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JEROME MOVEMENT TO START

Drivers Will Get Licenses

Because many older licensed drivers are leaving the Center and are being replaced by younger boys who are ineligible for licenses according to both State and WRA restrictions, Internal Security has requested Division or Section heads to give written orders for the issuing of Drivers licenses in the future. A Drivers license will be issued only after the applicant can qualify.

All appointed personnel and evacuees are requested to turn their licenses at the IS Station when they sign out on indefinite leave or transfer, Bert D. Clayton, chief of Internal Security, reported yesterday.

JOHNSTON RELEASES BASIC POLICIES ON TRANSFER

With the date of movement set ahead one week, the Jerome evacuees will start moving into Rohwer June 6.

1. The Housing Unit of the Welfare Section is responsible for assignments of quarters.
2. The Housing Committee has worked out certain standards in order that

all our population (including those to come from Jerome) may be housed as fairly and as efficiently as possible. These standards must be adhered to.

3. All move among the present population which are necessary in order to meet the housing standards should be made this week and in no event later than Monday, June 5.

4. It is expected that 750 people will be transferred from Jerome during the first week and the movements will continue throughout the month until a total of 2500 have been move. Move ment out of Jerome will be made in successive order of Blocks, starting with Block 1. Assignment of quarters in this Center should, in general follow this same system. No special reservations or privileges can be granted. Everyone must be treated as fairly and as impartially as possible.

Because the movement has been advanced one week and because of delay in receiving from Jerome list of new residents, former plans concerning recognition of reservations for living quarters have been abandoned.

Project Director R. D. Johnston has announced in a memorandum to the block managers, the Housing committee and the Welfare section the preceding basic policies and principles governing the transfer

NISEI'S FUTURE DISCUSSED BY SECY. H. ICKES

"I wish I could offer you assurance that in a day or a week or a month or a year all discriminatory attitudes toward persons of Japanese descent in the United States will be eliminated, but I can not do that. I can assure you, however, of the continued efforts by me and by WRA to obtain recognition of the rights of American citizens regardless of ancestry." Thus stated Secretary of the Interior Harold L. Ickes in a recent letter to Frank Nishikawa, chairman of the Rohwer Town hall assembly.

Secretary Ickes' letter follows:

My dear Mr. Nishikawa:

I have received your letter of April 14 addressed to me and also the cable to the President transmitting earlier statements raising questions about the policy of the United States with regard to Japanese Americans.

I appreciate the objective manner in which you have approached the problems and your understanding of the fundamental principles of democracy. I think it must be recognized that there is room for an honest difference of opinion as to the extent of precautionary measures which a Nation must take in time of war to provide adequate internal security. As the war has progressed, unquestionably the situation which made responsible military officials decide that evacuation was a matter of military necessity has been altered; there is still a question in minds of some as to whether the situation has changed sufficiently to warrant a return to conditions as they existed before the war. I do not doubt that the great majority of the American citizens of Japanese descent are loyal to this, their native land, and I think it is possible to determine with a fair degree of accuracy those who are not loyal. How-

(Continued from Page 2) over, this opinion is not held by every one. Many officials responsible for prosecution of the war do not know Japanese Americans; and what a person does not know he is apt to mistrust.

I wish I could offer you assurance that in a day or a week or a month or a year all discriminatory attitudes toward persons of Japanese descent

in the United States will be eliminated, but I can not do that. I can assure you, however, of the continued efforts by me and by the War Relocation Authority to obtain recognition of the rights of American citizens regardless of ancestry. I would remind you, however, that your own actions have much to do with public acceptance, and your demonstrations of loyalty must be unanimous. Unjust though it may be, one act of disloyalty by one Japanese American causes the public to mistrust all Japanese Americans. In spite of this grim situation, there is genuine reason for optimism. Loyal Japanese Americans, as individuals and as a group, have many friends who are willing to work tirelessly for recognition of your rights as citizens. I am proud to count myself as one of them.
