PLAIN REGIONAL OFFICE SYSTEM

Regional reports officers were appointed recently in the various relocation areas to accumulate complete and accurate information on relocation and outside conditions and then inform evacuees in the centers, announced Frank C. Cross, regional contact officer of the reports division in Washington, who visited the Center Monday and Tuesday.

The regional reports officers, who will work with relocation supervisors, have been already appointed in Denver, Kansas City, Chicago and Cleveland. They will get such information as relocation opportunities in their area, housing conditions, cost of living wage earning possibilities, and community sentiment.

Cross, who was accompanied by Harry Weiss, regional reports officer of the Cleveland office, left today for Jerome.

CITIZENSHIP FOR ALIENS IN ARMED FORCES

Aliens serving in the armed forces of the United States in outposts all over the world are eligible for naturalization, if at the time of his enlistment or induction he was living in the United States. The length of time he may have resided is immaterial, according to a statement issued last week by Earl G. Harrison, commissioner of Immigration and Naturalization.

The other requirement is that he must have served at least a month in the armed forces.

Congress has waived all other usual requirements for naturalization, including the age and education stipulations, and the fact that the applicant may belong to a race customarily indigible for naturalization. However, it is explained, a non-citizen who has joined the American forces in some foreign country is not eligible for overseas naturalization.

MILK SUPPLY REDUCED

To Comply with O.P.A. Orders

Effective Nov. 15, milk supply purchased on the Project may not exceed $\frac{1}{2}$ pint per person per day, in order to comply with the recent order from the Office of Price Administration, reported Project Steward L. A. May.

Distribution of milk to the residents will be based upon the WRA policy issued last February: "Fresh milk shall be provided only to infants, nursing mothers, pregnant women, and other persons who, by medical direction, require a special diet."

Milk shall be served in the Administrative Mess on the same basis as it is served to the Center population.

Issued on Oct. 26 by Leland Barrows, acting director of WRA, Washington, D.C., this new order putting a limit on Project milk supplies will be effective in all the relocation centers, reported May.

MOVE EVACUEE STORED GOODS

Evacuees of Dolano and Bakerfield area who have their property stored in the Delano Japanese Language school were asked to see Irving B. Connor, evacuee property officer, and file either form WRA-155 or WRA-156.

A report was received from Poston that evacuees of Dolano area at the Colorado River relocation project unanimously agreed to store their personal property in the government warehouse, since the school building is of wooden structure and unsafe against fire and theft. Immediate action was requested so that the building may be vacated at one time.

YMCA SECRETARY ON VISIT; PLAN LEADERSHIP INSTITUTE

W. J. Kitchen, emergency program secretary for the national student YMCA, New York, came into the Center yesterday to make arrangements for the three-day Leadership Institute which will be held here Nov. 19 through Nov. 21.

The Leadership Institute is scheduled to present three principal speakers: Dr. John B. Thompson, pastor of the Presbyterian church, Norman, Oklahoma;

citizenship may contact special commissioners sent abroad for the purpose, or representatives of the State Department, or American consuls.

This procedure, granted aliens for the first time in American history, is incorporated as a provision of the Second War Powers Act.

George Corwin, director of boys' work, national YMCA, New York City, who is also in charge of YMCA work in the relocation centers; and Arno Haack, director of relocation and social activities, Washington University, St. Louis, Mo.

The three-day program will offer training to those interested in leadership in the Center and outside community; present a study of social factors which entered into the evacuation order; suggest community attitudes that influence successful integration in relocation life; and advise how to build up new leadership which can take over the responsibilities left by those who have relocated and carry on active community, social and religious program within the Center.

STATISTICS ON RELOCATION GIVEN FOR MONTH OF OCTOBER

According to statistics recently released from Chester Fujino, assistant relocation officer, 468 employment offers were received through the Em-

ployment Bureau from various Relocation officers for the month of October.

With 58 various jobs offered, the largest number included domestic, 233; farm, 39; clerical, 27; factory, 28; and mechanic, 13.

Illinois leads with 107 opportunities. Closely following were Michigan, 87; Ohio, 80; Missouri, 66; Wisconsin, 49; Iowa, 31; Massachusetts, 25; and Nebraska, 22.

During the month, 82 people left on indefinite, 43 on seasonal and 142 on short term.
