With the relocation of Editor Barry Salki to the Chicago area last Thursday, ye OUTPOST staff has suffered their thirtieth loss in one year. Saiki left the center on short-term leave to return sometime in January; then, his plans are to relocate on indefihite leave.

He leaves behind an enviable record in journalism as editor, of the EL JOA-QUIN, official publication of the Stockton Assembly Center, and as editor of the OUTPOST and numerous other publications in the Rohwer Center. Saiki, better known to center residents as "Barry-more," was also noted as an active bussei leader and past president of the YBA.

A University of California graduate, Saiki hails from Stockton, Calif., and was one of the youngest editors of any WRA center publications. Before evacuation he has had very little experience and no formal training in journal-1sm--but this has not hampered his accomplishments in that field.

SUBSISTENCE

Based on Family Size , Needs

Subsistence allowances for evacuee, families relocating hereafter will be calculated on family size and needs, according to word received last week by Project

Director Ray D. Johnston. The new plan, which became effective Nov. 4, provides for the same transportation allowances that have heretofore been alloted but permits a 5-day subsistence allowance of \$25 for each person making the trip regardless of the number in a family. With relocation assistance grants based on need, all family members are eligible- for subsistence allowances, provided that the cash resources do not exceed \$100 per femily member.

Under the old procedure, no family was allotted a subsistence allowance of more than \$100.

Evacuees who wish to apply for relocation assistance grants may receive full particulars from Relocation Office r E. B. Moulton in Ad. building 2.

FARM YIELDS WINTER CROPS

A total of 5,492 bushels or 204,586 pounds of food amounting to \$9,910,46 was harvested in October on the Center farms.

The 700 evacuee workers have topped 65,300 tons of sugar beets, amounting to 18,666,200 pounds of sugar, on farms in Denver, Adams; Jefferson and Arapahoe counties, Choate disclosed. Estimating 26 pounds of sugar per person annually, the total amount of beets harvested by the evacuees would satisfy the ordinary wartime needs of the population of a city the size of San Francisco.

In addition, the avacuees have aided in the harvesting of other carps. in the Denver vicinity, including head lettuce, cabbage, root vegetables, tomatoes, celeryand potatoes, Choate added.

"All the reports I have received indicate without exception that the evacuoes have been willing and in-telligent workers,"Choate said. "Moreover, they all thought of their work terms of the war offort, realizing that by laboring on farms they were making a genuine contribution toward shortening the present conflict."

MANY CASES AIDED BY PROJECT LAWYER

In October, 100 individual evacuee cases were handled by Project Attorney Jack Curtis.

This number included 33 property cases, 13 insurance, 6 taxation, 2 collection, 3 probate, 1 divorce, 11 referred by the local evacuoe property office, and 37 miscellaneous.

(Continued from Page 1) Edward F. Berback, was injured in the disturbance of Nov. 4.

The administrative area is now completely .cut off by a high fence from the Japanese colony. Since the Army moved in no eva cues workers have returned to the administrative offices, although small crews have been unloading coal and food and moving garbage since Tuesday. No one was permitted to go into the Japanese colony without army escort.

"In our opinion tho majority of the Japanese residents would not question the authority of the WRA or the Army," Best seld, "However since segregation we have been aware that we have in this Contor Japanese who would go to any lengths to cause trouble to the United States government in the belief that in so doing, they would be aiding Japan. Knowing this we have been ready to ask the Army to act on short notice. The group of troublemakers has seized every opportunity to make major issues out of minor grievances of the residents in the effort to gain political control of the whole Japanese population for their own personal prestige and to serve the Japanese Emperor. Labor trouble was stirred up by agitators among the coal crews and farm workers."

"The boldest move by the group occurred Nov. 1 when Dillon S. Myer, WRA director, visited the Tule Lake center. He was not scheduled to meet with Japanese representatives until the next day. Yet it was announced in all dining halls at noon that all the evacuees were to go to the administration area to hear a telk by Mr. Myer. As a result of this hoax, betwoen 3500 and 4000 men, women and children streamed up from the colony to the administration build-A well - organized ing. of perhaps 200 aggroup gressive young men directed the movements of crowd and also told WRA staff members to romain in the administration or

other buildings. Their language and actions were rough but there was fighting. The WRA staff realized that a single incident could endanger many innocent people, and such an occurrence could have been used by Japan to retaliate against Americans held by them. advisability of calling in the Army which was lined up at the edge of the project ready to act was seriously considered. In view of the fact that the crowd was orderly, that it contained many women and children brought there by a hoax, and that the crowd was between the Army post and the administration building, it was docided to avoid possible bloodshed which in all probability would have been inevitable under the cir cumstances if the Army had been called in. While the crowd stayed outside, Mr. Myer, Mr. Cozzons and myself met in my office with a group of 17 Japanese who said they represented the colony. While this meeting was in progress we received word that 10 to 12 thugs had beaten Dr. Roece Podicord, chief medical officer of the project, in his office at the hospital. The moeting was held up until we were assured by the visit of a staff member to Dr. Pedicord that he was safe, Mr. Myer told the committee and the crowd that he did not act upon demands, and assured them that the WRA and the evacuees could get together to discuss and settle any problem," Best sdai.

237 evacuos from relocation centers and outside are working 14 to 16 hours a day to harvest the crop of the Tule Loke Project farm which the Tule Lake sogregees rofused to touch, Among the group of furm workers are 32 from Idaho. A special train left Wednesday the Tule Lake center with evacuees who had been scheduled to be transferred during the segregation movement. Among thom were 90 going to Minidoka.

The very last words of a dying warrior in World War I. Perhaps at that time, the soldier was dreaming of an Armistice and a lasting peace. But before his dream came to a fulfilment, he died. Ten months later, the first Armistice was signed. But to us he has given a challenge, —an invisible torch of world wide brotherhood to be held high by us the livings.

For a period of about two decades, we were proud to have said to ourselves, that the torch is still upheld by us. But a few years ago, we got involved in another world wide conflict. Porhaps the whole world is fighting because of political, economical or military reasons, but whatever the reason may be, the fact remains that we have dropped the torch handed to us by the dying soldier.

When on the battlefield, an American soldier, a Japanese soldier, an English soldier or a German soldier, no doubt has no personal grudge against the soldiers whom he is shooting. He shoots only because his orders are to This sounds foolshoot. it's just oneof ish, but those things. In a cold scientific viewpoint, are but animals fighting for existonce -- a case of survival of the fittest. If we view ourselves in this manner, it may be easier for us to formulate a lasting peace: -- but the deads of the last war are not sleeping, for we have failed to fulfill their dreams--. When will we pick up
