

NEW CHECK-UP SYSTEM**Workers Check Out, In At Gates**

According to latest instructions from the Department of the Interior, effective July 1, all employees working outside the limits of the Center must follow a new checking in and out procedure.

Farm workers will be given Identification Cards which they will turn in at the Internal Security office when they leave the Center in exchange for a red button. After work when they pass into the Center they will turn in their buttons for their ID cards. There will be no exchange of cards and buttons during the noon passage.

Employees working off the project (truck drivers, etc.) will be given blue buttons in exchange for their Identification Cards.

To follow this new procedure two persons will be employed to check the workers in and out. One will work from 6 a.m. to 2 p.m.; the other from 2 p.m. to 10 p.m. The Internal security will handle the hours between 10 p.m. and 6 a.m. it was announced.

CENSUS TO BE TAKEN AGAIN

It was also announced that list of persons in each block, along with other necessary information, is now being prepared by the block managers. The actual census will consist primarily of checking off names on the list.

Any person failing to notify before June 30 must furnish his own transportation from the block to the main gate and be ready to leave there at 6 a.m.
