

Holiday Lumberjacking Will Continue; Hauling Problem

The holiday lumberjacking, which has been going on for the past two weeks, will continue next week until the Center wood shortage situation is relieved, reported James F. Rains, assistant project director.

"The major problem is the hauling of the timber, since the cutting down of trees is progressing favorably," Rains said, clarifying the statement which appeared misquoted in the last issue of the **OUTPOST**.

At present, the hauling is being carried out by means of 18 teams of mules and wagons, 6 tractors and wagons and 3 tractors with mudboats. These are being rotated equally to all the blocks.

Bad roads, combined with bad weather, have been the greatest obstacles. The most hauling difficulties have existed in the north-end section where about 12 blocks are cutting wood. However, the road was fixed Thursday by "cross-lays." But the southwestern section is fair. The central area has been fairly cleared out by the other blocks, Rains said.

Headed by the Wood and Fuel committee, of which Frank Date, is chairman, approximately 1100 men, most of whom are away from their regularly assigned jobs, are

out lumberjacking. The committee includes representatives from the Community council, block managers and timber workers.

OPERATIONS HEAD HERE

Rohwer Population Statistics Released

Results of the statistical survey based on Rohwer center's population of October, 1943, were released by Charles Wiscom, community analyst.

They are as follows: total population on Oct. 23, 1943 was 6673; 48% women, 54% men; 40% issei, 54% nisei, 6% kibei; ancestry--99.6% pure Japanese, 17 persons mixed blood; religion--77% Buddhist, 21% Christian, 2% no religion; language--31%

Japanese, only, 7% English only, 57% both Japanese and English; 5% too young to understand; reading and writing ability--33% Japanese only, 26% English, 31% both Japanese and English, 10% too young.

Education--4% none, 10% some grade school, 40% finish grade school, 47% finish high school, 2.4% finish college, 3% post graduate; citizenship--59% citizens, 40% aliens, 1.2% dual citizenships, origin

of isseis in Japan--81% rural, 19% urban with highest states being Hiroshima (27%) and Yamaguchi (8.5%) and lowest states being Hokkaido (1 person) and 4 states with none.

Origin and arrival date into United States--89% direct from Japan, 11% via Hawaii, 3% via other countries; born outside of continental U.S.--2725 persons or 41%; year of arrival--.3% during 1881-

At the YPCF, Yuriko Uyehara, newly-elected president, will preside the discussion to be held on a timely topic. The YPCF will now meet at 7 p.m.

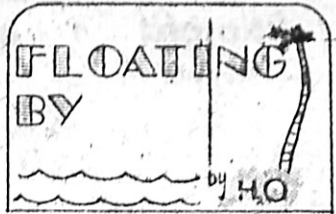

ON GRADUATION...

Last night saw the graduation of 40 students from Rohwer High School, the third of such group within the year and half history of the Rohwer Relocation Center. This group represents another Ship of Education which has made port safely, through the sea of Time. This Ship, which weighed anchor about 1931-32 carried passengers whose ports of call were the little red school houses and the high schools. Fate played a funny role and this group now includes former students from Northern and Southern California schools. '31-'32 marks the depth of the '29 depression, but in that trying time, the Issel parents, foreseeing the necessity of an education for the future, put their children to schools, in some cases, sacrificing a great deal for their children. And now, these parents, seeing their children in caps and gowns, receive their diplomas, give a sigh of relief, that the seed of hope which they have planted 12 years ago has now bloomed. These aged figures, the Issels, a passing race, sat as an audience last night with satisfied hearts. Times were hard and fate was mean; this ship with its passengers had braved many a storm in the seas of time. Sometimes it drifted off course, sometimes the beacon was dimmed, and sometimes the Ship traveled on the trough of the waves instead of the crest. When riding on the crest, the Ship saw the gay luxurious period of '35-'39... the boom of '40-'41... But in late '41, it felt the tempest of the storm, the Pacific War. Education was hard hit. Some couldn't continue, some had to transfer, and some who'd study, studied half heartedly with a fear of the war in their mind.

Straight From California

Dear Hunter:

We often wish we knew what you are doing and how you progress. We read what you write but that is not enough. We are so humiliated and disgusted with California's bitter attitudes and hatred of all Japanese. Recently we see and read a great change. I know the attitude of boys coming home from South Pacific has helped change this. These soldiers and sailor boys are horrified. They say, "We men right out there have no such bitter feeling toward the Japs as you do here in California."

We have good news from several relocated in New York, Chicago, and Denver. We tried to remember each of those we knew both outside and inside camps this Christmas. It is a time of change and stress and they need loyal friends.

I am so, so glad over news brought by those on Gripsholm of the fair treatment of those in camps in Philippine Islands. They have complete charge of their camps and no Japanese even comes there at all. This will help postwar feeling. We just had word of some cousins there whom we all thought dead or mistreated and now hear firsthand of their safety, health, and good treatment by Japanese. I saw a definite change last night in the attitude of another cousin, a surgeon in the last war and bitter antagonist of all Japanese. Now he is not criticizing them even as a week ago.

If you find a spare moment, please write. Where are the children and what are they doing?
