

REGISTRATION FOR SEGREGES

Interviewing, finger printing, and photographing of all persons 11 years and 11 months of age and over who are going to Tule Lake will be started last of this week or the first of next week by an army processing team who will come here from Jerome at that time.

According to tentative plans, the interviewing will be done in 2 or 3 mess halls located in central points. The team will go from

one mess hall to the other.

All persons to be interviewed should have the following information prepared in advance: 1. Name - last name first, Japanese first name, American first name; 2. Address before evacuation. (Before December 1, 1941); 3. Relationship to head of family. (Head, Wife, Son, Daughter, etc.); 4. Date of Birth; 5. Country of Birth; 6. Alien Registration Number. (If any); 7. Former Family

Number; 8. Names of other members of this family group living in the United States. (Head of family only will answer this question.); 9. Names of other members of this family group living in Japan. (Head of family only will answer this question.); 10. Your maiden name if married woman, or other name if you have one. 11. Your height; 12. Your weight; 13. Identifying

Delay For Some TULE LAKES TO BE PAID Leave Clearance WAGES CLOTHING GRANTS Dockets: Myer

According to a letter recently received from Dillon S. Myer, WRA director, leave clearance dockets sent to the Washington office after April 15 will probably not be reviewed in sufficient time to notify the center of leave clearance denials until after April 30.

The Washington office will attempt to notify the center by April 30 of all approvals and disapprovals of leave clearance dockets submitted by April 15.

Special arrangements will be made for the transportation to Tule Lake of any those who receive their denials after the trains leave.

BLOCK LEADERS ELECTION HELD

In Rohwer's fourth election for block managers held last week, incomplete returns showed seven managers were newly elected.

Newly-elected heads are Masanaka Matsui, Block 1; Jimmie Tsutsumi (2); Mrs. Myrtle Hattori (5); Izumi Kango (7); Sunji Asawa (20); K. Ichijo (23); and Roy Kamidai (41).

Election results from remaining blocks will be reported as they come in.

Workers transferring to Tule Lake on the first train May 9 must be separated from the local payroll not later than May 4, 1944. April payroll for group on first train will be paid in cash May 3, 1944. April clothing allowances for group on first train will be paid in cash May 6. May payroll not to exceed the first 4 days will be paid on May 6. Pay plan for group moving on the second train will be announced later, reported F.R. Mangham.

All divisions now employing people who are to move on the first train are cautioned to turn in time reports immediately after the close of business on April 30 and May 4. The location at which Agent Cashiers will make payments will be announced later.

Unvaccinated Household Pets To Be Prohibited In Center

Effective May 1, it will be an offense for Rohwer residents to keep household pets, such as dogs, cats or chickens, in the Center or 300 yards of the Center boundary. Only exceptions will include licensed vaccinated animals and caged birds. All animals, wild or domestic, must be vaccinated, destroyed or removed from the Center. It may be contacted for disposal purposes.

Residents were notified Saturday of this new health ordinance passed by the Community council and approved by Project Director Ray D. Johnston and Project Attorney Jack Curtis.

It was announced that Dr. Hinson will be at the Police Station Friday morning to vaccinate dogs and cats. Vaccination price for dogs will be \$1.50.

A Statement by Sec'y of Interior

"In resisting the onslaughts of those who would have the War Relocation Authority imitate the savagaries of the ruling factions in the nations with which we are at war, I am sure that we have the support of virtually all Americans. I am particularly grateful to those groups and individuals on the West Coast who have been brave enough and Christian enough to speak out against the vindictive, blood-thirsty onslaughts of professional race mongers.

"All of the Japanese Americans who were evacuated from the West Coast have undergone and are undergoing a most intensive investigation. Those concerning whom there is any basis whatever for a suspicion of disloyalty have been sent to internment camps or are being segregated at Tule Lake. This segregation process is virtually complete, and the thousands of Japanese Americans who remain at the other centers are, by all reasonable tests, loyal American citizens or law-abiding aliens. They are entitled to be treated as such. Those who do not believe in according these people the rights and privileges to which they are entitled under our laws do not believe in the Constitution of the United States.

"All of us recognize that, in time of war, we are subject to orders and restraints which would be intolerable in time of peace. All of us--regardless of race or religion--are subject to the overriding demands of military necessity in time of war. No one who is loyal to the United States objects to this. But when military necessity does not require it, no one of us who is an American citizen or a loyal alien can be deprived of his rights under the law. I believe that the only justifiable reason for confinement of a citizen in a democratic nation is the

"The major emphasis in War Relocation Authority operations is now on restoring the people of all WRA centers except Tule Lake as rapidly as possible to private life. Over 20,000 people have already left the centers to make new homes and engage in new jobs in hundreds of

In a memorandum recently received from Dillon S. Myer, WRA director, it was pointed out that citizen evacuees are eligible for Reconstruction Finance Corporation loans to establish or re-establish small businesses. Loans can be secured for practically all types of businesses such as retail stores, dry cleaning plants, garages and etc. The Recon-

struction Finance Corporation required that the business be on a sound basis and there must be every indication that the loan will eventually be paid off. All loans are secured by a mortgage on the assets of the business and must be re-paid within 5 years. Re-payments will be made on a monthly basis. No loans will be made for the purchase of farms.

It is suggested that those interested in obtaining such loans should request the assistance of the WRA Field offices so that the relocation program and the status of the prospective borrower can be clearly explained to representatives of the Reconstruction Finance Corporation.

PROP NOTES

I. B. Conner, evacuee property officer, has received word that the Sacramento district began loading a car of evacuee property for Rohwer on Thursday. Conner stated that the car should arrive at Rohwer about May 10.

JEROME LIKES ROHWER

Some 2,983 Jerome center residents have stated their preferences for transfer to Rohwer Center, according to the Benson Tribune.

Tabulation of 6,532 "Family Preference Request for Center Transfer" blanks revealed the following first preferences: Rohwer, 2,983, (with accommodations of 2,000-2,500); Granada, 1,280 (400-600); Gila River, 1,062 (2,000-2,500); Heart Mountain, 357 (500-1,000); others, 774; no preferences, 4; relocation, 72.

All families of segregants will receive letters telling them when and where they will be interviewed, and these letters will also ask them to have available the information described above.
