AGRICULTURE IS SUCCESSFUL

VISUAL EDUCATION

Starting Sunday evening at 9 p.m., the visual education section of the CA will show a group of three films.

The titles of the films are "The Northeastern States", "Hot Ice" and "This Is New England."

Case Lauds Progress of Farm; Production for '44 Optimistic

"The general picture of the farming program has improved tremendously," commented William M. Case, principal of agriculture of the WRA in Washington, D. C. who was in the center to look over the Rohwer farms Wednesday and Thursday.

"On this trip, I am principally interested in seeing how the irrigation system is working out here and just what sort of expansion is necessary to properly take care of the hog production situation.

"Since my last visit in May, Rohwer has begun a hog farm, improved its irrigation program and started a cannery--the progress on the whole is very good."

Case felt that the WRA's agricultural program did not fully attain the goals that had been set by the headquarters early this year but he pointed out that seven of the ten centers encountered obstacles that interfered with the schedules. Learning the new land, lack of sufficient equipment, construction of proper farm buildings and reclamation of forest and desert lands were the leading deterrent factors.

He believed that the 1944 production would reach the goal set by the WRA. However, he pointed out that this increase will

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CLOTHING CHECKS CHANGED

Clothing allowance checks for the month of June are now being distributed through the mails. The checks are printed on regular size cards in the usual form.

Since these cards will be filed later through the use of electrical machines, the recipients should avoid

folding or creasing the checks. Any handling that would alter its size, thickness or form will handicap efficient filing of the cards.

The co-op will not cash any folded government checks since the bank will not accept the creased cards.

CO-OP STORES WILL SELL ONLY ON COUPON BASIS

Three resolutions were adopted by both the Congress of Delegates and the Board of Directors at their meetings according to Tomio Tomishige of the Rohwer Cooperative Enterprises.

Beginning next Monday, September 20, all Co-op stores and service departments will enforce the following rules:

(1). All purchases must be paid in coupons. No cash will be accepted except for sales to WRA officials, payments on newspaper subscriptions and purchases of wool yarns and oriental art good sold at the mail order department.

(2). Detached coupons will not be sold by the Co-op.

(3). Parents are requested not give school children dimes or quarters. They should give the children the coupon books or detached coupons if unavoidable.

The regulations are effective at all the theatres as well as the stores. A change in bank rules makes it necessary to charge five

cents for cashing checks drawn against the McGehee Bank. Members of the administrative personnel will be affected by this latest bank rule.

Coupon books may be purchased at any of the following locations: the canteen, shoe repair shop, dry goods store, mail order

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MYER ISSUES INSTRUCTION FOR CARE OF EQUIPMENT

With an acute shortage of typewriters throughout the nation making it unlikely that the WRA will get new machines for the duration, the importance of giving the present typewriters good care was emphasized by WRA Director Dillon Myer.

Some of the necessary rules for typewriters' conservation were cited.

(1). Dust and eraser grit, the typewriter's greatest enemies, should be removed every morning with soft cloth.

(2). Erasures should be made with the carriage away from the center of the machine while grit should be brushed away to the side. Also remove dust on the desk surface underneath the machine.

(3). At night: Release tension on rolls. Clean type with stiff dry brush to remove ink which hardens during night. Liquid cleaner should not be used. Cover the machine.

(4). Use oil sparingly, using one drop on each

HOUSING MOVEMENTS FROZEN UNTIL FUMIGATION FINISHED

The vacancies left in the blocks due to the departure of the Tule Lake people on September 14 will be fumigated by the Public Works division as soon as the necessary materials arrive. For this reason, L. A. Stearns, housing counselor, announced today that all moves are frozen until further notice.

Residents who moved after September 14 to new loca-

tions without following the routine procedures but whose moves were consistent with the new housing standards shall remain in the new apartments.

However, these moves must be registered with the block manager and the Housing unit. Weekly reports are now being made by the block managers to the Housing unit on all moves in or out of their blocks.

(Continued from Page 1) carriage rail once a week. Other oiling should be left to the repairman.

(5) Clean platen (roll) once a week, using soft cloth and cleaning fluid. Oil should not get on platen roll.

Similar care should be

taken with other equipment to insure the WRA of minimum facilities for carrying out its program. Cameras, calculating machines, staplers and other office equipment as well as automotive and heavy machinery should be used with the idea of conservation.

LAND RECLAMATION DONE BY CENTER

(Continued from Page 1) be necessary in order to provide the people with sufficient food, especially since it is becoming more and more difficult to obtain supplies from external sources. Surplus food grown in one center will be shipped to others where production is low.

Rehner, Jerome, Hoart Mountain, Minidoka, Topaz, Poston and also Manzanar are the centers which are carrying on either major or minor land reclamation activities, while Gila, Tule Lake and Granada are

fortunate enough to have good irrigated farm lands. Gila has 7000 acres of arable land; Tule Lake farms approximately 4500 acres of which 550 acres are in potatoes (anticipated crop will be well over 125,000 sacks); and Granada has 5000 acres under cultivation.

As far as canneries are concerned, this center is the best equipped. By next year, a good cannery will be constructed for the Granada center. Those in the other centers are not provided with large facilities.

The northern centers will not have any canning plants because their growing season is too short.

"Our first year was an experiment, especially for the Arkansas centers," concluded Case, "but that experiment was a big success. I am pleased with the appearance of the farms, the plans and preparations made for next year and the fine work that has been done by the Agriculture division here from the administrative personnel down to the evacuee field workers."

EDITORIAL RELOCATE WISELY

"Two young men who left your center in May to work with the Marborn Corporation in Gary, Indiana have left Marborn to attend an optical equipment school in Brooklyn, New York. From now on it will be hard to convince Marborn Corporation and other Gary employers to hire American Japanese.

"We have encountered a growing feeling of disgust on the part of employers toward nisei who quit war plant jobs to go to school. The employer feels and we are inclined to agree with him that since all physically fit Caucasian boys are either in the armed services or in essential war industries, and are not able to leave either place to read school books, that American Japanese boys should do their part toward aiding the war effort and place second their appetite for personal erudition.

"We realize, of course, that nisei have not the same draft status as Caucasian boys. However, the public sees only that they do not choose to volunteer their services and seem unwilling to serve in industry.

"The unfolding practice of nisei to leave a job after just a few weeks' work will do the WRA no good. We go to considerable trouble to make placement possible and the employer encounters certain difficulties in training the worker. If the worker departs with haste soon after learning how to perform his job properly, the employer will be not a little antagonistic to all evacuees."

So wrote Elmer L. Shirrel, relocation supervisor for the Chicago area to one of the other projects recently. Shirrel's letter bears out the predictions and warnings issued by various individual and center newspapers concerning the inadvisability of evacuees relocating to various parts of the country without definite plans of sticking to their jobs.

There are too many nisei leaving the center without realizing just how decisive a step they are taking. There are too many who fail to understand the responsibilities that they assume once they have re-entered the life of normalcy on the outside.

Those who are contemplating relocation should bear in mind that their responsibilities include not only the earning of their own livelihood and the preparing for the time when they could provide shelter and food for their families still remaining in the centers, but also the added burden of acting as emissaries for those who are to follow later. The actions and behaviors of a few may decide the question of whether the nisei as a whole will be accepted by the communities where they may go.

Even worse, the development of unfavorable public sentiment against the nisei may result in violences similar to the so-called 'race' riots of some months ago. Be sure that you, when you leave the center, have a definite job picked--a job that you are sure of sticking to. Otherwise, the chances are you will be called a 'two-week Jap!'

HELPING GIFT: STUDENT AID

Addressed in the care of the OUTPOST a contribution of \$2 was made to the newly-organized Student Aid committee in a letter from Miss Ovona Larson of Stockton, California.

SCOUT TO AID CENTER TROOPS

Boy Scout activities at all relocation centers received further impetus last week when it was announced by WRA headquarters in Washington that a formal agreement has been signed by WRA and National Boy Scout headquarters in New York.

The new agreement, which is a revision of a previous statement issued on June 15, 1942, extends the same rights and privileges to Scouts and Cubs at the centers as are given to troops in other cities. Scout programs at the centers may include camping, victory gardens, camporees, plays and other popular scouting activities.

One of the most important provisions of the agreement is one which will permit scouts whose families are preparing to relocate in the near future to transfer to troops in other communities, as well as in other relocation centers. Scouts or leaders planning to move should secure transfers before leaving the center; transfers must be presented to the local Scout Council as soon as Scouts have moved to a new community.

In signing the declaration, Scout officials emphasized the importance of maintaining troops within the various centers and assured the WRA of full cooperation in furthering scouting programs.

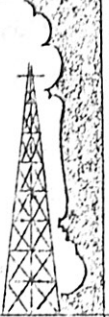
