YOUTH JOBS LIMITED
WRA Places Employment Rules
on All Residents 16 to 18

Stressing that employment will not be given to persons under 16 years, work regulations concerning all residents 16 to 18 were released in a WRA bulletin recently.

"Persons under 18 shall not be employed in any hazardous occupation. Maximum hours for a six-day week must not exceed 40. An examination by a physician to determine physical fitness will be required," the bulletin read.

The instructions also specified that no persons attending school shall be permitted to work during school hours except when the job is a part of the school vocational training program.

No compensation shall be given for work which is a part of the school vocational training program, but persons who attend school regularly and are employed outside of school hours by the WRA shall be paid in accordance with the type of work done.

Placement of part time workers will be under the direction of Opal A. Clark, vocational adviser.

JOHNSTON SUBMITS NEW FUEL PLAN;
SUFFICIENT FIREWOOD ASSURED

A plan to assure an adequate supply of fuel through the winter months was submitted by Project director Ray D. Johnston at a combined councilmen and block managers' meeting Wednesday.

Under the new plan, one community crew of lumberjacks will haul and distribute fuel equally to all the blocks instead of each block providing its own workers and collecting its own wood.

Lieutenant-to-be Sellers was transferred here from Jerome on Dec. 1. Sellers is the second Caucasian employee to be inducted.

In a telegram to Project director Ray D. Johnston, Dillon S. Myers, National WRA Director, stated that the Federal Government agency desires the services of persons, regardless of citizenship status, to transliterate the places and names occurring in Japanese maps into Romaji.

"Desirable qualifications, in addition to a thorough knowledge of Japanese characters and English language, are a college degree, college engineering, journalistic or professional background," the telegram stated.

"The work will extend over approximately six months with remuneration according to ability and speed, but will average \$200 monthly," the statement continued. "Employment will be in Cleveland, Chicago, Louisville, or some other midwestern city. Applicants who are accepted will be given indefinite

"This crew will not only maintain enough wood to keep residents warm, but will also build up a surplus supply of wood, in case of emergencies," Johnston explained.

As many workers as possible will be obtained through the employment office to supplement the present crew. All will be on payroll, said Johnston.

He stated that the distribution of fuel on a block basis resulted in confusion as some blocks were unable to secure sufficient wood, either be-

cause the people were elderly or were working in offices and did not have the time.

The new plan will go into effect as soon as the old schedule is finished.

SCHOOL BUSES

Among the thousand or so students attending the elementary and secondary schools, there are a number of tiny tots in the primaries and also a few physically handicapped. These children must walk in the rain through the slush and mud of the wintry days.

Most of them are not equipped with rubbers and consequently are susceptible to colds. In lieu of galoshes and raincoats which are not readily available for purchase, a system of transportation should be provided for them to and from the school grounds.

The trucks in the Center are insufficient for both wood hauling and farm preparation and though an adequate fuel supply is a pressing community problem, all of these trucks cannot be used for outside work in the rain.

Because the health of the school children is important to the future welfare of the community, some of these trucks should be utilized on rainy days as school busses.
