

## PRODUCTION OF TOFU AND MISO STARTS HERE

Production of tofu at the local factory in Block 42 will begin tomorrow. Distribution of tofu to the Mess halls will start next week.

With about 600 cubes of tofu estimated to be produced in a day, delivery to each Mess hall may average about 100 cubes, once a week.

At the Miso factory, seven 60-gallon barrels of miso are now being processed. Miso will be ready for delivery about the middle of January.

In preparation for winter, several hundred bushels of sweet potatoes are now being cured in dry kiln.

That each Mess hall may put up "tsukemono" to last through the winter months, 136 80-gallon barrels were distributed recently to the blocks. Each Mess hall received three barrels, with two more barrels on their way. Dalkon and napa will be supplied from the Center farms.

## Center Joins In Sale of Poppies

In the poppy sale sponsored recently by the American Legion auxiliary of McGehee, the sum of \$131.47 was realized, according to the MCGEHEE TIMES of Nov. 18.

\$86 of this amount was obtained from sales in McGehee. \$45.47 was derived from the sales at the Rohwer Center; the \$26.90 from the schools and \$18.57 from the administrative offices and MP.

## PORK NOW PRODUCED FROM HOG FARM HERE

Up to Nov. 5, a total of 78 hogs was slaughtered on the local hog farm. This amounted to 7,295 pounds, dressed weight, or an estimated 21,620 pounds, live weight.

## RELOCATION TEAM

### Schools to Close Thanksgiving Day

Tomorrow will be a Thanksgiving Day holiday for all students. Schools will be closed for pupils.

## RATION BOOKS FOR RELOCATION

Residents going out on indefinite or seasonal leaves may now apply for War Ration Book No. 3 at Ad. building 2. The applications will then be sent to the Office of Price Administration in Little Rock. The ration books will be mailed to the residents in about five days.

Applications for War Ration Book No. 4 may also be made by relocating evacuees at Ad. building 2. At that time, War Ration Book No. 3 must be shown. (Continued on Page 4)

In order to present factual information to help evacuees decide whether they wish to relocate and where they wish to go, a relocation team will visit the Center from Dec. 2 to Dec. 11. The team will be composed of Harold S. Pistere, relocation supervisor of the Cleveland area; Elmer Shirrell, supervisor of the Chicago area; and Dr. P. A. Webber of the Salt Lake office.

Although detailed plans for the team's operation at the Center were reported as still being made, the general plan is to show movies on relocation, have talks by the various team members on relocation possibilities in the different areas, and to hold exhibits on relocation possibilities and successes of persons already relocated.

Led by Pistere, this relocation team will start here and then make regular visits to all the relocation centers, according to reports from Island Barrows, acting director of WRA.

## GREW DEFENDS JAPANESE AMERICANS IN ADDRESS

Loyal American citizens of Japanese ancestry were strongly defended by Joseph C. Grew, former ambassador to Japan and special assistant to the Secretary of State, in a speech in New York City Thursday night at the annual dinner of the Holland society of New York. Friday morning editions of both the NEW YORK TIMES and the HERALD-TRIBUNE carried favorable accounts of his address, in which he pleaded that Japanese Americans be given fair treatment.

The following appeared in the HERALD-TRIBUNE, of Nov. 19.....

Joseph C. Grew, former American ambassador to Japan, said last night that loyal American citizens of Japanese descent

should not be made the victims of war-time prejudice. He spoke at the annual dinner of the Holland society at the Plaza Hotel after receiving the Society's Gold Medal for Distinguished Achievement. The medal is awarded annually to a non-member of the society.

"I have too great a belief in the sanctity of American citizenship to want to see those Americans of Japanese descent penalized and alienated through blind prejudice," Mr. Grew said. "I want to see them given a square deal. I want to see them treated as we rightly treat all other American citizens regardless of their racial origin with respect and

## ON RELOCATION

In these times of ugly hatred and prejudices, relocation for many of the Japanese is extremely difficult. Families find it almost impossible to secure adequate dwellings and a plausible environment. An individual with no family ties may with less friction relocate more satisfactorily. However the guise of living alone does not shield the Nisei from public sentiment; nor the attitude taken by many who instinctively distrust a "Jap" because of their former background. This is largely responsible for distortion of the family circle.

Because of the dire need for labor, the outside public is willing to employ Orientals with reasonable wages; however none are taken in socially. In seeking permanent resettlement, the relocating Japanese must have the unbiased O.K. of his neighbors, or a large and disgusting controversy will crop the Caucasians finding unwanted "Japs" in their midst. Once established, there is also the problem of sending their offspring to school. Many of the schools are reluctant to admit any Japanese to mingle with their prodigies.

These frustrated and bewildered individuals who breed in this cynical and hypercritical atmosphere cannot be expected to live a normal adult life. And may resort to crime as a vengeance? Who is to blame? The offender, society, or the parents? In this case one should overlook the deed and speculate more on circumstances and motives. Society is as much to blame as the parents who callously exposed their child to bereavement and ridicule. There is very little to be said to assuage a child in pain and humiliation.

support, unless or until they have proved themselves unworthy of respect and support."

"That fundamental principle," he said, "should apply all along the line--to every citizen of the United States of America."

Mr. Grew said that the nation must take every proper step to protect the country from hostile acts, espionage or sabotage, but the competent official authorities were attending to that constantly and effectively.

"I do know that like the Americans of German descent," he said, "the overwhelming majority of Americans of Japanese origin wish to be and are wholly loyal to the United States, and not only that, but they wish to prove that loyalty in service of their native land."

Mr. Grew quoted press reports from the 5th Army in Italy saying that, "First unit of American-born Japanese troops went into combat smiling with satisfaction as if they were going to a baseball game. Their motto is 'Remember Pearl Harbor.'"

## JOKERS, BRONCOS IN HARD PRACTICE GAME

In preparation for their next Sunday's pigskin classic, the league leading Broncos and the Joker Y's went through a strenuous practice over the week end.

Last Saturday, the Joker Y's had an inter-squad regulation game with Shiro Morimoto and Vic Matsui handling the coaching duties for the respective sides.

The two teams put up a hard fought battle, with both squads' strong point being their defensive game and showing little on offense.

The only score of the Joker's "Civil War" fray came in the fourth quarter, when Vic Matsui's Kuni Tamura intercepted a flat pass thrown by Shinya Honda and ran 35 yards down the east sideline to a touchdown.

On Sunday afternoon, the Broncos had a long practice game with the Block 28 All-Stars. The powerful Broncos squeezed out a 13-12 victory over the star-studded 28's.

The Broncos using every manpower available had a tough time against the reserve-less Block 28 team, which was made up of former and present football stars.
