QUARTERLY CENSUS INITIATED HOUSING UNIT COMMITTEE RELEASE REGULATIONS, DATA

SITUATION HERE

With the closing of Jerome nearing, and the vacancies being left by relocation, the following few points were discussed by the Housing committee of the Block managers to cope with the future housing situation.

1. Some concern has been expressed by a few block managers with reference to setting the increased population quota for those block in which there are units being used for community interests, such as storage, Red Cross home nursing, nursery school, etc. The Housing unit and committee have taken these conditions into consideration and wish to assure the residents that the same housing standards will prevail in every block; unless the residents in such blocks wish to be more crowded in order to retain the Community program in their respective blocks.

2. Ray D. Johnston, project director, has advised that storage space in the Center warehouse can-

BELONGINGS INFO.

For single, unattached persons leaving on short term or seasonal basis, the following notice was issued by the Housing unit and committee. To safeguard the belongings of any person leaving for more than three or four weeks, storage space for possessions are now available in every block through the Block manager. It is advised to pack the possessions securely, and to place on each package, the name of the owner printed clearly, preferably in ink. In the near future, there will be large movements in and out of the Center, and it is a great risk to leave possessions unpacked; or if packed, unmarked, if the owner is to be gone for more than three or four weeks.

Anyone wishing to leave a record of the number of packages, a brief description and a statement about where these possessions are to be stored during the owner's absence, may confer with the Relocation counseling aides in the Welfare section, 42-7-D.

At the request of the Department of Interior, War Relocation Authority, a complete census (actual head count) of the Center by blocks was taken yesterday, and will be taken at the end of each three month period thereafter.

The results of the census will be used: to reconcile basic family cards, support WRA budget requests, supply specific information on population of centers.

In order that the census may be taken with as little inconvenience as possible on the part of the people, the following plan was used: 1. Everyone was at his apartment at six o'clock yesterday, and remained until block census was completed (except employees on duty at Hospital, Fire Station, Internal Security, etc.); 2. A census staff for each block was composed as follows: Block manager, 1 Council member, 1 Internal Security member, 2 evacuee Helpers and 1 appointed personnel; 3. The census staff was divided into 2 groups—one group to take each half of block.

"With the full cooperation of everyone, it took no more than one and one half hours to complete the census. After the census

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This brings the total membership in the Red Cross to 1,756 evacuee residents.

Results of the drive among the appointed personnel will be announced in the next issue.

DRAFTEES MUST NOTIFY BOARD

Nisei who have reported for and passed their pre-induction physical examinations and who are planning to change their city of residence, were urged to contact in writing the local selective service board which authorized the examination, said E.B. Moulton.

"Do this before moving. Frequent changes of residence and the failure to report changes of address are complicating the whole procedure for transfer of local boards," Moulton said.

JAPANESE OKAYAS ARMY INSURANCE BENEFICIARIES

All persons in the active service of the armed forces may purchase insurance which will be paid to the widow, widower, child, parent, brother or sister of the insured. Japanese citizens may be named as beneficiaries of such policies even though they have

been evacuated to relocation centers or have been interned for the duration of the war.

In the event of the death of the insured person, payment of the policy may be made directly to a beneficiary who is a Japanese citizen residing in this country if he has lived only in the continental United States at all times since June 17, 1940 and if his account has not been blocked.

In the event that a beneficiary's account is blocked, payments would be held in trust for him for payment at the end of the war. Only a small percentage of evacuees have had their accounts blocked.

EVACUEE VOTING STATUS CLARIFIED

An administrative notice there. It was pointed out that residents in a relocation center did not meet the legal requirements for establishing a domicile which is necessary to obtain voting privileges.

Evacuees from California located but it was probable who voted in either the primary or general election absentee ballot in the state and county from which they were evacuated if they were properly registered ballot in the primary and

general elections to be held this year. Those who did not vote in either the primary or general election in 1942 must register in order to vote in either the primary or general election of this year. In order to register by mail, it is necessary that the interested person write to the county clerk of his own county and ask for a registration affidavit. On receipt it must be filled; signed; & returned to the county clerk. Since all registration books are closed for a period of 39 days before each election, this action must be taken prior to such period when the books are closed.

In order to vote by absentee ballot in California, it is necessary that the voter apply to the county clerk in his home county for an absentee ballot not more than twenty and not less than five days before the election in which he wishes to vote. Upon receipt of the ballot, the voter is to appear before a notary public to mark his ballot and execute other papers in connection with it. The ballot must then be returned to the county clerk where it must be received within six days after the election.

A primary election will be held in California on August 29, 1944, and a general election will be held on November 7, 1944, it was reported.

A FAREWELL NOTE

Dr. George R. Sasaki of the Rohwer hospital staff, who is relocating to St. Louis, Mo., Wednesday sends this following message of farewell.

Dear Residents:

I sincerely feel that I have outlived my usefulness to this community and at the same time it is my intention to further my training. To us in the medical profession this is a heaven sent opportunity to study. Due to the shortage of physicians, we may be able to seek positions that may not be available in normal time.

Since I am a citizen of the United States, I am subject to the draft. For this reason, I wish to utilize whatever time I have available before being called to the colors to further my studies. When I was in Poston a short time ago, I was asked to remain there. As you may know, that is my community and I owe the people a great debt. Since I could not serve them prior to that short stay there, I have tried to do my best here in order to make up for that short-coming. At that time I told them first of my promise to return to Rohwer and, secondly, of my intention to leave camp to study. I further promised them that I shall be glad to return to Poston if I am to stay in camp indefinitely.

May I take this occasion to thank the Rohwer community for their kind tolerance and cooperation in the past. I hope after my studies are completed and if I am not in the army, I could serve you again.

3.. The time has come when it is highly important that a careful re-check on all block vacancies be made. Therefore, the actual status of each vacancy must be known in order to facilitate services of the Housing unit to the Center residents and the visitors.

The majority of the present vacancies should be made "vacant" at all times since so many changes being made now and the number will continue to increase as the time draws nearer for Rohwer to accommodate the new residents from Jerome.

All residents are asked to cooperate with the Block managers in keeping the vacancies clear for the smooth functioning of the future housing plans.


NISEI TRIUMPHS WITH ARM INJURY

As this risk is taken in battle, all evacuees will share the unختies and responsibilities of citizenship. In a democracy it is imperative that citizenship confer on all both equal responsibility and equal rights.

Therefore, we, the undersigned citizens of Pasadena and vicinity, declare it to be our conviction that full civil rights should be restored to the evacuees. One of these rights is that of returning to their west coast homes. We also believe that the same treatment should be accorded loyal Japanese aliens as loyal German aliens.

We propose to work openly for these objectives, as we believe the present contradiction in American democratic theory and practice in the treatment of this group should be resolved quickly. Our slogan is, "Justice delayed is Justice denied." We shall appreciate suggestions of a name befitting newly formed group.


