## INDUCTION DETAILS GROUP TO LEAVE FROM BLK. 42

Detailed information for inductees who will be inducted on March 28 was released yesterday by Relocation Officer E. B. Moulton.

Those who are to be inducted into the army on March 28 must be terminated not later than March 24. Payment of wages and clothing allowances will be made either on the afternoon of March 25 or on March 27. In order to qualify for a clothing allowance for the month of March, termination should not be made before the afternoon of March 16, since to qualify for this allowance 100 hours must be worked each month.

Internal Security will pick up inductees in the blocks from 3 to 3:30 a.m. for transportation to Block 42. Breakfast will be served there in the mess hall from 3:30 to 4:10

## BLOCK FARMERS TO RECEIVE AID FOR V GARDENS

Assistance will be given to Center residents in the growing of victory gardens, J. F. Rains, assistant project director, reported yesterday.

"A tractor and the driver will be furnished to help in preparing the ground for these gardens upon the written request of the block manager. This will insure an orderly and efficient use of equipment. A limited amount of commercial fertilizer will also be furnished each block to be used in the victory gardens," he said.

Plants are being grown for the gardens in the project nursery, but individuals were asked to wait for them until they are all ready for distribution on an equal basis.

a.m. The truck will leave for McGehee from Mess hall 42 at 4:15 a.m. and the bus will leave there for Little Rock at 5 a.m. Loading of the truck will be completed in Block 42. All inductees are requested to pick up indefinite leave papers in the relocation office either on March 25 or March 27.

"Only 22 persons will be inducted because 14 of those who have passed their physical examination are now seniors in high school and will be deferred until at least May 20, and one person who was at first accepted was later turned down," Moulton reported.

## SPRING PLANTING BEGINS 36 Food Crops Top Production

With 667 acres of ground to be turned into food production areas, spring planting on the Rohwer farm began last week. Planting started with onion plants, cabbage plants, peas, radishes, mustard, potatoes and seed plants of gobo and daikon.

This year, 36 different crops will be grown, including daikon, sweet potatoes, Chinese cabbages, green beans, bean sprouts, tomatoes, watermelons, cantaloupes, spinach, sweet corn and soy beans. In addition to these, 525 acres of feed crops including soy beans, corn, oats, lespedeza, and grain sorghum will be grown,

## LEAVE CLEARANCES FOR RESIDENTS OVER

According to the regulations, all persons becoming 17 years of age must have their leave clearance papers filled out and completed, reported E. B. Moulton, relocation officer.

Leave permits are necessary for all trips outside, including Jerome.

## SEGREGATES: THIRD GROUP MOVES LATER

The third segregation movement from Rohwer Center will probably not take place sooner than the middle of April, more likely after the first of May, reported Project Director Ray D. Johnston who returned Tuesday from a Washington conference. In all cases, Center segregates will be notified two or three weeks in advance, he said.

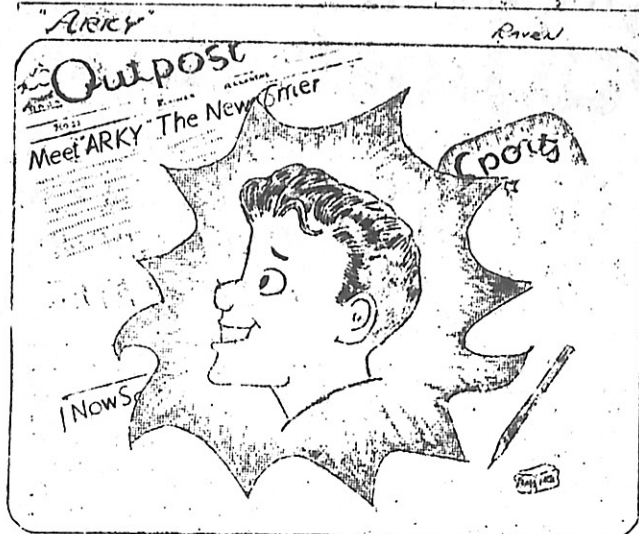
Attended by project directors from all the relocation centers, the conference was a regular annual meeting to discuss routine problems and regulations in the operation of the centers.

With Frank Nishikawa as the farm supervisor, all the operations in the agricultural section, including crop production, poultry, hog feeding, slaughterhouse and cannery will be under his supervision. Recently, an advisory board was selected by Center residents to assist in operating the farm. The advisers and their specific functions are: Hanji Inouye, tractor supervisor; Sakujiro Watanahe, seed planting; Hoshi Yamaguchi, labor dispatcher; Jitsuro Hiramoto, harvesting; Masakichi Ghino, hand tools and equipment; Masaji Takeuchi, entomologist; and Naoturo Umeda, melon.

Most of the plants used on the farm will be produced in the local plant beds which are under the supervision of T. Watanabe.

## COMMENTATOR LAUDS NISEI

Pointing out that American citizens of Japanese ancestry are performing some of the most valuable work that is being done by the U.S. Armed Forces in the Pacific, H. V. Kaltenborn, famous news commentator over the radio, called for furthering the cause of decent treatment for Japanese Americans. Kaltenborn, who speaks over the NBC network daily at 6:45 p.m., addressed the following letter some time back, to Miss Adalia K. Fisher, Committee for work with Japanese American Evacuees, St. Louis, Missouri.

Dear Miss Fisher:

I have just returned from a comprehensive, although, brief tour of our Pacific fighting areas.

On the basis of first-hand information I can tell you that American citizens of Japanese ancestry are performing some

of the most valuable work that is being done by our Armed Forces in the Pacific. These American citizens of Japanese ancestry have not only proved their loyalty, but in many cases they have voluntarily risked their lives in order to perform important front-line services.

With rare exceptions they are the only competent Japanese translators available to our Armed Forces. Those that have been given the privilege of taking up arms in the Italian war theatre have also distinguished themselves. The number of medals which they have earned for outstanding service is large in proportion to their numbers.

In talking with General Richardson, Commander-in-Chief of the United States Army in the Central Pacific; with headquarters at Honolulu in the Hawaiian Islands, he informed me

that there has not been a single case of active disloyalty proved against a single one of the 150,000 Japanese and Japanese-Americans in the Hawaiian Islands. As he put it, "We have no Japanese Problem."

I have just given an interview to the press in San Francisco, in which I stated that there must be something wrong with the way the Japanese problem has been handled in continental United States.

I expect to comment on this matter in my broadcasts as the news may suggest. But you are at liberty to use the statements I have made in this letter in any way, that will further the cause of decent treatment for American citizens, whose only crime is that they were born of Japanese parents.

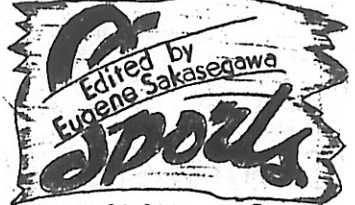
## MUTINEERS TO PLAY TERMITES
