CO-OP RELEASES INFO ON CASH REFUNDS

EDITORIALS-"FEUDS" WOOD

The first sign of Arkansas winter is becoming evident throughout the project, judging from the number of colds being suffered by the residents. Taking last winter as a criteria for what may happen these coming icy days, the question of lumber jacking and proper wood distribution becomes a problem of primordial importance.

Nearly all of the people who have lived here during last December, January and February will recall with dread the months when icy fingers, sniffles and wood 'fouds' were descriptive of the conditions existing hero. A repetition of such a nature is again possible this winter if precautions are not taken.

We find that the departure of many of our young men caused a sharp drop in the number of possible lumberjacks. Although we have a number of older men working in the forests at the present time, a proportionate number of younger men will be needed to haul the logs from the reclamation areas to the individual blocks. The major problem thus becomes how can the needed labor be obtained in order that we may conserve during the next few weeks enough fuel to last through the days when trees can be cut only periodically.

The only logical solution that has, been introduced who also supplied the Dento date is that younger men who are engaged in work ver Post with a series of that can be handled by women or older men should transfer from their jobs and aid the center in building up

a supply of fuel for the winter.

Men between the ages of twenty and thirty five are former WRA official, means urgently needed for this work. Unless the needs are the removal of another filled, the coming winter will be another hypothetical black mark from the mud-'retreat from Moscow'. Once again, the center will have to depend on voluntary wood crews and again we will have month-long squabbles on which blocks should get their wood first. The winter in Rohwer will mean ill feelings, frozen fingers and work on Sundays.

WANIE FIREMEN

The National Fire Prevention week officially opens tomorrow and will continue until next Saturday. Plans for improving the fire prevention program here in Rohwer include the cleaning up of accumulated trash : from the north side of the project area. Other preventive measures will be taken to insure this WRA center as well as all others a guarantee that fire loss in property will again be well below the national average for the coming year.

Serving as a possible threat to the fine record that Rohwer has earned in this respect, the lowest fire loss per capita among any of the WRA projects, is the shortage of personnel in the Rohwer Fire department. Men who were trained for long hours in the tedious art of understanding modern fire-fighting techniques have left the center in sizable number through relocation and the present staff is being overworked to insure the center of adequate fire protection.

The Fire department is the backbone of preventive fire control. Upon this singular organization, the responsibility of checking the spread of fires that may play havoc on the inflammable WRA buildings is laid. The shortage of firemen must be filled on a compulsory block by block basis if voluntary recruits are not available.

Young men in the center should weigh in their minds whether they are more essential to their present jobs or as firemen and lumberjacks.
