Fuel Problem Awaits Results As Center Recalls Employees

At the last meeting of the Block Managers the problem of fuel was lengthily discussed again.

Due to bad weather conditions and wet grounds, block lumberjacking has been temporarily curtailed until it can be resumed again when weather permits. Administration notice has been sent to all blocks notifying that all employees return to their respective position for the

time being.

Furnishing of coal to relieve wood shortage in many blocks has been reassured by the chairman of the fuel committee, and few blocks are already receiving their allotment of coal. The distribution will be left up to this committee.

Block lumberjacking will probably continue again depending upon the outcome of Block Managers' meeting which is being held today.

Work Starts on Poultry Farm Arrival of Chicken Expected

With the laying of the foundation, the Poultry house is progressing rapidly, and according to J. R. Rains, assistant project director, the plan calls for upkeep of some 20,000 fowls annually. In early February some 4,000 chicken are expected, and thereon 2,000 more will be delivered monthly until the quota is reached.

These chicken will be kept alive for four months and the meat will be used for local consumption.

The Poultry house 20 x 100 feet, being constructed near the present hog farm, and will be completed soon. All brooding equipment are already purchased and delivered.
