

GET REPLIES FROM WAR DEPT. TO 3 QUESTIONS

Replies from the War Department were received yesterday to satisfy the following 3 questions regarding Army enlistment by Japanese American citizens:

(1) Will our candidates be sent to the regular Officers' Candidate Schools, or will they train separately?

A. They will go in the same way, and be given the same training as any other candidate.

(2) What will happen to those who volunteer for service but are turned down for physical reasons? Will they be returned to the relocation centers?

A. If the loyalty check shows that they have the interest of the United States at heart, they will be given the chance to work in the defense plants. The government cannot promise to find work for you. In some of the plants there is still prejudice against employing Americans of Japanese blood. But skilled workers are needed and the news of the formation of a combat team from among your number will do much to counteract the prejudice already referred to.

(3) How about Japanese Americans outside the relocation centers?

A. They can volunteer in just the same manner.

800 ATTEND MASS MEETING

Over 800 kibel of this City held a mass meeting last night in Dining Hall 34 to hold a public discussion on the registration as it affected them.

Before the floor was thrown open to general discussion, Lieut. William L. Tracy, captain of the War Department team, answered questions raised by those in attendance.

MASS REGISTRATION SCHEDULE PREPARED

With the receipt today of sufficient supplies of "Application for Leave Clearance" forms, final arrangements for the registration of all persons, male and female, regardless of citizenship who have attained the age of 17 years were completed.

The chief purpose of this mass registration is to speed up the clearance system, and it is hoped that, with cooperation all along the line, both here at Topaz and in the various agencies of Washington, D.C., by the end of May, every application will have been acted upon.

The registration will go forward by blocks, and it is expected, for the present, that a whole morning or a whole afternoon will be given over to each block.

The registration will be held in the dining hall of Block No. 1, beginning at 9 AM, Saturday, Feb. 13. Because Block 8 is close and has a smaller population than most blocks, it was selected to lead off

to give interviewers a little time to gain experience that first morning.

As answered by Lt. Tracy, the registration for military service for all male citizens 17 years of age and over will be held at the same time, block by block, as the registration of other residents.

Although the registration is compulsory for all residents except those who have requested repatriation, it should be clearly understood that no one will be forced to relocate should they not want to be relocated.

The following schedule of blocks and dates will give all persons a chance to arrange in advance for their registration.

DISTRIBUTION OF OCTOBER CLOTHES ALLOWANCE BEGUN

October clothing allowances for persons with names beginning with "A" through "G" are now ready for distribution, it was announced today by Adrian H. Altwater, head of the clothing section.

Reference slips are being distributed by the Community Welfare field workers and checks may be claimed at the pay station, 4-12-B.

October allowances for those whose names begin with "H" through "Y" will be ready shortly.

Deductions for surplus clothing issued at the warehouse and not returned have been made from the October allowances. A statement for each person whose allowance exceeded the deduction is on the back of the referral slip. A statement will also be sent to those whose deductions exceeded the allowance. Any balance will be deducted from the November allowance.

BEAN SPROUTS

Bean sprouts are being raised in Topaz! However, with only 200 lbs. now available weekly, all kitchens haven't got their share as yet. The present supply is being distributed in sequence among all the dining halls, according to Brandon Watson, chief project steward.

Under the supervision of Roscoe E. Bell, chief of the Agricultural division, the quantity being raised will soon be enough to supply all the kitchens each week.

INSTRUCTIONS RELEASED ON INTERNEE MAIL

The following instructions have been issued by the office of the Provost Marshal General in Washington regarding procedure for expediting censorship of letters addressed to persons in internment camps in this country:

All letters should be forwarded to New York before being sent to an internment camp. A postage stamp is not required. The name and return address of the sender should be put in the upper left hand corner of the envelope, and the term "Prisoner of War Mail--Free" in the upper right hand part. The name and serial number of the internee, the name of his camp (but not the location of his camp) and "Box 20, General Post Office, New York, N. Y." should be put in the center and lower half of the envelope.

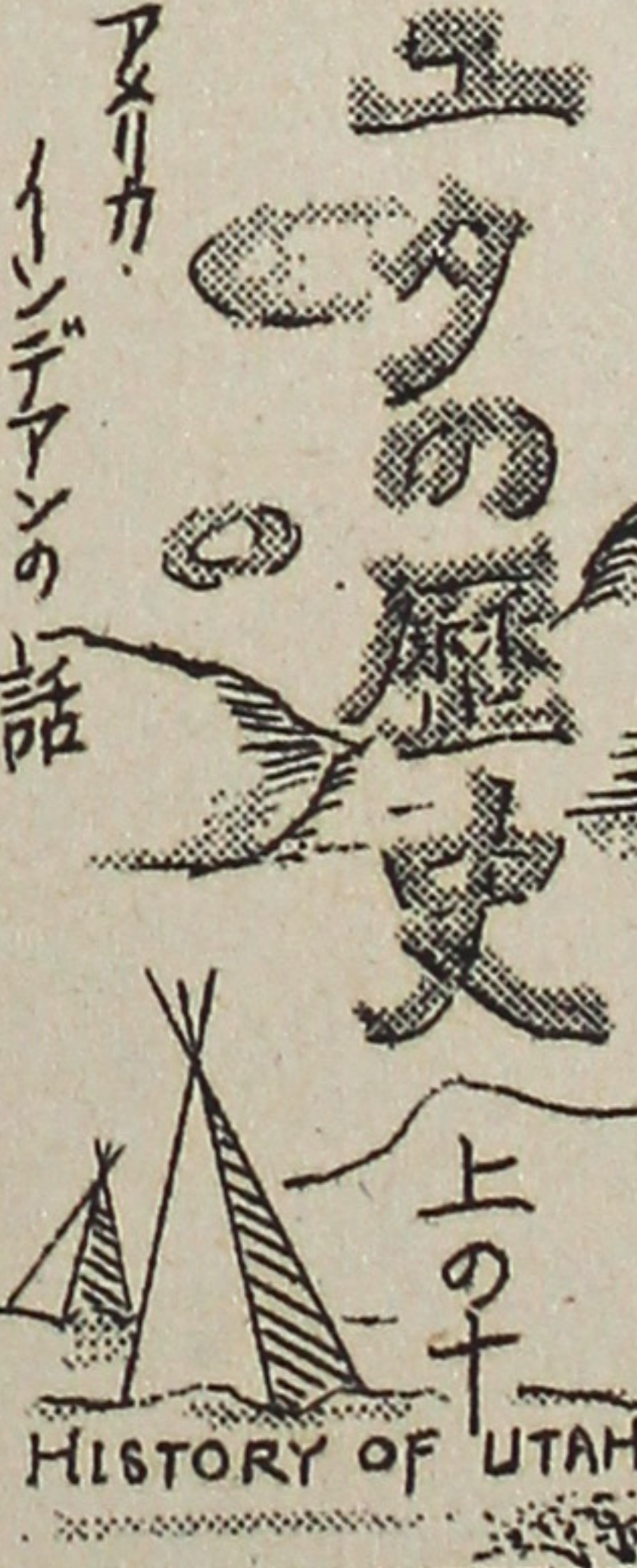
