## LUMBER: TULEANS WILL RECEIVE WOOD

Through the block managers, a survey for lumber requirements for immediate furniture needs of the newly arrived Tuleans is now being made, according to Tom Makino, center architect.

Distribution of lumber, which will include only essential necessities such as a table and few benches, will probably be made sometime next week. Those who have not yet seen their block managers are requested to do so as soon as possible.

## SECOND DEPARTURE

### Rohwer Transfers 375 Segregees; Completes Scheduled Movements

The second contingent of Segregees will leave tomorrow afternoon for the Tule Lake Project, with Assistant Project Director James R. Rains going in liaison capacity.

Car monitors and car captains have been selected and they will have the responsibility of seeing that the group is transferred from their blocks to the boarding point and properly seated.

A schedule for baggage and freight pick-ups, similar to the ones used for the first departure is being carried through and by the noon, today, only a few more truck loads of luggage will be left in the blocks to be taken to the warehouse.

## HOLIDAY FOR LOCAL SCHOOLS

Rohwer schools will be closed tomorrow afternoon if the second movement to Tule Lake is carried out according to schedule, reported J. A. Trice, superintendent.

School pupils will be given a half-day holiday tomorrow afternoon in order that they may see off their friends leaving for Tule Lake.

## Resettlement on Farms

The people who relocate on farms from the centers will be following a wise course. In the first place, they will be producing food which is one of the basic needs of all people in the world now; a need which will continue after the fighting ceases. They will also be in a favorable position when soldiers return from the army and workers are dismissed from munition plants. When this happens, there will naturally be a scramble for all of the good positions in offices and in industry. The tendency will be to favor the ex-soldiers who are of Caucasian stock. This may not be right, but it will be too prevalent.

There will not be this same rivalry for farm opportunities. Anyone who is managing well a farm can keep doing that. If the returned soldiers seek similar opportunities, they should have no difficulty, for farms are plentiful.

These people, unlike many out in the Pacific Coast, have not been prejudiced by any preconceived misconceptions of the nisei, and they are ready to accept any relocated people with open minds and for what the people are....

"A vast majority of the people are of German and Russian descent. They experienced similar situations as ours during the last war and are very sympathetic to nisei. What we have experienced is, we

feel, typical of hundreds of other communities throughout the Middle West.

"And so, to those desiring to be relocated, by all means do so," wrote seven students attending the Dakota Wesleyan University at Mitchell, South Dakota, in recommending resettlement into the Midwestern area.

To give further assurance of such public sentiment and to acquaint the residents with the wide scope of opportunities existing in Iowa, Missouri,

Kansas, eastern Nebraska and eastern South Dakota, Relocation Supervisor Vernon R. Kennedy and Relocation Officers Walter N. Parmeter and Simmons will visit the center Friday and Saturday to interview interested individuals and to show movies about the area. They will be accompanied by H. S. Miller of the Ball Bros. Glass company.

In a preliminary visit to Rohwer Monday, Parmeter indicated that he could easily place 75 families (Continued to Page 3.)

# PRENATAL, CHILD HEALTH CLINICS' SCHEDULE GIVEN

To safeguard further the health of Center residents, two new clinics will open soon.

The Child Health clinic for children two to six years old, will open on Saturday at Block 35 Health room between 9 and 11 a.m. "This new clinic is being established so that a much better check may be kept on the general health of the pre-school children.

"All mothers who have children within those age limits should take advantage of the clinic," stated Ellen Webber, R.N., chief nurse.

Prenatal Nursing conferences, another new clinic, will be started on Monday in Block 35 Health room; and on Tuesday in Block 31 Health room, from 2 to 4 p.m. on each day. All prenatal cases are advised to attend the clinic nearest their block. Established for the purpose of helping plan for the baby, the clinic will be under Mrs. Odessa Pearson, R.N., who will discuss preparation for and care of newborns.

# EMPLOYER LAUDS WORK OF ROHWER LABORERS

14 Rohwer young men who went to Freeport, Illinois to work on the vegetable farm of C. F. Bauch were highly complimented by Relocation Officer Kendall Smith of that area.

In a letter to Ray D. Johnston, project director, Kendall wrote that the employer was extravagant in his praise for the behavior and the work of the

men. Bauch paid the men a higher wage than the prevailing wage in the county but he felt that it was the cheapest labor that he had ever had.

Since much of the vegetables was sent to Camp Grant and the Great Lakes Naval Training Base, Bauch especially felt that their industriousness was significant.

The crew, headed by Harry Ishii, is expected to arrive in the center soon. # Tri-county, Farming Opportunity

(Continued from page 1) in various types of agricultural work, ranging from year-around labor to share-cropping and co-partnership. Other job offers available include employment in domestic and industrial work. Domestic openings for couples run anywhere from \$100 to \$150 per month with room and board.

"The best opportunity for farmers, however, would be in the Tri-county Irrigation district, south of Platte river, between Smithfield and Mindon in South Dakota where 170,000 acres of fertile land can be purchased for about \$60 per acre. The locale has

railroad facilities and was recently visited by Harry Itaya of this center," revealed Farmator.

Miller who represents the Ball Bros. company desires to secure 70 to 80 men for straw baling work and trucking. His firm guarantees \$20 per week in case of rain or other unfavorable conditions. Those working near Mitchell now are earning between \$30 to \$50 a week with hotel and board costing them about \$20 to \$25 per month.

Transportation will be provided to and from the place but the seasonal worker must stay a minimum of 90 days.

# GRAVEYARD OF HOPES

On September 25th, the Pacific Citizen carried an editorial, 'Tragedy at Tule Lake' which we are reprinting below:

Last week they began to bury the dead at Tule Lake. They buried lost hopes and they buried dreams. They buried faith, too, that had gone too long unfeared.

The tragedy of Tule Lake lies not with the truly disloyal, nor with those who found the American way of life incompatible with their way. The safety of nine relocation centers is immeasurably strengthened by the fact that these persons are now segregated.

But there is a great tragedy in Tule Lake--and it lies in those who once loved democracy and all it represents and then lost that faith. They are the ones who could not reconcile the words of democracy with barbed wire, with detention, with forced evacuation. They found that the stigma of disloyalty, which no one can deny was attached to evacuation, was like an ill-fitting hat which eventually comes to fit the wearer. Their faith in democracy went long unfeared, and it wastefully away. They are the persons whom democracy failed.

It is, therefore, with added respect that we must view the 90,000 others whom democracy also failed, but who did not themselves fail democracy. They carried in their hearts a vision so true it enabled them to see beyond the barbed wire and the watchtowers. They acted with high courage and kept the faith. They endured the whiplash of bigotry and the sting of public omnium. And still they kept faith.

Tule Lake is a burial ground of hopes today. But if it is, nine other relocation communities compounded of wood and dust and wire and patrolled by armed sentries, are a monument to a people who did not lose faith.

America must not fail these people again.

Editor Larry Tajiri has captured the spirit and the essence of the tragic evacuation in this editorial that deserves a place in one of the higher niches of news journalism. Though he has not been exposed to the disarming atmosphere of a government center except for the various visits that he has made, Tajiri's editorial reflects clearly his understanding of the problems that have confronted and vexed the evacuees during the past year. Though he does not elaborate, he is fully aware of the thoughts that have crossed and recrossed the minds of a hundred thousand people and he has voiced a belief that should be the conclusion of all democratic Americans.

For, truly, Tule Lake represents a tragedy--a graveyard of hopes for those who lost faith in democracy while the nine centers stand as existing proofs that faith in democracy is not the matter of race, color or creed, but it is a seed planted in the field of democracy and nurtured with the firm belief that eventually the recognition of human rights will be attained.

Forty-five American born Japanese are busy carving scale models of enemy war vessels of all types for the United States Navy in Chicago..... German war prisoners, many believed to be members of Rommel's once-vaunted African army, are now being guarded under the watchful eyes of Japanese-American soldiers of Shelby.
