Today, the USO will sponsor an open house at the YWCA club room in Block 41, from 2 to 5 p.m. At 7 p.m., there will be a dance with Lily Koyama as the emcee, at the USO building, Block 42. During the intermission, they will be entertained with a vocal number by Hisa Hananouchi and a tap dance by Jennie Ando.

Sunday morning will be spent in religious worship at the various churches. At 2 p.m., dancing and entertainment will be on tap with music by the Rohwer high school orchestra. An "Ochazuke" supper will be served by the USO-parents' organization. The program will come to a close at 7 p.m. when the soldiers will start back for Mississippi.

## DEFENSE JOBS REQUIRE FILING OF PERSONNEL INFORMATION

Relocation Officer E. B. Moulton announced today that both citizens and non-citizens who wish to work in war plants may now obtain at his office "Personnel Security Questionnaires" which must be filled out in order to get clearance for this type of work. If this clearance is obtained before an individual leaves the center, it may eliminate a long wait after he arrives at the site of his employment.

Moulton pointed out that this is not a general registration but is for those who have special skills, who really wish war plant employment and who are in a position to relocate.

## DEMANDS BY AMACHE NISEI

Washington, D. C., Feb. 26 (AP)--Japanese Americans in the relocation center at Granada, Colo., have presented 11 demands on the War Relocation Authority, including a plea that they be given freedom to live and travel anywhere in the United States, Dillon S. Myer, WRA director, disclosed today.

Asking that camp occupants be restored their full rights as United States citizens, the letter to Myer said draft age Americans of Japanese ancestry had been responding to the call for military service and civilian responsibility to aid the war effort.

These requests were made: 1. That equal opportunity for service and advancement in the military forces be offered

Japanese American draftees solely on the basis of individual merit and qualification; 2. That Japanese Americans who are called to the colors no longer be assigned to segregated units; 3. That the right to travel and live wherever he chooses be restored.

4. That evacuees be accorded all the rights and privileges which the Constitution gives them; 5. That any resettlement policy be coupled with adequate government protection and the economic means to start life anew; 6. That clarification be made regarding voting and residence status of Japanese Americans who become of age in the centers; 7. That the right to become naturalized citizens be extended

to alien Japanese; 8. That pending resettlement evacuees be accorded treatment befitting loyal Americans and that adequate wages be paid them.

9. That vigorous effort be made by the government toward enlightening the "misinformed" American public with truth regarding the Japanese in America, and that the factual difference between the people of Japanese extraction who are loyal citizens of this country and the people in Japan be clearly presented; 10. That students of Japanese ancestry be freely admitted to all schools; 11. That the government establish adequate precautions so that the "sad" experiences of evacuation will never be repeated.--CHICAGO TRIBUNE.

(Continued from Page 1) delegates. Topics included organization, hog production, slaughtering, poultry production, farm machinery, canning, storage, and cost accounting.

A crop production goal for each center was set. For Rohwer center, the approved program for 1944, based on the figures of actual food requirements, was reported as follows: total acreage to be planted in vegetable crops, 611 acres, and in feed crops, 586 acres; meat birds, 20,000; and hogs to be slaughtered, 1,300. The centers will exchange surplus products.

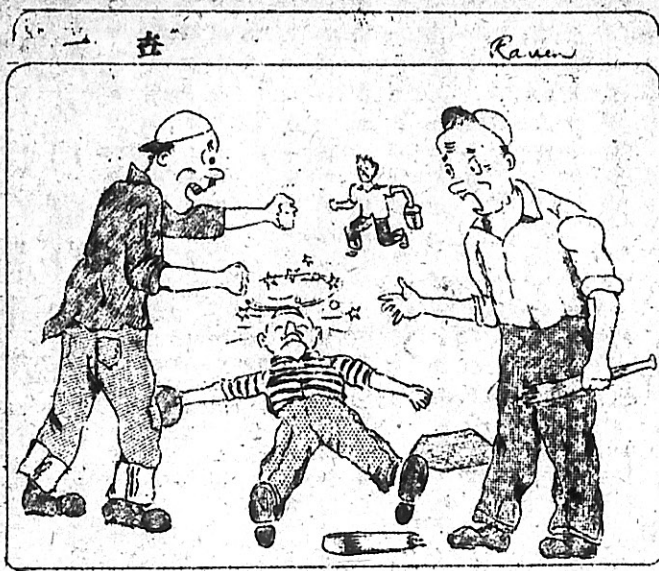
