MURAI, FARM AUTHORITY, TO GIVE LECTURES

Koh Hibumi Murai, noted authority on agriculture and former publisher of the SAN-GYO-NIPPO which was a Japanese-American daily in Los Angeles, arrived at the Center Saturday night from Lincoln, Neb., where he is now relocated. He will stay here for six weeks to give illuminating and fact-packed lectures in practical agriculture.

Murai will open his class in agronomy, which is a basic course in agriculture, on Monday from 7 p.m. at 31-7-D&E. With a pre-enrollment of 175 students, the lectures will be conducted in both English and Japanese. The lectures are sponsored jointly by the Agricultural section, Adult education and the Community council.

NEW SEASONAL LEAVE REGULATIONS RELEASED

New seasonal leave regulations in the recent ruling which provides that no evacuees be released on seasonal leave except on government contract to an agency responsible for farm

labor program, namely the Extension Service or the War Food Administration, were released by WRA Director Dillon S. Myer.

Regulations especially emphasized by Myer include: no evacuee shall be released on seasonal leave except on government contract and no evacuee should remain out on the seasonal leave if at any time his government contract is terminated and he does not negotiate a new one; visits to Center will not be permitted during seasonal leave except under special emergency conditions and evacuee must obtain a permission of relocation officer to return to the Center; persons accepting seasonal leave to some of the congested areas as northern Utah or northern Colorado will not be permitted to convert to indefinite leave in those areas; while seasonal leave is set up primarily for purpose of utilizing surplus labor in western agricultural areas.


