ALL NISEI VOTERS RETAIN PRE-EVACUATION RESIDENCE

Regarding the present voting status of Japanese Americans, Cameron H. King, registrar of voters, San Francisco, Calif., sent the following letter to R. B. Cozzens, field director of the Pacific Coast region.

"At the request of H. J. Jepsen of your office, I am stating my understanding of the registration and election laws respecting citizens of Japanese ancestry who have been removed from their California residences to war relocation centers.

1. They are citizens. That has been definitely established by recent court decisions. Their Japanese ancestry is immaterial.

2. Their permanent residence is the place from which they were required to move by the Army Command as a defense precaution.

3. They have not lost that residence by reason of their removal, because that removal is for temporary purposes.

4. Whether adults or minors, the fact and the law of residence is the same. As for the minors, their residence at the time of removal was the residence of their parents and if they attain their majority while in the temporary residence of the relocation center, they still retain the right of claiming as their permanent residence the abode from which they, with their parents, were removed.

5. As citizens attaining their majority, they are entitled to exactly the same

from Little Rock on back to Rohwer it was the same. It may be worthwhile to mention a little topography of Arkansas. I have heard so much about the beautifulness of the Ozark mountains and I've seen it in movies and this time I have actually seen it myself and to me who has always enjoyed and lived near the mountains on the West Coast, nothing was more inviting when I saw these tree covered mountains in northwest Arkansas. I have begun to notice the change in scenery as I left Little Rock toward the northwest. The surroundings begin to appear hilly and in the distance many high mountains begin to appear. River and brooks added color to the scenery. Spring was rather late in this high altitude country and rather cold in the mornings and evenings. So I would like to mention that though we happen to be in the most isolated and uncolorful part of Arkansas, there are sceneries in this state which can equal to those we have seen in the Rockies or among the Coast Range.

During my stay at Fayetteville, I had the privilege of staying at the home of one of the professors of University of Arkansas and also at the home of the Presbyterian Minister. I was immediately made member of the family and the children began to call me Uncle Kaz. I have had the opportunity to meet and talk to at the Presbyterian Church college students and adults, high school and elementary school pupils. I have also met with the Ministerial Alliance of Fayetteville where one of the ministers moved that the Alliance send greetings to the ministers and people of Rohwer Relocation Center and that some day soon they may be relocated to enjoy the normal life again. 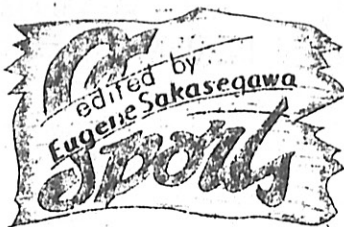

same rights as all other citizens - the law makes no discrimination against any citizen because of ancestry.

6. The right of citizens of California to register at their permanent residence, in spite of temporary removal, is quite clear. Also, the right to vote. Citizens of Japanese ancestry arriving of age while therefore, register and vote as "absent voters" from the residence from which they were removed, until they leave the relocation Centers for a new permanent residence.

7. I do not believe any such person can claim a permanent residence for registration and voting in a relocation center.
