Evangelical and Reformed church of Hamilton, Ohio, Kiba wrote in part:

"The host, the Rev. Manfred Stopker, was kind enough to send a car 30 miles distance to pick us up, and also to bring us home.

"When we arrived at the Church, we were invited to the children's Sunday school class and to our surprise this particular Sunday was dedicated to the young Japanese Americans in Topaz relocation center. They had a Christmas tree in front of the room and the children got in line and marched around the room and took the gifts and placed them under the tree. I recalled last Christmas when our children at Rohwer were on the receiving end of the gifts sent by many children throughout the country. But, on this day I had the privilege of watching the giving end of the holy Christmas giving. It is hard to explain in words how I felt when I watched these little children place those packages under the tree, in hopes that it will make some little boy or girl smile. The kind thoughts of those children to share the Christmas feeling with an unknown friend thousand miles away, a friend of a different race. I thanked God that all the people are not like some of the undemocratic individuals of California.

"In my short talk before the procession, I did not mention about the evacuation and its problems but emphasized that we experience various emotions of sadness and discouragement and stressed the kind and tireless efforts of Christian people who have given us the much needed hope and faith.

"It was an experience that I don't believe I shall ever forget. I wish the people of the Center who have children would only realize the feeling that it gave me, and I know that they would feel the same if they had the same opportunity."

WASHINGTON RELEASES REPATRIATION NOTICES

Evacuees who wish to be repatriated to Japan should submit requests promptly if they have not already done so in order that WRA can keep the State Department accurately informed of their wishes. Project Director Ray D. Johnston announced today. WRA will continue to submit requests for repatriation or cancellation to the State Department for use in connection with negotiations with Japan concerning further exchanges, if and when they can be arranged.

Stressing that there is no definite word at this time concerning future exchanges, the Project Director advised all evacuees to file applications with both WRA, and the Spanish Embassy in Washington.

Persons who have applied for repatriation sometime in the past and who have since changed their minds should inform the proper authorities at once. Such evacuees

W.R.A. Discusses Appropriations

Attending the 5-day Conference on Administrative Management of WRA, which was held from Dec. 6-11 at Denver, Colo., to discuss WRA appropriation problems, were Francis R. Mangham, assistant project director, and Ralph Estes, cost accountant.

It was estimated that for the fiscal year 1944, which is from July 1, 1943 to June 30, 1944, the total expenditures for all 10 WRA centers and the Washington office will be \$48,000,000, according to Mangham.

For the previous fiscal year, 1943, expenditures which included construction of the projects and transportation of evacuees was estimated at \$73,000,000.

No figures were reported for the fiscal year 1945.

EVACUEE PROPERTY IN L.A. TEMPLE RELEASED

FIRE HAZARD PRECAUTIONS

Residents were reminded again to take special precaution against fire hazards.

All wood, trash, papers and other inflammable materials must be removed from around the stoves.

should file a declaration with WRA and also inform the Spanish Embassy of their decision. Notification of both WRA and the Spanish Embassy is recommended in order that possible misunderstanding and confusion may be avoided if and when an exchange is imminent.

Project Director Johnston warned that once a name has been submitted and accepted by the Japanese Government, it may be difficult, if not impossible to remove that name from the list of persons to be exchanged. For that reason it is most important that evacuees make up their minds definitely, and file such applications or cancellations as may be necessary regarding their real intentions. While the United States Government does not desire to exchange American citizens to Japan against their will, citizens who have requested expatriation and whose names have been accepted by the Japanese government may be required to prove their citizenship before their names can be withdrawn from the sailing list.

The release of evacuee property stored in Higashi Hongwanji Temple in Los Angeles was reported in a letter to Project Director Ray D. Johnston from Harvey Burnett, evacuee property officer at Heart Mountain center.

"We have succeeded in obtaining approval for the release of all evacuee property stored in the Higashi Hongwanji Temple under the custodianship of the Rev. Kubose of this center. There is stored in this temple property belonging to some 260 families, representing approximately 1500 people. Since it may be necessary in order to properly identify the property belonging to individuals of the various centers for the Rev. Kubose to be at the temple, we are giving some thought to making a request to the San Francisco office that he be approved by the military authorities to return to California to assist with the identification of the property in accordance with his knowledge of the ownership of the property," said Burnett's letter.

All Center residents who have property stored at the Temple are asked to see I. B. Conner, evacuee property officer, in Ad. building 2, in order that they may apply for shipment of their property or the removal of same from the temple to Government warehouse.
