Cut of 602 Workers Revealed

"Subject to approval by Washington, the Moss division will have a total of 1068 workers to take care of all the messes, the food and kitchen warehouses and the office work," revealed Project Staward L. A. May.

Project's 33 mess halls WRA PERSONNEL PASSES SET OUOTA ON THIRD WAR LOAN

In conjunction with the notion-wide Third War Loan drive being held throughout the nation, from September 9 to 30, a six-mun committoo is now in the midst of a compaign to raise its quota among the appointed personnel. The quota is 30% of the administrative membors' salaries.

Incomplete figures for the local campaign show that \$13,141.65 in maturity value of the bonds have been sold and paid . for to dute. Besides this, various members of the edministration have plodged for 36,180.19 in bonds which will be paid for at the end of the month.

EDITORIAL BRIGHTER FUTURE

On two successive days, The New York Times newspaper carried erticles which dealt with the Japanese Ameri-On September 13th, the segregation movement now in the process of completion was given due consideration together with a detailed report on the activities of the WRA's Evacues Property office. On September, 14th, President Roosevelt's letter to the Sunate setting he was sufficiently satisfied with the WRA's segregation program and encouraging the rapid relocation of the loyal Japaness Americans into the normal homes and jobs in communities throughout the United States was lengthily roportod.

prosentation of the ni-The impartial and factual soi and the WRA was in itself a significant change, revenling that the trend of nightmarish propagamu was lording affect and showing that American proces recognized the poculiar position of the Japanese Americans.

Of major importance also were the closing paragraphs of the Fresident's letter which expressed the following

"With the segregation of the disloyal evacuous in a separate center, the WMA proposes now to redouble its offorts to accomplish the relocation.....of those Americans of Japaneso ancestry whose loyalty to this country has remained unshaken through the hardships of the execuation which military necessity made unavoidablo. We shall restore to the loyal evacuees the right to return to the evacuated areas as soon as the militery situation will make such restoration feasible.

"Americans of Japanese ancestry, like those of many other ancestries, have shown that they can, and want to, accept our institutions and work loyally with the rost of us, making their orm valuable contribution to the national wealth and well being. In vindication of the very ideals for which we are fighting this war, it is important to us to maintain a high standard of fuir, considerate and equal trautment for the people of this minority as of all other minorities."

The President's acceptance of nisei loyalty and his promise of eventual raturn to the Pacific coast is now a welcome relief after months of harassing criticisms and pseudo-invostigations of both the WRA and the Japanese Americans. Coming at a time when the Dies committee's majority report is being publicly charged as being prejudiced by minority member Congressmen Herman P. Eberharter, the letter by Mr. Roosevelt may well serve to destroy false illusions, about the nisef and may even have a formative effect on the decisions made by many Americans who are not fully acquirted with the Japanese American or misei problems.

Furthermore, the above two factors and the news that Lieut. Cen. John L. DeWitt has been succeeded by Lieut. Gen. Deloa C. Emmono as the commanding general of the Western Defense command point to a prospective complete nation-wide acceptance of the misei in all phases of civilian as well as military circles, thus embodying the fruition of the very principles that the Japanese Americans have been asking for over since the tragedy of Poarl Harbor and the racist feelings of different anti-this and that groups grossed the way for the said

evacuation last April.
