: CHICAGO The American Council on Race Relations this week severely criticized the War Relocation Authority, the principal government agency responsible for the relocation of Japanese American citizens who were evacuated from their West Coast homes following the Pearl Harbor attack, for its insistence upon "carrying out its own liquidation program," The criticism was continued in the August issue of the Council's monthly News Letter.

Claiming that "WRA seems fully convinced that its record depends primarily upon the closing of all relocation centers by the end of the year," the American Council News Letter pointed out that "The government, which assumed full responsibility for moving them (Japanese evacuees) out of their homes should assume equal responsibility for facilitating their return.":

The American Council also voiced the belief that in the event the WRA liquidation program is carried out by December 31, the Japanese relocation problem will be increased because of a lack of housing and employ-

ment opportunities for the relocatees.

"Five hundred housing units in the Bay area on the West Coast, which were supposed to be available to returning evacuers, have not materialized," the American Council News Letter declared, "and there are still a number of employment opportunities closed to the Nisei despite the fact that Japanese in the Hawmians been opened in the Bid-Islands have been permitted amployment on similar dhist Temple at 23 North jobs."

"It is also true," the News Letter continued, "that although various governmental agencies have strengthen- Horimoto in charge. ed their stand in behalf of the return of loyal Japanese to the West Coast, so cific action by such agencies must be immeasurably fortified of all Japanese who wish to return are to do so penceably and equit-

ably by the end of the year."

A number of non-governmental agencies that have cooperated with the WRA in its relocation program thus far are said by the American Council to be in agreement that WRA is being too hosty in its attempt to close by the end of the year, Among the agencies named in this connection are the Committee on American Principles and Fair Play and the Federal Council of Churches of bethouseld 4.4 " arosnsp'sar

The News Letter also claimed that there are some "private groups on the West Coast" that are alarmed over WRAIs decision to liquidate by December 31 and which are now attempting to work out "some uniform al-ternative agreements and recommendations to be made to MRA and the Interior Department."

"Rither accounting agencies must greatly intensify their support of the WRA program immediately or an al-ternative program must be agreed upon," the News Let-ter declared.

"I am glad to have your letter of July 23 and to learn that the all-center conferees will continue cooperating in the relocation program. I cannot, however, concur in your major recommendation that the centers be maintained beyoud the present closing dates.

"Your letter, of course, is base? on the premise that there a humber of people in centers who are "incapable of relocating." This is a premise with which I most strongly disagree. Over the past' nine months we have steadily improved the types of services and assistance which our field offices are equipped to render for relocating families and individuals. We have already halped people with almost every conseivable type of problem in making a successful adjustment back to private .life. I have no doubt whatever that we can continue dothis for everyone remaining in the centers.

"I have said it before, but I want to repeat that the problems of relocation cannot be met by remaining in the conters, living over past grievances, and conjuring up reasons why relocation is "impossible." These problems can only "impossible. be met by going out, facing them, and working with the WRA field offices to ward a feasible solution, None of the evacue os enjoyed absolute security before evacuation, and we are not of course in position to guarantee absolute socurity tual understanding and cooperation befor everyone leaving the centers now; tween the center residents and WRA, and very few people in this country or any want to assure you that we shall continwhere else are fortunate enough to myo uc our operations in that spirit until auch a guarantoe. But we can and will, the last resident is relocated."

"By the time you receive this, the WRA plan for scheduling relocation on a muota basis during the last weeks before each center's closing will Under doubtless have been announced, this man there will of course be "residue" at any center on the closing date. All center residents will have left by that time. will have.

"I want to emphasize that this plan was adopted only after long and, I think, extremely patient efforts by WRA to keep the relocation program on an entirely voluntarily basis. We have given center residents ample warning that the centers were going to close before the end of the year. We have allowed many months in which to make relocation plans and complete necessary arrangements. Yet many of the residents -- because of bad advice, wishful thinking, or both-chave persisted in holding back and refusing to take advantage of our facilities and services. The quota plan was adopted not in any sense as a punishment for such people but as a practical device for scheiving a comparatively even flow of . movement during the weeks that remain before the final closing of all centers. Under the plan residents will of course be given the greatest possible fre dom of choice in the selection both of relocation destinations and of departure dates.
