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TULE LAKERS' INFORMATION REGISTRATION, FINGER-PRINTING STARTS HERE SOON

As has been previously announced, the first train of the third segregation movement will leave Rohwer Center on May 9 with 500 persons. The second train will leave on May 17 with 200 persons from this Center, 160 from Jerome, and 140 more will be picked up at the Granada center.

Welfare interviews will be held as soon as possible to determine the volunteer family members who are going to Tule Lake. The Medical Social Worker will also start interviewing before long to determine who will be on the Pullman list and if there are any who are physically unable to go on the above dates.

Instead of the induction process being carried out after the people arrive at Tule Lake, as has been formerly done, a group will come to this Center to do this before the people board the train. It is the understanding that this consists of registering, finger printing, and

etc., in compliance with regulations effective in Tule Lake and the Western Defense Command.

Representatives of the Housing Section at Tule Lake will arrive at this Center about May 1 so that those going to Tule Lake may be assigned to specific apartments before they leave the center. To prevent delay in receiving their property after the people arrive at Tule Lake, an effort is being made to have inspectors come to this Center before the trains leave to inspect baggage and freight for contraband and government property. If possible, an expert in packing and creating personal property will also come to this Center to furnish advice and information in this connection. A real effort will be made in this segregation movement to prevent as much inconvenience as possible to the people after they arrive at Tule Lake, said Project Director

Ray D. Johnston.

Families who applied for repatriation or expatriation on or after January 20 (the date Selective Service was re-instituted for evacuees) and in which there is a male member of draft age, will not go on either train. Details of their transfer to Tule Lake will be announced in the future.

Boys who have received a notice for pre-induction physical examinations for a date after May 17, or who have already passed their physical examinations but have not been inducted prior to May 17, will not be included in this movement. Other family members, if they are scheduled to go to Tule Lake, will be included, however.

Those who have failed to pass their physical examinations will accompany their families to Tule Lake if they otherwise intended to do so.

Special arrangements will be made for the later transfer to Tule Lake of those who have remained behind to take their pre-induction examinations but are rejected.

Information concerning the status of those in the Reserve Corps will be announced in the next issue of the OUTPOST.

CORRECT DETAILS FOR FRIDAY PRE-INDUCTION MEN RELEASED

There will be two changes in procedures to be followed by those who are called up for pre-induction physical examinations on Friday, April 21. Because of the large number of persons involved, Internal Security will not be able to come to each unit but will pick up those who are going, at the mess halls of their blocks at 3 a.m.

Breakfast will be served at the administrative personnel mess and not in Block 42, and the truck for McGehee will leave from the personnel mess. Those who received notices for examinations are requested to pick up their leave papers in advance at the Leave Office. The

truck will leave the personnel mess for McGehee at 4:15 a.m. and must be in McGehee at 5 a.m., said Reports Officer Austin Smith, Jr.

PROPERTY STORED AT HIGASHI HONGWANJI MUST BE REMOVED

Irving B. Conner, evacuee property officer at Ad. building 1, is again requesting that all Center residents who have property stored in the Higashi Hongwanji Temple, 118 North Matt Street, Los Angeles, Calif. to contact him, immediately, if they have not already done so.

Final plans are being made for the removal of properties from the temple under the order from a

federal court. It has been requested that the custodian the Rev. Kubose be present at the time that the property is removed to assist with the identification of the owners and to translate Japanese markings.

Approximately 75 owners have already been contacted at the Center, but Conner is anxious to determine whether there are others who have not yet talked with him about this matter.

IT SEEMS TO ME

Sometime in the future, ten or fifteen years hence, a few thousand Japanese scattered throughout the United States are going to come down with stomach trouble. Authorities will be baffled as to the cause.

Sombody will investigate. He will discover that virtually all the people so afflicted had once lived in Rohwer Relocation Center. Further investigation would follow. And then the interesting truth will out: These people, while living in the Center, ate their meals in large, community, mess halls. In these mess halls, they had lapsed into strange eating habits.

Instead of chewing their food, they would gulp it down in large mouthfuls. Scarcely anybody ever bothered to chew his food.

Exaggerated! Not at all, my friends!

I visited ten mess halls, watched about a thousand diners in action, and came up with the following facts: 1. Nine out of ten people bolt their meals down with the minimum of chewing; 2. Eight out of ten eat their meals in stone silence, without so much as a word of greeting to those sitting across from them or beside them; 3. Most of them act as if eating were a distasteful chore, instead of a consuming pleasure (no pun intended).

And talk about speed! On six occasions I pulled out my watch and timed the diners. The average person took only fifteen minutes to finish his meal. The fast ones were through in nine minutes flat. The slower ones took 18 minutes.

A few of us, including myself, averaged 24 minutes, which should be about par for the course. (My average time would have been longer, but on one occasion a grouchy-looking waitress, who probably suffers from chronic dyspepsia, kept shooting fierce glances at me, causing me to forego

Nearly a hundred guests, each individually invited by a relocatee friend, taxed the capacity of the banquet hall, reported Roger Clapp, New England area supervisor.

The event was spark-plugged by Chairman George Sakai (Tanfbran assembly center) and his Boston

Nisei committee. Among the entertainers was Toshio Kanada, formerly of Rohwer Center and now a Boston Madrigal Society member.

CLEVELAND RELOCATEES SATISFIED

In a recent poll of evacuees, who have relocated in Cleveland, Ohio, nearly 75% reported that they had experienced no racial discrimination since coming to the city, and 84% said that discrimination was much less in the Cleveland area than it had been in California. These percentages are based on a representative sampling of both Issei and Nisei living in the city and on a tabulation of replies contained in 75 questionnaires.

Asked whether they had experienced any racial discrimination in finding employment, 75% replied in the negative, and 53.2% also said that they had encountered no difficulty or racial prejudice in finding places to live.

45% of those replying to the questionnaire felt that their jobs were permanent and offered post-war security.

To find out how evacuees in Cleveland were entering into the life of the community and to what extent they were becoming

acquainted outside their own group, they were asked to indicate how many friends they had made with other racial groups since coming to the city. 29% claimed they had made better than 50 friends; 42% said they had made between 10 and 50 new acquaintances among other racial groups; 17% claimed less than 10 new friends and 12% said they had made no friends.

Asked how they had made such friends, the evacuees answered as follows in order of frequency of answer: (1) Church, school, YMCA and YWCA; (2) Co-workers at place of employment; (3) Business contacts; (4) Clubs. Suggestions as to how to increase friendships fall into three categories: More inter-racial social affairs and clubs; more Church, club and YM and YW activities; more athletic programs.

Most frequently given answer as to why more persons had not left or were not leaving relocation centers was fear of not being able to support their families. Other reasons included housing worries; fear of community non-acceptance; fear that the draft would take the wage earners and concern over language handicaps.

SOCIAL SECURITY BENEFITS FOR OUTGOING RESIDENTS

In cases of emergency, relocated evacuees are receiving aid through agencies of the Social Security Board according to E. J. Utz, acting director of WRA in Washington. Assistance has not been necessary except in a few cases but when it is needed former Center residents have found that the Social Security Board will give prompt aid in working out problems that arise.

Both aliens and citizens may receive such assistance and it is provided to relocated residents on the same basis as to other residents of the community.

Further information on the program may be obtained at the Welfare office or the Relocation office.

What gross shame! What a travesty on the fine art of eating! Old Epicurus must be spinning in his grave.

A mealtime is something to be enjoyed to the hilt. It is the only time some of us see our families. It is one of two things most looked-forward-to by the camppeople (other is payday). We should make the most of our mealtimes. We should chat with our neighbors, exchange pleasantries with our fellow diners, and enjoy our meals without undue haste.

Let's start a campaign right now to have, say, a half hour for each meal.

"More time at mealtime" would be a neat slogan. The cooperation of the mess hall crews should be enlisted in this public-spirited movement. The waitresses, for instance, could refrain from giving dirty glances to slow eaters.

They could take their cues from the kitchen crew in my block. There the waitresses smilingly wait till I have finished (I'm generally the last one). The dishwashers allow for my slowness. Even the porters patiently stand by with mops in hand, waiting till I have finished my meal.

A. Note From ACLU

Kiyoshi Okamoto, who was transferred from Heart Mountain Center to Tule Lake for his efforts in keeping eligibles from appearing for draft examinations, received the following letter from the American Civil Liberties Union. The Miss Endo referred to in the letter is Mitsuye Endo, who has filed suit in the Ninth Circuit Court in San Francisco over the constitutionality of the relocation program.

Dear Mr. Okamoto:

In reply to your letter of March 28th, I have these observations to make:

- (1) The men who have refused to accept military draft are within their rights, but they of course must take the consequences. They doubtless have a strong moral case, but no legal case at all.
- (2) Men who counsel others to resist military service are not within their rights, and must expect severe treatment, whatever justifications they feel.
- (3) There is no point at the moment in bringing another test case involving the leave regulations. Miss Endo's case raises the right of detention and the validity of the leave regulations, and is already before the Circuit Court of Appeals. It may possibly be that a criminal prosecution for violating the leave regulations might raise the issue in another form, but our lawyers doubt it.

(4) We intend to get a suitable case to test the methods of determining disloyalty and therefore the detention of a large number of American citizens without trial. It is possible that your case might offer the opportunity for such a test through application for a writ of habeas corpus, since we understand that you have been transferred to Tule Lake and were previously cleared as loyal. We are not, however, familiar enough with the facts to be sure of that.

You fellows certainly have a strong moral case, but it is not helped by refusing to comply with the requirements of the draft act. The only possible way such a small minority can assert its rights is through the orderly process of the courts in test cases brought under the most favorable circumstances.

We all appreciate your feeling, but we do not think that you can stand solely upon logic or justice if you are to get results.

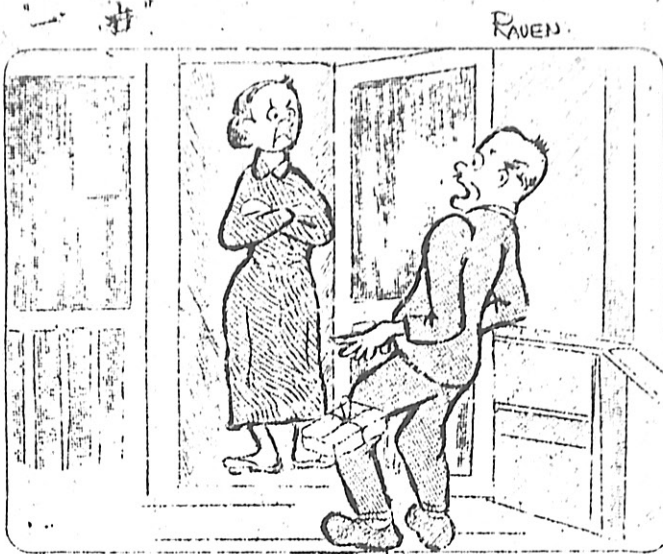
