## DENSON MOVE STARTS

Irving B. Conner, evacuee property officer, age 52, died from a heart attack Sunday night at 7 o'clock in the Center hospital.

Mr. Conner had been ill for more than a week and had been in the hospital since he suffered a previous attack. He is survived by his wife, who is here, and several children, most of whom are in California. He was a native of New York but came to the Center from the West Coast.

Interment will take place in California. Mr. Conner was a popular member of the administrative staff, and his loss will be deeply felt both by the appointed personnel and the Center residents.

### EDITOR OF JIHO TO VISIT DENVER

Shoichi Komuro, editor of the ROHWER JIHO, left this morning for Denver, Colo., on short-term leave. He is expected back in two weeks.

A veteran newspaper man, Editor Komuro was the publisher and editor of the Stockton Times prior to evacuation.

Initiating the general transfer movements from Jerome to Rohwer, 125 Jerome residents arrived at the Center yesterday. With the exception of few special cases, they were the first of 2,500 transferees who will come here before the Jerome center closes. The people were transported in trucks and most of them were housed in Blocks 1 to 8.

Another group of 125 will arrive today. Eighty hospital cases will come tomorrow and groups of 250 will be received Friday and Saturday. Others will arrive next week.

To welcome the Jerome transferees, a reception committee has been formed by the Community councilmen and block managers.

The newcomers will be greeted at the gates, served ice water, assisted with registration and aided to their new homes by the committee men.

### PAPER DRIVE: 5,110 LBS TAKEN IN OPENING WEEK

A collection of 5,110 pounds of waste paper was delivered to McGehee last Wednesday in the opening week of Rohwer Center's Paper salvage drive. The collection, conducted by the Boy Scouts, was made up of three-fourths magazines and books and one-fourth newspapers.

The Paper salvage drive, which started on May 29 with successful results through the cooperation of Center residents, Boy Scouts and the Drive committee, will continue every week. Residents are asked to save all waste paper and deliver it to the block offices on Tuesday mornings where Scouts will be on hand to prepare it for transportation.

### NISEI ARTISTS SOUGHT BY OWI

Two artists and two compositors for overseas work are being sought by the Office of War Information. Fast of the Washington WRA office reported in a teletype yesterday.

Compositors should have knowledge of printing and type-setting in Japanese. Artists should have knowledge of written Japanese and should be able to produce layouts and art work that are authentically Japanese in character. They might also be required to write in Japanese characters for reproduction by printing.

Salaries range from \$2600 to \$3200 plus 21 per cent overtime and liberal living allowance.

Anyone interested may apply at the Relocation division before the end of the month which is the deadline.


