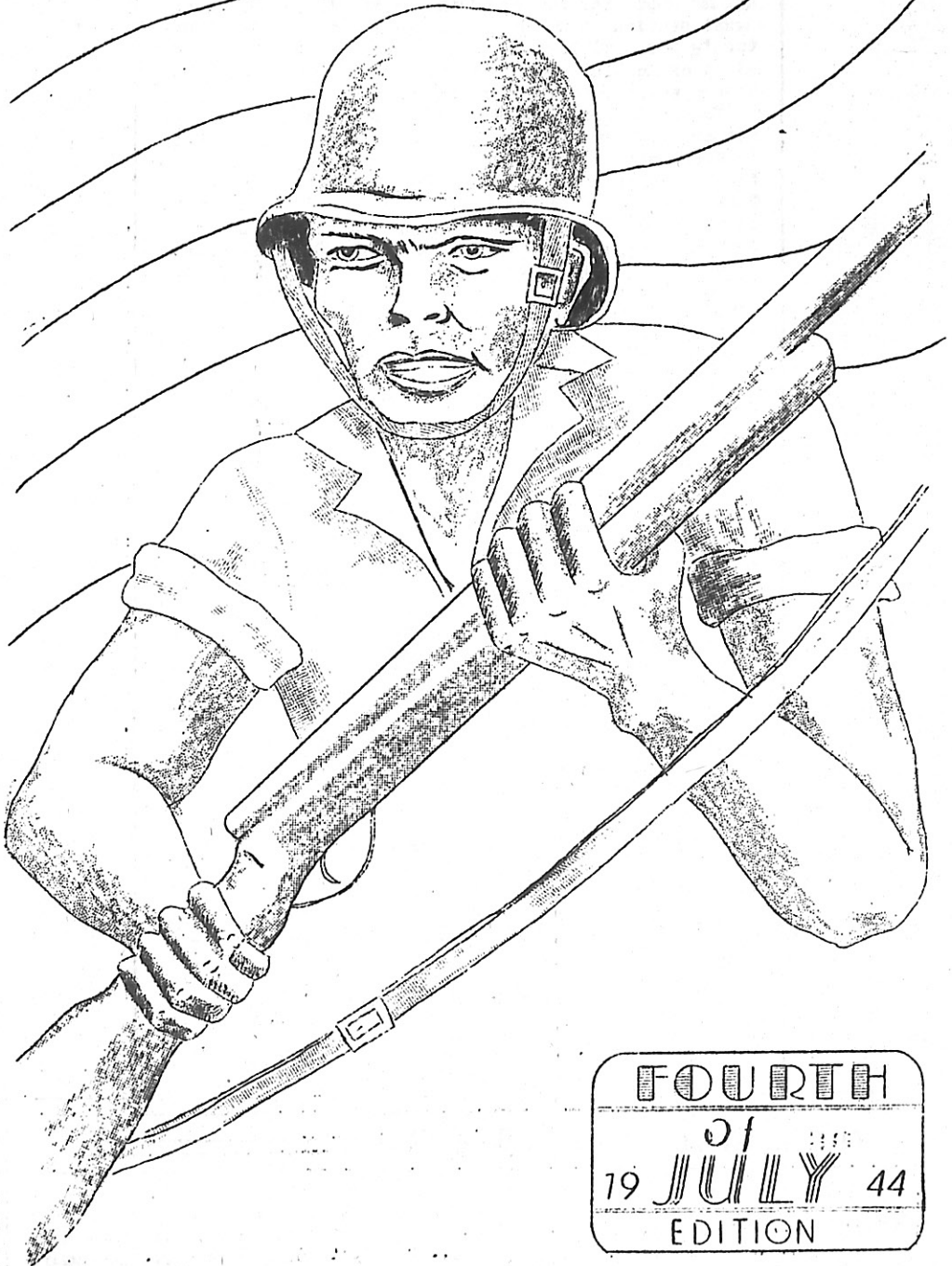

Editorial

A NEW BIRTH OF FREEDOM

"When in the course of human events, it becomes necessary for one people to dissolve the political bands which have connected them with another, and to assume among the Powers of the earth, the separate and equal station to which the Laws of Nature and of Nature's God entitle them, a decent respect to the opinions of mankind require that they should declare the causes which impel them to the separation.

"We hold these truths to be self-evident, that all men are created equal, that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable Rights, that among these are Life, Liberty, and the Pursuit of Happiness. That to secure these rights, Governments are instituted among Men, deriving their just powers from the consent of the governed, that whenever any Form of Government becomes destructive of these ends, it is the Right of the People to alter or to abolish it, and to establish a new Government, laying its foundation on such principles and organizing its powers on such form, as to them shall seem most likely to affect their safety and Happiness....."

With these simple words the Second Continental Congress began its historic Declaration of Independence against oppression and tyranny. This document that proclaimed that "These United colonies are, and of Right ought to be Free and Independent states" was unanimously adopted on July 4, 1776.

On July 4th of this year, 1944, the men of the "Free and Independent states" will be waging an even greater struggle against the evil forces of despotism for the same ideals which prompted the Second Continental Congress to revolt at the cost of violence and bloodshed, for the simple right of men to be free.

Many men have already given their lives for that ideal; many more will die before that ideal is reached.

With the soldiers lies the task of unquestionable victory over their enemy, but the fulfillment of their ideal--to make men free--lies ahead for all of us. As Lincoln stated in his pregnant and eloquent address at Gettysburg:

"It is for us the living, rather, to be dedicated here to the unfinished work which they who fought here have thus far so nobly advanced. It is rather for us to be here dedicated to the great task remaining before us--that from these honored dead we take increased devotion to that cause for which they gave the last full measure of devotion--that we here highly resolve, that these dead shall not have died in vain--that this nation, under God, shall have a new birth of freedom and that the government of the people, by the people, shall not perish from this earth."

VACATION PLAN SET

Compensatory Leave And Checking System Begin

Effective as of July 1, 1944, all evacuee employees of WRA will earn vacation leave at the rate of 1 day for each month of continuous employment. Vacation leave may be allowed to accumulate up to 12 working days before taking.

Compensatory leave for overtime worked will be allowed after July 1 only when the Division head has requested such overtime in advance in the form of a memorandum addressed to the project director. Such compensatory leave must be taken within 90 days after it is earned.

Beginning July 1, all employees of WRA will be checked at least twice each day by timekeeper, foremen or unit supervi-

sors. Any absences from work must be by the written permission of the worker's supervisor. Workers arriving late at their jobs, or leaving early, will be penalized by pay reductions. A full 8-hour day for week

DRAFT EVADERS GIVEN SENTENCE

Sixty-three Heart Mountain evacuees have been sentenced by United States Judge Blake Kennedy of Cheyenne, Wyo., to serve three years each in a Federal penitentiary for draft evasion.

The decision indicated that the defense plea about the clarification of Civil rights was without merit as an argument in this case.

LIBERAL DAY PERMIT ARRANGEMENT TO START

Beginning Monday, July 3, a daily maximum of 25 day passes not to exceed 24 hours will be issued upon request to evacuees who wish to leave the Center on personal business, it was announced Thursday.

The passes to be issued on a "first come first served" basis must be obtained in person from the clerk at the entrance to the project director's office. Besides the 25 passes each day, 25 reservations will be made for the next day. Reser-

ptions will not be made for more than 24 hours ahead.

It was stated that no transportation will be furnished other than on cars or trucks leaving the center on other official business. Passes to Little Rock will be limited to 5 every 24 hours because of transportation problems.

Only those who have leave clearance will be given day passes and parolee will be given passes only for trips within

(Continued from page 1) Doshia County. Violation of pass stipulations will be penalized by denial of any other passes to the violators.

"The liberalization of the day pass procedure is in accordance with instructions from Washington, but it is a tentative plan," stated Project Director Johnston in his announcement. "Continuation depends on maintenance of the proper public sentiment in nearby towns and cities."

Parcels for our armed forces overseas cannot be accepted for mailing, unless a request from the addresser is shown when the parcel is to be mailed.

No parcel shall exceed 5 lbs. in weight or a total of 36 inches in length and girth combined. Because of the great distance this mail must be transported and the handling and storage it must undergo, all articles must be packed in boxes of metal, wood, solid fiberwood, or strong double-faced corrugated fiberboard tied with strong twine. All fiberboard boxes should be securely wrapped in heavy paper.

A complete address should be shown on a sheet of paper inside the parcel in order to permit identification of the addressee in the event the outer wrapper becomes torn, mutilated or destroyed in transit.

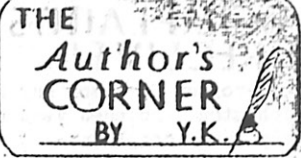
from India who isn't a Hindu. He is a Presbyterian, one of the few Presbyterians from India in captivity.

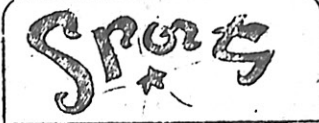
