NEW SUMMER SCHOOL

Second 6 Week Term to Begin

During the summer vacation, the Senior high school will offer a second six-week term from July 3 to August 11. One semester's credit may be obtained, William Boasoley, acting superintendent of education, announced.

Students who made "A" or "B" in a subject may take advanced credit in that course. Those who failed may remove the failure by repeating the subject. To take a new subject an approximate of a "B" average is required. Pupils without a "B" grade average who are irregular students or who urgently need more credit may also attend. These people may secure a summer school permit from the office of the Vocational adviser in 35-12-C.

Jerome transfers who will be in 10A should attend and take two subjects, since Rohwer high does not have a 10A section for this fall. All who are interested but who are not attending now should speak to Frances Amis who is substituting for Opal Albright in the office of the Vocational adviser.

CHICAGO STILL OPEN FOR RESETTLEMENT DANCE STEALS SUNDAY NIGHT

"There is absolutely no truth to rumors that Chicago has reached the "saturation" point as far as resettlement is concerned," Vernon R. Kennedy, relocation supervisor, reported in a teletype to Project Director Ray D. Johnston, recently.

"Japanese Americans in metropolitan Chicago represent less than one-tenth of one per cent of the population. Every indication is that several times this number of resettlers can find employment and ready community acceptance here and it is our observation that community and employer acceptance improves with every additional resettler arriving in this city. Housing is easier to find today than it was when the first resettler arrived here a year and a half ago.

"More and more war plants are opening their doors to Nisei and Issai daily in Chicago. Many hundreds of jobs are available through WRA offices and thousands through the cooperation of the U.S. Employment service. Chicago asks no preferential consideration as compared with other districts through the country, but wishes to emphasize that no one need go elsewhere because of any condition existing in this city which has made itself the home of 4,000 resettlers and extends a welcoming hand to all others who wish to come here," Kennedy said.

EDITORIAL: NISEI PUBLIC RELATIONS



In our modern times, the importance of favorable publicity has become noticeably greater in all fields of human endeavors. Big business constantly seeks to carry on public relations work in order to secure more trade; political and social organizations try to establish their reputation and identity through effective publicity while shopkeepers and salesmen promote goodwill through personal contacts.

However, it must not be thought that public relations work involves a detailed organization or a considerable amount of capital and labor. It can be effectively carried out by a heterogeneous group which tries to move toward a set goal, designed to aid the entire group.

As an example, let us take the case of the nisei who are now relocating in large numbers to many of the midwestern and eastern states. It is possible for us to carry on a self-imposed campaign in order to dispel from the minds of the American public the various myths and legends that have been instilled in their thoughts by the influence of such reactionary groups as the Native Sons of the Golden West, the Joint Immigration committee and the Dies inquiry board. If the problem is properly met, many of the ignorant ideas and preconceived notions that the average man on the street has acquired through the Hearst papers or through the rantings of politicians like Rankin of Mississippi, Thomas of New Jersey and L. Guardia of New York city will be somewhat removed.

Logically, the question that we must answer now is how can the nisei individually improve the status of the nisei in the field of public relations. We cannot employ the radio or the press to do this for us, nor do we have the closely-knit unit to plan such a program, so we find that we must base our actions on personal initiative.

Though some individual nisei have tried to carry on this public relations work through personal contacts, the majority of the relocated people have failed to cope with the problem, leaving the bulk of the task to a few. Most nisei are content to sit back and keep among themselves, never attempting to break through the walls of reserve that every person possesses. The inevitable result is that the public interprets the quiescent attitude of the Japanese Americans as a sign of self-confession on the part of the evacuees.

This assertion may seem far-fetched but if the occasional cases of housing evictions were to be fully investigated, it may be proven that their landlords and their neighbors have played a major role in their final disposition.

As individuals, we must first convince the American public of our sincerity. By conversing with fellow travelers on trains and on busses, by getting acquainted with our landlords and tenants, by making friends with workers in our places of employment and by meeting Americans of other racial extractions in small social gatherings, we could contribute in a small way toward the better understanding of the Japanese Americans by the public at large.

It is admitted that these suggestions are little things but if the nisei group should take those small hints to heart and consistently employ at all times, these little things would accomplish in the end the same result as something that is done on a larger scale.

One was the feeling of a wayward son returning home to the familiar environs that he had left behind some months ago. The feeling that I was to again see and talk to old and new friends who were still residing within the boundaries of the project was another heartfelt impression. There was also a certain amount of comfort and relief in seeing the victory gardens in bloom, the similar barracks stretching in regular order throughout the center grounds and the gravelled roads sprinkled generously with people that I have known and waste to see again.

TRANSFORMATION
Noticeable features were the radical changes that have affected the center during the past six months. Among the most important were the scarcity of young men and women within the blocks (it seemed that the few nisei staying on the project were all waiting for their Army physicals and inductions), the high school grades who populated the Ad building office personnel and the general lack of community activities (due undoubtedly to the relocation of the youngsters and the former active youth leaders).

Climatically, instead of the midwinter cold, the wood feuds, icy noses and F-coats, it appeared that the invasion of the sultry and torrid summer Arkansas weather had caused a lightningkrieg of the bothersome chiggers, mosquitoes and cockroaches (in contrast to the bedbugs and cockroaches of Chicago.)

OUTWARD BOUND
Now that I am again on the way to Chicago, I find the feeling of regret that I experienced when I relocated over seven months ago still persists--th
