## Ex-Tule Lake Residents Arrive in Rohwer; Other Groups May Come

Yesterday at 1 p.m. fifty-seven new residents became a part of the Rohwer center population, swelling the community resident to a total figure of 6703 inhabitants.

The latest additions were former Tule Lake people who were transferred to Jerome as a part of the segregation program. They were reassigned to this Arkansas center upon request in order that they may be near their relatives or friends.

## PO RELEASES AUGUST FIGURES

In the month of August, the local post office's stamp sale amounted to \$1,814.89, according to C. R. Bicker, superintendent of the relocation branch.

Money orders issued totaled \$23,079.58 at the cost of \$249.96 in fees. C.O.D. packages handled numbered 961.

Under the direction of the Social Welfare section, the incoming transfers were assigned to various scattered apartments throughout the center. They were located as close to their friends as possible, according to the welfare head, Miss Wilma Van Dusseldorp.

Present indications are that other such transfers may be forthcoming within the next month or so.

## MANAGERS DISCUSS PLAN FOR WOOD DISTRIBUTION

Tentative plans regarding the winter fuel problem was introduced at the block managers' meeting Monday and was formally approved by those present.

Eliminating the previous suggestion that last winter's wood belonging to various blocks be distributed equally among all blocks, the new plan calls for supplying the blocks in need of fuel with the firewood first. The pro-

posed move is also in accord with the Agriculture division.

The present acute shortage of lumber jacks is expected to be relieved when seasonal workers and those on short-term leaves return to the center. It was also indicated that women are now replacing some of the men on the farms and this would release more men for wood

## ROHWER'S PRIDE, MOTOR REPAIR

Finished just two weeks ago, the garage addition to Harry F. Naff's (assistant equipment maintenance supervisor) Motor Repair section now houses one of the most complete repair facilities to be found in the ten WRA projects.

The transfer of electric lathes and drill presses last week from Belle, Tennessee to Rohwer means that the shop is now equipped to handle major overhauls of all equipment on

the project, including tractors, farm machinery and motor vehicles. If a hydraulic press and a boring bar can be obtained, the center will have the most completely equipped facilities of any WRA motor maintenance section, added Naff.

## RELOCATION CENTERS HAVE IMPRESSIVE, LOW FIRE LOSS

Property losses resulting from relocation center fires during the quarter ending June 30, 1943 were far below the national average, according to a report issued by William E. Hoffman, head of the WRA Fire protection section in Washington.

Of the 63 reported fires during the 3-month period, damage estimated at only \$9080 were inflicted on the WRA buildings, contents and equipment. Of this total damage, \$8000 was due to a large fire at the Colorado River project.

"WRA has reduced fire losses for the quarter to less than 9½ cents per capita," Mr. Hoffman pointed out. "This record is most enviable when we realize that the national per capita loss for 1942 was approximately \$2.50. According to figures released by the National Fire Protection Association, property destroyed by fire last year amounted to over \$214,000,000 in value. Proper fire prevention measures and competent equipment and personnel at relocation centers have produced a record unsurpassed by any city of comparable size."

As of June 30, the relocation centers had a population of 96,000 and buildings valued at \$40,000,000. A city of comparable size, such as Allentown, Pennsylvania, with a population of approximately 96,000, experienced fire losses of \$22,595 during 1942, with per capita losses estimated at 54 cents. On the West Coast, Pasadena, California, with 81,800 residents, and noted as one of the nation's best fire prevention cities, suffered losses of about \$83,470; per capita loss being 88 cents.

The projects' records are impressive due to the fact that all buildings are temporary in structure and highly flammable. Besides this, the fire protection officials of the WRA has been handicapped by equipment and apparatus problems and more important, by the necessity of training evacuee firemen in the use of modern fire-fighting equipment and techniques.
