IMMUNIZATION CLINIC TO BE HELD THIS WEEK

Immunization clinic will be held at the hospital clinic on Thursday, February 4, from 10 AM to noon and at Dining Hall 32 on Saturday, February 6 from 2 to 4 PM, the Public Health department announced this week.

Smallpox vaccination will be given all children 7 months of age and older; diphtheria, 9 months to 12 years; and pertussis, 7 months to 3 years.

All those in Blocks 2 to 21 inclusive are requested to go to the hospital clinic on Thursday, and the rest to Dining Hall 32. Those unable to attend the Thursday clinic may go to the one on Saturday.

School children 6 to 12 years who need diphtheria shots may go to the Saturday clinic.

Notices will be sent to those needing immunization but if any persons are emitted, they should report to either of the clinics.
