JEROME TO BE CLOSED BY JUNE RESIDENTS TO BE SHIFTED TO OTHER CENTERS

In a teletype to E. B. Whitaker, project director of Jerome center, Secretary Ickes officially confirmed that Jerome center will be closed by June.

The teletype, taken from the DENSON TRIBUNE, follows:

WASHINGTON, D.C., Feb. 22--Plans of the War Relocation Authority for the closing of the Jerome Relocation Center near Jerome, Arkansas, were announced today by Secretary of the Interior Harold L. Ickes.

The Jerome Center, one of the two in the Mississippi Delta Region of Arkansas where persons of Japanese descent evacuated from the Pacific Coast are living, will be closed in June.

"Economy of operation dictated the move to close the Center," the Secretary said, "as the 92,000 people remaining in WRA centers can be cared for more economically in nine Centers than in ten."

"It has been the intention to close a center as soon as the relocation program progressed far enough to make space available in other centers to accommodate the people who will have to be moved.

"The 18,000 persons who have left the centers under the relocation program now make it possible to absorb the residents of one of the centers without undue crowding."

Secretary Ickes pointed out that the Jerome Center was the last to be established, so development of physical facilities had not progressed as far as at some of the others.

Its population, 6,854 as of February 1, is one of the smallest, and existence of the Rohwer Relocation Center only 36 miles away with a capacity of nearly 2,000 additional persons as a result of relocation, would reduce the total amount of transportation involved and minimize the difficulties of moving.

The relocation program from Jerome, as from the eight other relocation centers, will continue during the spring months and residents will be given all possible assistance in finding opportunities to re-establish themselves in communities outside the evacuated zone.

The Jerome residents who have not relocated as individuals or families before the first of June, according to Secretary Ickes, will be moved to other relocation centers, including Rohwer, located nearby; Granada in Colorado, Heart Mountain in Wyoming and possibly others if more space is needed.

The Jerome Relocation Center was opened in October, 1942, and at the peak of its population was temporary home for 8,672 persons of Japanese descent.

Under the relocation program of the WRA 1,518 persons have left the Center.

Army Specialized Training Exams To Be Given March 15th

Contrary to rumors around camp, a test for the Army specialized training program will be given on March 15 as planned, reported Opal Albright, vocational counselor. Miss Albright also announced that more tests have been secured for those interested in this course. Persons who have applied for this test the first time and did not secure the test were asked to come to Miss Albright's office again in 35-124-D. She also related that those who have relocated could take this test in any high school that is giving this test, but arrangements must be made with that school be-

fore the date of the test. Date for the test is the same all over the country--Mar. 15th.

The test will be given at 35-9-B at 8:45 a.m. sharp and the applicants must not come later than the specified time. The physical qualification for this program is as follows: minimum height of 5 feet to maximum of 6 feet; vision must be 20/200 without glasses and 20/40 with glasses; a set of 10 serviceable teeth in both upper and lower plates; hearing must rate 15/15 in whispering test. Also the person must be free from chronic and venereal diseases.

Jerome To Close in June

(Continued from Page 1) Jerome Center, under WRA guidance, have carried on many different types of activity in an effort to make the community as nearly self-sufficient as possible.

During the 1943 farming season, according to Project Director E. B. Whitaker, they produced vegetables and other food crops on 718 acres of land, harvesting a total of 1,170,564 pounds of crops, shipped 15,000 pounds of corn and sweet potatoes to other centers, cleared 200 acres of new land and several hundred acres more of practically cleared land, and slaughtered 1,215 head of hogs raised from feeders, for their own use.

In the seven-month period between July of last year and February 1 of this year, they have produced 281,900 board feet of lumber and cut 6,006 cords of firewood.

U.S. REPORTS MADE ON RUBBER SHOES

The Athletic Department of the Community Activities recently received a statement from the National Recreation Association concerning the shortage of basketball shoes and other athletic shoes that need rubber soles.

Synthetic and reclaim rubber are now available and it is a question of working out a program which will not interfere with special types of combat wear and more essential civilian industrial and health items and provided the demands of the Army permits. There is a planned program to produce gymnasium shoes and it is expected that a number of factories may start production January, according to the United States Office of Education.
