TRIAL RELOCATION OFFERED REPATRIATION MADE CLEAR

RULES RELEASED

Further explanation of expatriation or repatriation procedure was made today when Jack Curtis, project attorney, pointed out that it was important that those who wished to return to Japan should make their request not only to WRA but also the Spanish Embassy in Washington. Curtis also said that those who had requested exchange through the Spanish Embassy but who later decided that they did not want to go to Japan should inform the Spanish Embassy as well as WRA of the withdrawal of their request.

Curtis stated that this procedure should be followed so that the American government and the Japanese government will have identical lists and that this would expedite matters in arranging for another exchange. He also said that the notification of the Spanish Consul was the responsibility of the individuals concerned and that it is their obligation to see that this is done.

GOV'T PAYS FOR FREIGHT COST

Families leaving the project will be now allowed shipment of household goods and personal effects without weight limit at government expense, provided full baggage checking privileges are utilized.

A second major change in Chapter 100.3 of administrative instructions allowed for the shipping of tools and professional equipment including farm machinery up to 5000 pounds. A written request by the evacuee must be approved by the relocation officer and project director.

Residents of relocation centers will be eligible to go out on indefinite leave for a trial period of from four to six months and may secure permission to return to the center at the end of that period if they find it necessary, according to new regulations of the War Relocation Authority received today by Project Director Ray D. Johnston.

Explaining the new regulations, Leland Barrows, acting director of WRA in Washington, said:

"The adoption of this program permitting indefinite leave on a trial basis is an effort on the part of WRA to meet the needs of those evacuees who have been uncertain of their ability to make a success of relocation, and those who have hesitated to leave the centers without assurance that they could come back in the event they were unable to make a satisfactory adjustment on the outside."

"They will now be able to take employment on a trial basis and to find out for themselves what conditions are like on the outside, with the provision that they may secure permission to return to the center at the end of four months if they find it necessary. Applicants must

show that indefinite leave for the trial period is a definite step toward permanent relocation."

The new type leave will be issued only to applicants whose destination is a state east of the Mississippi River or in the states of Minnesota, Iowa or Missouri.

Applicants must agree not to change employment nor to travel outside a prescribed travel district without approval of the Relocation Officer in that district. Applicants must be at least 21 years of age or accompanied by an immediate member of his family of at least that age.

Evacuees receiving a trial period leave are eligible for assistance grants but if such a grant is received the trial period automatically becomes a regular indefinite leave.

Holders of this type leave may secure permission to return to the center at the end of the four-month trial period but not more than six months after the issuance date of the leave. After six months the trial period leave will convert to regular indefinite leave.

Residents of the Rohwer Center may obtain further information on this new type leave from E. B. Moulton, relocation program officer.

ROHWER IN DELUGE

The worst rain storm in the history of the Center hit Rohwer yesterday as sustained downpour continued for almost 10 hours. Almost 5 inches of rain deluged the Centerites in a savage fashion. Rohwer's activities were held to a almost standstill as various divisions halted all

movements for a temporary period. All schools were closed as school blocks were literally flooded.

Up to the brief lull in the midafternoon, the blocks in the wooded region were in worst condition as Blocks 25, 26, 24, 23 and 9 were partially submerged.

ENROLLMENT STARTS FOR ADULT EDUCATION

Enrollment for a new period of twelve weeks in classes for adults was announced today by the Adult Education section.

Enrollment for English classes will be in 31-2-B and 35-1-A. For all others enrollment will be in 31-2-D. Time of enrollment is tomorrow from 1:30-4:30 p.m. and 6:30-8:30 p.m.; and Friday, 8-11:30 a.m.

The students may enroll for the following classes: English for adults (all levels), vocational Japanese, power sewing, pattern drafting and sewing, beginning shorthand and typing, intermediate shorthand and typing.

Persons may also enroll as apprentice trainees. In this case they are on the job 8 hours per day with pay and take their

training at the same time. Such training is possible in the following fields: book-binding, clerk-typist, library service, refrigeration service, and carpentry, reported Dr. N. Griswold.

PROTECTING POWER ACTS FOR ALIEN JAPANESE ONLY

The following letter of correction has been sent by F. de Amat, Spanish Consul at San Francisco, to several of the projects:

"Reference is made to my letter to you dated February 16, 1944. I have subsequently received an additional memorandum from the embassy, the transla-

tion of which follows below.

"The protecting power is not authorized to act on behalf of American citizens, and it is solely with the American authorities that they (the American citizens) must deal in these matters (American military service), since these authorities are the only ones who can solve such problems."

"May I also point out--as has been frequently and repeatedly emphasized by the Spanish delegates in their visits to the various centers--that the above-mentioned memorandum is not limited only to military service, but to anything that concerns American citizens. They must approach their own American authorities, not the protecting power, whose duties are towards the Japanese nationals in the United States."

The above letter was written to correct an erroneous impression given in a previous letter of Mr. de Amat, dated February 16, that expatriates in relocation centers were not subject to Selective Service.

DRAFT-AGE BOYS MUST REGISTER

Twelve center boys who reached the age of 18 this month but have failed to appear for draft registration were warned by J.A. Tice, registrar, that failure to appear before the end of March would classify them as draft delinquents.

J.A. Tice, education head, returned Monday night from Washington D.C. and a six day conference of relocation school heads. The conference was led by Dr. K. Ake, WRA's specialist in education.

New York, March 21--A basketball team representing the Japanese American Young People's Christian Federation of New York and built around evacuees from several relocation centers who have resettled here won the championship last week in the eight-team basketball league sponsored by the Church of All Nations in the heart of New York's lower East Side.

To take the pennant in the final and deciding tilt of the season, the Japanese American team, one of two entered in the tournament by the Federation and known as its "A" team, downed the powerful Dukes, defending titlists, by a score of 33 to 14 in the Church of All Nations gymnasium.

The "A" team won the championship with 11 wins and 3 losses. The "B" team landed in seventh place with 3 wins and 11 losses. Other tournament teams included one consisting entirely of boys of Chinese ancestry and five teams on which most of the players were of Jewish, Italian, Russian, and Polish extraction.

An all-star team of players of Japanese and Chinese origin will oppose a Caucasian all-star team in a benefit game which will be followed by a dance on March 31 in the Church of All Nations gym. The proceeds will be to send underprivileged East Side youngsters to summer camps.

The championship "A" team was led by Shig Arao, Juggo Heta, Norman Sato, Willie Mori, Hideo Furukawa, Geo. Kuratsu and Grove Yoshiware, all from various Centers. From N. Y. comes Min Arita, Asao Inouye, and Geor. Buto. The team was coached by Toge Fujihira, ex-Seattleite.

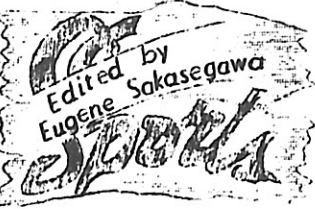
