ENGEI KAI: ANNIVERSARY SHOW TONITE

Tonight, at 6:30 o'clock on the high school field, the curtains will part on Rohwer's first Anniversary Engei-kai.

Since the three-hour show will start promptly at 6:30 p.m., unless it rains, meals will be served at 5 p.m.

Residents are asked to come as early as possible, bringing own chairs.

WINTER CROPS BEING PICKED

Harvested Wednesday on the Rohwer farms were the following first crops: 125 52-pound crates of lettuce; 70 lug boxes of White icicle radishes; 95 lug boxes of Porto Rico sweet potatoes; 20 100-pound sacks of Sa-Sa daikon; and 105 15-pound baskets of Giant noble spinach.

With most of the harvesting to be over about next month, sweet potato will be the only vegetable to be stored this winter.

"The mess halls are asked to cooperate in the saving of empty baskets and boxes. Trucks will go around to the mess halls once a week and pick them up," said Toku Okazaki, junior cost accountant for the agricultural division.

CENTER TO GET TOFU

Long-awaited Tofu Factory Will Commence Operation in November

On about Nov. 15, Center residents will be able to eat the long-awaited-for tofu to be manufactured at the local Tofu factory in Block 42, announced J. Yamaguchi, who is in charge.

The alteration of Mess hall 42 into the Tofu factory, which will cover a floor space of 20' x 40' started at the beginning of this month. Installation of necessary equipments include a grinder, two stoves with special vats, a large sink, special machineries and several tables.

RAINS REVEALS DATA ON SECOND TULE LAKE TRIP

"The second contingent of Rohwer segregees bound for Tule Lake reached their destination on the afternoon of Oct. 11. Completed successfully, the credit for the well-organized four-day train trip goes to the train monitors, organizers of the trip, and above all to the cooperative spirit of the segregees," said James E. Rains, assistant project director, who returned to his desk Thursday morning.

Rains was one of the appointed personnel to accompany the group of some 401 people, 40 of them from Jerome, who left here at 2:30 p.m. on Oct. 7.

"There were no incidents

to be accounted for, and the army inspection was passed in complimentary fashion. The Train Commander was very courteous and kept the group in high spirits, allowing several exercise and rest periods," Rains said.

NEW RELOCATION OFFICE OPENS IN PENNSYLVANIA

A new W.R.A. relocation office was opened last week at Harrisburg, Pennsylvania by C. L. White, former relocation officer at Minneapolis. This office will serve central and eastern counties of Pennsylvania and northern Maryland.

"This is a densely populated area noted for its prosperous farms surrounding hundreds of busy cities and towns. The farmers of this region prosper because Pennsylvanians eat much more than they produce. Many of their vegetables, fruits, eggs and poultry are brought from the Middle West or from the Pacific coast. Like a tariff wall, shipping costs give Pennsylvania and Maryland farmers a permanent advantage over producers farther away," reported White.
