38 DRAFTEES PASS PHYSICAL

LATEST PROJECT EMPLOYMENT RECORD TOTALS 3119 WORKERS

The project employment report for February showed that 3,119 Center residents were employed as of Feb. 29.

Of this number, 2,092 were men and 1,027 were women. The supply section, which included the mess, led all others in employment of workers with 1,072 employees. Agriculture came next with 559, engineering third with 443 and health was fourth with 218 workers. The Center Cooperative was employing 106 persons who were included in the total for the Center but who were not paid by the WRA but by the Co-operative.

The Center training program includes 11 nurses aides, 3 clerk-typists, 5 auto mechanics, 2 refrigeration workers, and 2 librarians. These trainees were not included in the total given for the project employment. 174 persons were taking some type of vocational guidance, but they were also not on the project payroll. This program is carried out through the education department.

153 CENTERITES RELOCATE LAST MONTH; CHICAGO, DENVER GET MOST

153 persons left the Center last month on indefinite or seasonal leave according to the latest relocation report.

Chicago seemed to be the most popular area for relocation with 67 people going there. Denver came next with 38, Kansas City received 1 and Boston 1. Among those leaving was a volunteer for Camp Savage and one girl who entered the Cadet Nurse Corps. 40 of the 118 persons who were granted indefinite leave left to take specific jobs of various kinds, while 24 left to seek employment. 43 people were granted indefinite leave to join other members of the family. Among the 35 seasonal

U.S. CADET NURSE CORPS CLASS OPENS WAY FOR TWO NISEI GIRLS

Chicago, Ill.—Two Japanese American girls will be considered for U. S. Cadet Nurse Corps training at Mount Sinai hospital, Chicago, for the next class which will begin in June, it was announced this week by Gladys Sandvig, R. N., director of nurses at the hospital, and Vernon W. Kennedy, Chicago area supervisor of the WRA.

Girls wanting to apply for admission to the training school can obtain further information by writing to the director of nurses at Mount Sinai hospital, California ave., at 15th pl., Chicago 8, Ill.

In general, the candidate must be at least 18 years old, or within two months of 18; must be a high school graduate and in good health.

Highlights of the U.S.

Cadet Nurse Corps include free complete nursing education, free tuition, fees and maintenance, monthly allowances of money, outdoor winter and summer uniforms, and upon graduation eligibility to take state examinations to become Registered Nurses.

In a letter to Center residents, the Rev. Julius A. Goldwater of Los Angeles reported that the Nishi Hongwanji Betsuin's contract with the Evergreen Cemetery to place ashes at the cemetery will ex-

pire on Mar. 18. The letter follows:

"In March 1942, the Los Angeles Nishi Hongwanji Betsuin contracted with the Evergreen Cemetery to place the ashes (kotsu) held at the temple in the Evergreen vaults. All who placed the ashes of their folks or relatives paid a fee for a two-year period. The contract expires on March 18, 1944.

"These "kotsu" are among your dearest possessions. If you wish to have them, please write to the Reverend Julius A. Goldwater asking him to send them to you.

"There will be expenses incurred in time in crating and shipping each package, so please give this your consideration when you request your dearest possession.

"Those who wish to have theirs kept in the Evergreen vaults will also please write to him and enclose the same amount you paid before. The address is Reverend Julius A. Goldwater, 532 Bonhill Road, Los Angeles, 24, California."


