SURVEY SHOWS INDUSTRIAL CUTBACKS NEGLIGIBLE

A survey of the seven principal cities of the Cleveland area or WRA indicates that industrial cutbacks affecting workers of Japanese ancestry have been negligible, Robert M. Cullum, area supervisor, announced today.

The cities checked were those where WRA offices are located, namely, Cleveland, Toledo, Cincinnati, Columbus, Buffalo, Detroit and Grand Rapids.

Relocation offices have reported that evacuees have not been affected by production cutbacks, although some have been affected by "industrial changeover" when they are transferred to other jobs in the same company.

The evacuees are handled on the basis of seniority equality with other employees. The last hired would be the first to be fired in the event of cutbacks and

Largest Group Of Seasonal Workers Reaches Naperville

Chicago, Ill., May 9--The largest group of seasonal workers ever recruited in the North Central area arrived in Naperville, Ill., this week. There were 50 men included in the group which was recruited at Rohwer relocation center. They will cut asparagus for a period of two months on large farms near Naperville. Transportation was provided by the War Food Administration which, with the Farm Extension Service and WRA, made all the arrangements for this job.

Board and room will be provided by the employees, and blankets, silverware, and other living necessities have been provided by a fourth Government agency. The asparagus job will last two months, then the seasonal workers can remain for work at de-tasseling corn.

STUDENT RELOCATION FINDS 2500 NISEI IN COLLEGES

In an interview with Thomas Bodine, field director of the Student Relocation Council, the following facts concerning the council was revealed.

The National Japanese American Student Relocation Council is a private agency, financed by certain foundations, the churches, and various related organizations. Its job is to help students of Japanese ancestry to go on with their education beyond high school. It has been busy for nearly two years, and can report that there are now about 2500 students of Japanese ancestry enrolled in 450 colleges, universities, and other institutions of higher education located in 46 different states.

tions of higher education located in 46 different states.

The administrative expense run to \$30,000 a year, and part of this fund comes from various philanthropic organizations and churches. For needy students who are not members of churches, the World Student Service Fund provides help. Since the council's inception in 1942, more than \$100,000 has been allocated from these sources to students who would have been able to meet their college expenses, if evacuation had not cut into their families' financial resources.

From the 450 campuses, the numerous students report warm acceptance and favorable environment. The students have won many honors, including presidency of student body and positions as various class officers. To name a few student body presidents, Kenji Okuda is the president of Oberlin College, Tom Hayashi of Bard, N.Y., Bill Marutan of South Dakota Wesleyan, and Naomi Nakano the Women's president of the University of Pennsylvania.

In closing, he stated that the council is a private agency, and to work through the council is purely voluntary, but experience has shown that it is usually more effective to make use of the council's services.

Fielding honor went to Nakata, Shelby centerfielder, who made two spectacular catch.

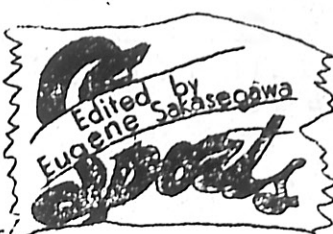
The invading team showed definite lack of practice although they displayed flashes of greatness at times. This team was organized only two weeks ago and proved to be a far cry from last year's championship team.
