EMPLOYMENT

OFFERED TO

ALL RESIDENTS

In a statement explaining some of the placement procedures, Claude C. Cornwall, chief of the Employment Division, declared that the Placement Office is issuing assignments to all persons known to be unemployed in order to get maximum employment among the residents of the City.

It was pointed out that under the WRA, employed residents at times receive double or triple the amount of the wages they receive in clothing allowances for their families. This is denied to non-workers.

Moreover, if the oldest child of an evacuee family were employed and the father, if employable, is not, then the child would draw his individual clothing allowance but the rest of the family would not. If the family head and the child were both working, then the entire family would be entitled to receive clothing allowances in addition to its income from work wages.

The news item stated: "Recent Washington High School graduates will be interested to learn that the address of Daniel C. Ota, popular American-born Japanese who was editor of the school paper when war broke out, is 2311F Poplar Street, Topaz, Utah. In a Christmas letter to his friends, he writes:

"In this lonely community of tar-papered barracks, desert echoes and black-haired inhabitants, warm thoughts fill the minds of many an evacuee as Christmas approaches. . . the excitement of pre-holiday preparations, shopping in our beloved City of St. Francis along Market Street with its bright store lights, flower vendors, rumbling street cars, and that race of human beings who come out and crowd the rain-washed sidewalks after the 5 o'clock whistle.

"I miss those things deeply; and yet as I think of those times of peace, joy and contentment, I feel sincerely confident that there will come the day when all of us shall once again be able to walk the streets, seeking new life in a truly emancipated world.

"We shall see then that sores are healed, old comradeships renewed and new friendships made and sealed with the everlasting bonds of democracy, kindness and true understanding."
