

AUDITORIUM: 498 SEGREGEEES DEPART

BUILDING TO BE FINISHED SOON

Construction of the Auditorium on the high school field will be completely finished next month, and the grand opening will take place sometime in June, reported Tom Makino, architect. The Auditorium will be used as school auditorium and gymnasium and Center auditorium.

The 120' x 200'-sized building of wood frame with concrete foundation will have a seating capacity of 1500.

The size of the interior (hall) is 80' x 100' x 20' ceiling, with a stage of 40' x 20' x 20' ceiling. Besides the main hall, the building features a conference room, locker rooms, ticket rooms, showers and lavatories for men and women and dressing rooms.

HOUSING MOVES BY CENTER RESIDENTS NEAR DEADLINE

rashi, electrical department supervisor; Messrs. Tsunokawa, Kagawa, Shoda, Araya and Misu, carpenter foremen; and 120 workmen including carpenters, cement mixers, and electricians.

The Housing committee and the Housing unit are continuing to see people about moves necessary in order to prepare for residents coming from Jerome. Project Director Ray D. Johnston expects to receive the list of people transferring in the near future. Not more than 2500 transfers are expected.

The addition of 2500 people, after Tule Lake bound people leave, will bring Rohwer Center population to a maximum capacity of about 8200, as large a number of residents Rohwer has ever had.

"The changes necessary for some people are a real hardship but not as great a hardship as will be suffered by the Jerome people having to move. Advance planning and action will make it possible to do this job smoothly. The cooperation of every resident will help toward this end," reported the Housing committee.

Johnston Warns Drivers

Drivers were warned against speeding and reckless driving by Project Director Ray D. Johnston as follows:

There have been a large number of reports and complaints recently about speeding and reckless driving within the Center.

Please advise all members of the Internal Security Section again concerning the regulations for safe driving and instruct them to arrest (if necessary) each person found guilty of reckless driving or speeding, and to revoke their driving license. Such cases should then be promptly reported to E. V. Updegraff, who will dismiss them from work with prejudice and they will not be subject to re-employment, for any kind of work on the project within fifteen days.

It appears necessary to strictly enforce these measures, not only to prevent the abuse and destruction of government property but also to avoid serious accidents, or loss of human life.

Secretary Ickes Defends Nisei In Statement

(Continued from Wednesday)

I hold no belief for the Governor of New Jersey, the the Honorable Walter E. Edge, who was the first of this triumvirate to express his racial-tinged opinions. In talking to a group of farmers who has succeeded in driving five thoroughly investigated and law-abiding Japanese workers from a neighbor's farm, Governor Edge told the protesting group, "I guess I don't blame you." Prior to the Governor's statement, the farmer who had contemplated hiring the Japanese workers had received anonymous telephone calls, had been threatened with violence, and finally had had one of the buildings on his property destroyed by fire. If Governor Edge can condone this sort of lawlessness and violence in his State and still hold his head up in the company of democratic men, then to him the Constitution is nothing but a dust rag.

As I pointed out in a recent statement in San Francisco, the relocation of Japanese Americans to a large extent is a local problem. It is a problem of the people of California, Oregon, and Washington, where, unfortunately, a few prejudiced and vocal men have created a public clamor that has stirred unnecessary apprehension and bitterness in other parts of the Nation.

I have no hesitancy in saying that an overwhelming majority of the American public--firm believers in fair play and the Constitution--hold no animosity against these homeless and blameless victims of a wartime military decision. As an indication of this, even in the far West, I should like to call attention to an assembly of more than 500 girls from ten Arizona high schools who met at Rivers, Ariz., on April 15, with Japanese American school girls from the WRA Gila River, Ariz.,

A colorful and fluent writer, personality-man Matsueda first won well-deserved recognition and admiration among the Center newspaper fans through his column "Stormy Weather" which pulled in no punches. His sought-after articles were designated by the pen-sign of a pair of umbrellas. And when he wrote news stories, people read them; they had that entrancing and vivid Matsueda touch. Later, he took charge of editing the sports page for which he was well equipped with writing technique as well as game coverage judgment. Popularly known as an intelligent and witty scholar and an active athlete during his school career, Matsueda, who is formerly of San Mateo, Calif., was graduated from Rohwer high school in 1943.

"Professor" Hirofusa Okumura, brain trust of the press, was known more familiarly to the eager readers of the column "Floating By" as H₂O. A writer of inherent talent, his views of Center life were always presented appreciatively, based on sound judgment, thorough deduction and clear-out composition. 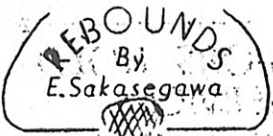

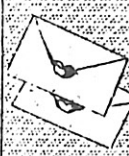

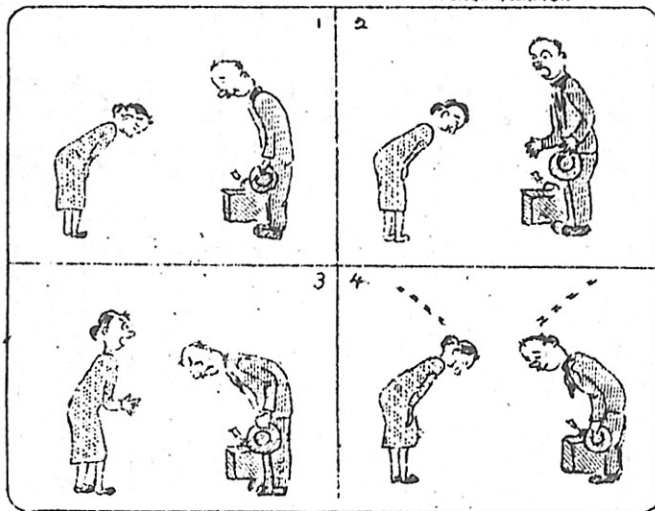
