

# ARMY INSURANCE CONSUL REP. TO JAPANESE ALIENS VISIT CENTER MAY BE BENEFICIARY

Citizens of Japan may be named as beneficiaries of insurance purchased by members of the armed forces even though they have been evacuated to a relocation center or have been interned for the duration of the war. In the event of death of the insured, payment of the policy may be made direct to a beneficiary who is a Japanese alien living in this country without obtaining a special license from the Treasury Department if he is entitled to the bene-

fits of general license 68-A, according to Project Lawyer L. S. Forrest. With a few exceptions, Japanese aliens who have resided only in the continental United States at all times on and since June 17, 1940, who are entitled to the benefits of general license 68-A. Any non-citizen who is uncertain about his status will reference to the general license may obtain information on this subject from Forrest in A-9 building.

Isodoro de la Mora, Spanish consul representative from New Orleans, accompanied by Augusta Wagner of the State Department, will be here Friday and Saturday for a routine visit.

## INDUCTION MON. PHYSICAL TUES.

The next group of Center residents will leave for induction into the U.S. Army on July 17, announced the Reports Office. Unless plans change these men will go into the Enlisted Reserve Corps.

The usual procedure will be followed with the following changes: (1) Inductees must be ready to be picked up at their own mess halls by 4:45 a.m. (2) They will then breakfast at the personnel mess and will leave the Center at 5:30 a.m. (3) They will go to Little Rock on the train instead of by bus and (4) tickets will be furnished by Selective Service.

On the 18th another group will report at Little Rock for their pre-induction physicals. They will be picked up at 3:30 a.m. They go by bus as before.

## NEW FAMILIES TO TRANSFER

Families from Jerome living in barracks 7 and 8 in Block 39 will move to their permanent homes as soon as vacancies occur in other sections of the Center. They are among those who have first preference on vacancies. Changes are being made constantly to accommodate families of three who are still living in "split-end" units and other families who are overcrowded.

The established standards for proceeding to make moves are:

All moves must be officially approved by the Welfare Section Housing Counselor. Anyone desiring to move must come to the Housing Unit in the Welfare Office to make an application to move. When the application is approved, the Block Manager of the block in which that person or family resides, will notify them that the move is in order.

## DISLOYAL NISEIS DISFRANCHISED

Washington, D. C.--President Roosevelt yesterday signed legislation to withdraw citizenship of Japanese born in this country whose loyalty to the enemy marks them as Japanese nationals, announced the Rocky Shimpco.

Attorney General Francis Biddle said the law was needed to deal with the problem of 300 to 1,000 Japanese at Tulo Lake con-

ter who, he said, "assert their loyalty to the Emperor of Japan and their desire to renounce their United States citizenship and to be recognized as Japanese nationals."

By making it possible for this group to abandon American citizenship, Biddle told Congress, "they thereupon could be dealt with as enemy aliens under the applicable statutes."

# ONCE OVERS by BEAN TAKEDA

LAKESIDE, OHIO: I have just spent the most worthwhile week of my life. Here, in this little haven of rest and quiet, young people's Christian leaders from all over the country, Canada, Mexico, Haiti, even from far-off India, gathered for eight days to discuss some of the problems confronting the world today.

We talked of the suffering that is going on in the world today; of the starving peoples of India, China, Greece, Poland, and other countries of the world.

We talked of the thirteen million refugees in Europe who today are wandering aimlessly about, penniless, hungry, living from day to day, if they are lucky enough to do that.

We talked of the discrimination that exists in America today against the Negroes, the Jews, and the Japanese, and we mooted ways and means of wiping out such beliefs and practices.

## ACTION TAKEN...

But we didn't only talk. We also acted. We drew up definite proposals, recommendations, and means of action for sending much-needed food and clothing to the war-stripped peoples.

We pledged ourselves to think of our suffering brothers around the world and to increase our personal contribution to relief of human agony, even if it means lowering our own level of living.

And we dedicated ourselves to active effort against the discrimination and segregation of any group, Negro, white, Japanese, or Jew.

## DREAMERS, BUT...

Now who are those young folks who came out so strongly against such existing ills and problems; a bunch of super-idealistic, starry-eyed dreamers and talkers?

Think again, brother.
