CENTER CLEAN-UP

UNFAVORABLE SANITARY CONDITIONS PREVAIL

Because of the unfavorable sanitary conditions prevailing throughout the Project, a Center-wide clean-up campaign will be held from tomorrow through June 7. Under the supervision of the Community council and the Block managers, the one-week drive will involve all available labor to eliminate unhealthful conditions.

"The danger from unsanitary conditions will increase within the next month because of the additional 2,000 persons coming in from Jerome, which will crowd the living quarters. With the utmost co-operation of all evacuees and Caucasian residents, every precaution will be taken immediately to lesson this danger," reported Chester Fujino, council chairman.

Lt. Shiel of the United States Public Health Services, in his most recent

investigation, found a number of malaria carrying mosquitoes in the Center.

According to the plans drawn up by the Community council, the Center will be divided into five districts. Residents will clean-up their blocks according to the following district schedule: tomorrow, district 1 (Blocks 1 to 7); Friday, district 2 (Blocks 8 to 14); Monday, district 3 (Blocks 15 to 24); Tuesday, district 4 (Blocks 25 to 32); Wednesday, district 5 (Blocks 33 to 41).

All block manpower will report for clean-up duties on the block clean-up day, in place of their assigned jobs. Exceptions will be key workers as those in the agricultural, hospital and mess sections. Agricultural workers will work only in their own block when the weather condition prevents them from going

to the farm. Mr. Fairly is in charge of the following area: Auditorium, south of the Fire station, Block 36, north of Block 38, Block 42, Administration buildings, warehouse, Block 31, and Junior high school field. Assisting Fairly will be the lumberjacks, when they are not working in their blocks.

The equipment committee is under the supervision of Messrs. S. Ito, K. Shiraiishi, Koizumi and J. Masaoka.

One truck will be provided every afternoon for the district that is cleaning-up. It will be used to do general work, such as distributing equipment, and picking up rubbish.

Project Director Ray D. Johnston, the Community council and the Block managers will determine the key workers and notify them.

If the weather condition is unfavorable on the day of the clean-up, the schedule will be advanced.

The following health regulations were given:

1. Take great care that rubbish pits contain nothing which cannot be burned. Orange peels, egg shells and empty cans and bottles are dangerous.

2. Do away with all small shacks and woodpiles. These shelters rats, fleas, flies and mosquitoes. Each block make a central woodpile.

3. Do not leave water standing in barrels, bottles, or in pools near the blocks.

4. Anyone who finds a pond of water containing mosquito larvae (wigglers) is asked to report to the hospital and give the location.

5. Clean-up empty units thoroughly.

6. Spray oil or lime under the barracks.

NEW CABLEGRAM RATE GIVEN FOR FAR EAST, EFFECTIVE NOW

Effective June 1, cablegrams may be sent to the Far East for a flat sum of six dollars, plus ten percent tax, making a total cost of \$6.60.

The cable may include ten words of text, excluding the names of the addressee and sender and other identifying data.

One non-emergency cablegram may be sent to any

individual in Japan or Japanese held territory during the year 1944; additional cablegrams may be sent only in emergencies.

Cablegrams may be sent to officially reported prisoners of war by the next of kin, to United States civilians and to nationals of countries other than the United States.

HOLLAND; AGRICULTURAL SPECIALIST, VISITS CAMP

Mr. Holland, WRA agricultural specialist for the Kansas City area, will arrive at the Center today. He will bring with him soil samples, pictures of farming operations and other detailed information on farming propositions which will be of unusual interest to farmers.

The Kansas City area is composed of Nebraska, Iowa, Kansas, Missouri and part of South Dakota. Holland is especially familiar with Nebraska and South Dakota.

Holland will be here for 10 days and can be reached at the Leave office in Block 42.

The Friends Hostel, located at 2150 Grand Avenue, is about four minutes ride on the street car from the downtown business district.

Des Moines has a population of 190,000 and is located in center of the nation's greatest food producing state. It is the railroad center for the state, is the insurance center of the west, is a publishing center and has many manufacturing plants. The public sentiment of Des Moines is good. There are many farm and industrial jobs available. There are openings for service trades and for skilled and professional jobs.

The housing situation is not bad, although modern homes are scarce.
