SPANISH CONSUL SPIKES RUMOR

Chester Fujino, Community council chairman, received the following letter from Juan G. de Molina, Spanish consul, to answer the rumor that the Japanese government will not accept most of the Tule Lake segregates.

The letter dated Washington, June 19, 1944 follows in full:

"In reply to your letter of June 14th, relative to certain rumors regarding repatriation of internees from Tule Lake Segregation Center, please be informed that this Embassy has heard nothing in this respect and consequently there is no doubt, whatsoever, that such rumors are false."

"The Spanish Embassy would have been the first to know of any comment made by the Japanese Government in connection with "Repatriation" and the Spanish Embassy would have brought it immediately to the attention of the Spokesmen of the various camps, in order that the Japanese Government's point of view could be divulgated, in turn, to the Japanese internees."


