Though he noted the tenseness school. of military conditions in Japan, he did not anticipate open conflict with America, declared Dr. J.L. McSparran, principal medical

officer of the WRA in San Francisco, in an interview Thursday. In Topaz for a 3-day observation tour from Wednesday to Friday last week, Dr. McSparran spoke from a background of 25 years in Japan from 1917 to 1942, a period embracing the two eras of global conflicts.
