Evacuees who wish to be repatriated to Japan should submit requests promptly if they have not already done so in order that WRA oun keep the State Departmont accurately informed of their wishes, Project Director Ray D. Johnston announced today. WRA will continue to submit requests for repatriation or cancellation to the State De- . partment for use in connection with negotiations with Japan concerning further exchanges, if and whon they can be arranged.

Stressing that there is no definite word at this futuro time concerning exchanges, the Project Director advised all ovacuees to file applications with both WRA, and tho Spanish Embussy in Washing-

W.R.A. Discusses **Appropriations**

Attending the 5-day Conference on Administrutive Management of WRA, which was held from Dec. 6-11 at Denver, Colo., to discuss WRA appropriation problems, were Franeis R. Mangham, assistant project director, and Relph Estes, cost accountent.

It was estimated that for the fiscal year 1944, which is from July 1, 1943 to Juno 40, 1944, the total expenditures for all 10 WRA centers and the Washington office will be \$48,000,000, according to Mangham.

For the previous fixed year, 1943, expenditures which included construction of the projects and transportation of evacuoes was estimated at \$73,000,-000.

No figures were reported for the fiscal year 1945.

EVACUEE PROPERTY IN LATEMPLE RELEASED

FIRE HAZARD PRECAUTIONS

Residents were reminded again to take special precaution against fire hazards.

All wood, trush, papers and other inflammable materials must be removed from around the stoves.

All Christmas decorations are highly inflammable and must not come in contact with any kind of heat as light fixtures, extens i on cords, open switches, open flames from candles, lamps and any other heating devices.

Fire extinguishers must be kept inside the building.

Out side trash fires must be put out.

(Continued from Page 3) should file a declination with WRA and also inform the Spenish Embassy of their decision. Notification of both WRA and the Spanish Embassy is recommended in order that possible misunderstanding and confusion may be avoided if and when an exchange is imminent.

Project Director Johnston warmed that once a name has been submitted and accepted by the Japanese Government, 1t may be difficult, if not impossible to remove that name from the list of persons to be exchanged. For that reason 1t is most important that evacuees make up their minds definitely, and file such applications or cancellations as may be necessary regarding their real intontions. While the United States Government does not desire to exchange American citizens to Japan against the 1 r will, citizens who have requested expetriation and whose names have been accepted by the Japane se government may be required to prove their citizenship before their names can be withdrawn from the sailing list.

The release of evacuee property stored in Higashi Hongwanji Temple in Los Angeles was reported in a letter to Project Director Ray D. Johns ton from Harvey Burnett, evacuee property officer at Heart Mountain center.

"We have succeeded in obtaining approval for the release of all evacues property stored in the Higashi Hongwanji Temple under the custodianship of the Rev. Kubose of this center. There is stored in this templa property belonging to some 260 families, representing approximately 1500 people. Since it may be necessary in order to properly identify the property belonging to individuals of the various centers for the Rev. Kubose to be at the temple, we are giving some thought to making a request to the San Francisco office that he be approved by the military authorities to return to California to assist with the identification of the property in accordance with his knowledge of the ownership of the property," said Burnett's letter.

All Center residents who have property stored at the Temple are asked to see I. B. Conner, evacuee property officer, in Adbuilding 2, in order that they may apply for shipment of their property or the removal of same from the temple to Government warehouse.
