

## TRANSFERS FROM JEROME RUSHED

With approximately 700 persons transferred from Jerome last week, some 1200-1500 will arrive on a speeded-up schedule before the original June 30 deadline.

Buses have been chartered carrying women and children. Trucks will transport the men, freight and baggage. Most of the transfers will be here by Saturday.

Remaining in Jerome will be another group of transferees and a post-convict unit to close Denson.

All transfers from Jerome, who have received orders to report at Lake Village for induction on June 19, are requested to contact Austin Smith, Jr., reports officer, to make final arrangements for transportation to Lake Village and to report their Rohwer addresses.

hall and they will be taken to Lake Village by car or truck which will be loaded at the Administrative mess, Smith reported yesterday.

The same procedure will be followed by those who are called from Rohwer for pre-induction examinations on June 19 and induction on June 20. They will be picked up at their mess halls at 3 a.m. The Lake Village group will leave the Center from the Administrative mess hall at 3:45 a.m.

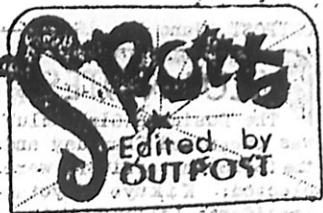


# CA NEGOTIATES FOR GAME

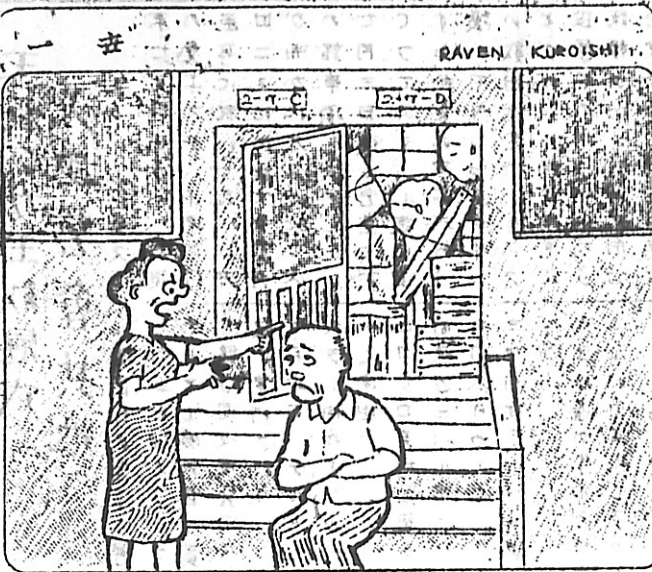
