GLASSES AVAILABLE AT LOW COST

Residents who desire to purchase eye glasses or to bear the expense of repairing broken glasses may order through the hospital eye clinic and pay at the Consumer Co-operative Enterprises office at cost, which is comprised of the wholesale value of the glasses, postage and handling expense.

FILE NON-WORK BACK CLAIMS BY JAN. 31

All back claims for unemployment compensation must be filed by Jan. 31, 1943, according to Claude C. Cornwall, chief of the Employment division.

On Feb. 1 the Placement office will re-survey all active claims and place everything on a current basis. Persons able to work who are now drawing unemployment compensation will be paid benefits for unemployment during February, and only so long thereafter as the Placement office is unable to find work for them.

Residents drawing unemployment compensation are requested to come to the Placement office at Rec 4 for complete details.

DR. CARLISLE DEFENDS NISEI LOYALTY

(Editor's note: The following article appeared in the Salt Lake Deseret News, Jan. 14.)

LOGAN, Jan. 13--Of the 8500 Japanese residents of Topaz relocation center near Delta, two-thirds of them are native-born U.S. citizens, one-half of them are Christians and 90% of those who are citizens are loyal to this nation and enemies of Japanese military policy, asserted Dr. John C. Carlisle, assistant professor of education at Utah State Agricultural College, as he addressed members of Logan Lions Club this week.

Introduced by N. J. Crockston, chairman of the club program committee, Dr. Carlisle said: "These people are concerned about what will happen to family life for them under existing conditions. Most of them who are native-born citizens of this nation realize that there is no future for them if Japan wins the war, and would like to fight actively Japanese military aggression."

He spent 3 months at Topaz as educational system organizer for the camp, but is now back at the college as assistant to the president and professor in education.
