

The News Letter also claimed that there are some "private groups on the West Coast" that are alarmed over WRA's decision to liquidate by December 31 and which are now attempting to work out "some uniform alternative agreements and recommendations to be made to WRA and the Interior Department."

"Either cooperating agencies must greatly intensify their support of the WRA program immediately or an alternative program must be agreed upon," the News Letter declared.

50,000 JOB OPENINGS IN BAY AREA ANNOUNCED

MORE ABOUT NISEI SOLDIERS IN ITALY

Fifty thousand jobs are "going begging" in the San Francisco Bay area, Irene Webb, of the San Francisco WRA Reports office said today. The figure was supplied WRA by the United States Employment office there. Railroad workers, longshoremen, harvest hands and cannery workers are most in demand.

Simultaneously with General Oxx's announcement came a petition from all men in D Company of the 168th Infantry Regiment, a white regiment stationed here, promising that unit's full aid to the Nisei boys during the readjustment problems back in the State.

The Oakland Tribune reported that most shipyards in the San Francisco and Oakland area don't expect to lay off great numbers of employees for several months because of repair work. A Maritime Commission spokesman said that a maximum displacement of no more than 25,000 workers is expected by October. Alameda's more than 15,000 shipyard and army-navy civilian workers were promised employment at least for the next few months. Henry Kaiser dropped 3,000 of his 29,000 workers at Richmond.

EXCLUDEE POLICY TO BE REVEALED

War and Justice departments are not expected to make policy statements until after Japan's formal surrender which is scheduled for August 31, announced Director L.T. Hoffman. As of August 23, Topaz excludees totaled 89 and detainees 17, he added.

MESS HALLS 3, 23 TO CLOSE SEPT. 2

Dining halls 3 and 28 will close after the evening meal on Sunday, September 2, announced Project Director Hoffman.

Block 3 residents will dine at DH 10, and block 28 residents will be served at DH 27.

HOSTEL RESERVATIONS

All hostel reservations should be made through the relocation division intake office at 2-9-C. This includes the Buddhist hostel in San Francisco.

It was learned today that before the Japanese surrendered in the Pacific 172 Japanese-American boys in the Nisei regiment had asked for combat duty against Japan. It also came out that their casualties totaled 9,230, or three times their original battle strength, and that the only AWOL's against their record were six. These six were men who escaped from hospitals without leave to return to combat.

It was also disclosed today for the first time that the original shoulder patch designed for the Nisei troops was a yellow hand clutching a yellow dagger. The Nisei rejected this unanimously and received instead a white arm upholding the white torch of liberty.

MYER ANSWERS PETITION

The All Center headquarters received the following letter from National Director Dillon S. Myer in answer to their petition opposing the closing of the centers.

"I am glad to have your letter of July 23 and to learn that the all-center conferees will continue cooperating in the relocation program. I cannot, however, concur in your major recommendation that the centers be maintained beyond the present closing dates.

"Your letter, of course, is based on the premise that there a humber of people in centers who are "incapable of relocating." This is a premise with which I most strongly disagree. Over the past nine months we have steadily improved the types of services and assistance which our field offices are equipped to render for relocating families and individuals. We have already helped people with almost every conceivable type of problem in making a successful adjustment back to private life. I have no doubt whatever that we can continue doing this for everyone remaining in the centers.

"I have said it before, but I want to repeat that the problems of relocation cannot be met by remaining in the centers, living over past grievances, and conjuring up reasons why relocation is "impossible." These problems can only be met by going out, facing them, and working with the WRA field offices toward a feasible solution. None of the evacuees enjoyed absolute security before evacuation, and we are not of course in position to guarantee absolute security for everyone leaving the centers now; very few people in this country or anywhere else are fortunate enough to have such a guarantee. But we can and will

help people through the admittedly difficult transition period between the time when they leave the centers and the time when they resume life in normal communities once again.

"By the time you receive this, the WRA plan for scheduling relocation on a quota basis during the last several weeks before each center's closing will doubtless have been announced. Under this plan there will of course be no "residue" at any center on the closing date. All center residents will have left by that time.

"I want to emphasize that this plan was adopted only after long and, I think, extremely patient efforts by WRA to keep the relocation program on an entirely voluntarily basis. We have given center residents ample warning that the centers were going to close before the end of the year. We have allowed many months in which to make relocation plans and complete necessary arrangements. Yet many of the residents--because of bad advice, wishful thinking, or both--have persisted in holding back and refusing to take advantage of our facilities and services. The quota plan was adopted not in any sense as a punishment for such people but as a practical device for achieving a comparatively even flow of movement during the weeks that remain before the final closing of all centers. Under the plan residents will of course be given the greatest possible freedom of choice in the selection both of relocation destinations and of departure dates.

"I fully agree that there must be mutual understanding and cooperation between the center residents and WRA, and want to assure you that we shall continue our operations in that spirit until the last resident is relocated."
