## INCOME TAX: REVENUE MAN TO AID RESIDENTS TOMORROW

Herron Peacock of the Internal Revenue Department will be at the Center tomorrow to take and assist in filing estimates of income tax for 1944.

A declaration must be made by every citizen or

resident of the United States who, 1--1. Single, or married but not living with spouse (whether or not head of a family), expects to receive in 1944-- (a) more than \$2,700 of wages subject to withholding; or (b) more than \$100 of income from all other sources, provided his total income is expected to amount to \$500 or more. 2. Married and living with spouse, expects to receive in 1944, either alone or together with his spouse-- (a) more than \$3,500 of wages subject to withholding; or (b) more than \$100 of income from all other sources, provided--their total combined income is expected to amount to \$1,200 or more; or his total separate income is expected to amount to more than \$624.

### Segregation!

The third segregation movement from Rohwer will take place next month, on May 9 and May 17. The first group of 500 will leave on May 9. The second group of approximately 200 segregationees will leave on May 17, according to the letter from Washington received yesterday by Project Director Ray D. Johnston.

### ARISTOCRACY OF THE SPIRIT

The "Japs" have shown that they can "take it."

Kicked out of California in a moment of great economic opportunity, trampled upon by jingoistic civic leaders, reviled by ignorant newspaper columnists and herded with strangers into humiliating stables and wooden tents with inadequate plumbing, no privacy, and a million other discomforts, the Japanese in this country have shown that they are "tops." The courage and good cheer with which the Japanese have accepted the injustices and hardships of the evacuation situation have led many impartial observers to exclaim admiringly that the Japanese view the situation as objectively and bitterly as they would a happening on the moon.

Having sacrificed material possessions, his lifelong neighborhood associations, his life ambitions, and his hard-earned successes to contribute to the tranquility of his Caucasian friends, the Nisei has earned the right of taking a slook, cynical, disillusioned "lost generation" attitude toward life and of assuming sad, sweet philosophies of futility and of wearing St. Bernard dog facial expressions. That he has refused to do so, that he has clung tenaciously and proudly to the mores and conventions that distinguish upright civilized man from his more primitive brother, the high spirit and light-heartedness with which he goes to fight and die for the country which he thinks as hypocritically "gypped" him and kicked him is a testimonial to the fortitude and unbreakability of the human spirit. The Nisei has unostentatiously "picked up the broken pieces and with worn-out tools" reorganized his life. He has formed in his mile-by-mile abodes in the most lonely scenery of the North American con-

**TULE LAKE'S SEGREES LEAVE HEARINGS BEING HELD**

Leave clearance hearings are being held at the Tule Lake Center for those who have not previously been denied leave clearance by the National Director of WRA and who now wish to establish their eligibility for relocation, according to a recent announcement made at the segregation center by Project Director Ray R. Best.

Any person at Tule Lake

who has not been denied leave clearance is eligible to request a hearing. Hearings will be held as rapidly as possible and the recommendations of the Hearing Board and Project Director will be forwarded to Washington for final action by the National Director. If leave clearance is granted, applicants will be transferred to a relocation center from which they will be eligible for indefinite leave.

Persons who had received leave clearance before segregation and who remained at Tule Lake or were transferred there for family or special reasons, and who now wish to leave the segregation center, will be permitted to make a new application for leave clearance. Such applicants will receive a supplemental hearing before the Hearing Board.

At the same time, it was pointed out that persons who have been denied leave clearance may appeal such decisions. A special Board of Appeals has been set up to hear such cases and to make recommendations to the Director. The final decision in each case will be made by the Director and transmitted to the applicants.
