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PRIVATE EMPLOYMENT RULING

Co-op To Handle Personal Labor

"In accordance with recent WRA Administrative Instructions, arrangements have been completed whereby all evacuee labor performed for WRA appointed staff members or other individuals within this Center shall be employed through the Rohwer Cooper-

ative Enterprises. These employees will be paid the usual WRA wage scale, which is paid by the cooperative to its employees, and the employer will pay the cooperative the prevailing wage rate in this area for such services," Project Director Ray D. Johnston announced.

This procedure applies to all of the relocation centers, in order that all evacuee labor within the Center shall be paid on the same basis and so that WRA appointed staff members or others shall not secure personal services at rates which are below the prevailing wage rates in that area.

Information secured through the U.S. Employment Office at McGohee and various individuals within the surrounding area discloses that prevailing wages for domestic services are practically the same as WRA wages plus clothing allowance, so the schedule of payments to the cooperative (other than the amount necessary to cover the actual overhead expense by the cooperative) is very much in line with the regular WRA wages.

"It is necessary that persons performing such personal service register with the WRA personnel office and in turn be assigned to work through the cooperative. I would like to point out that this is not a money-making venture of the cooperative, but is merely a matter of cooperation by that organization in carrying out the WRA administrative instructions governing this matter," Johnston said.

The financial committee led by Sumire Sahara set twenty-five cents as the membership fee, which will cover a period of at least six months. Since no dues will be collected, refreshments may be sold to cover optional and running expenses. Mrs. Josephine Ikeda is the advisor of this group.

A grand opening for club members is being prepared by the program committee chaired by Misa Asakawa and advised by Mas Wakai.

Ken Osaki, chairman of the housing committee, is working to obtain a permanent location for the canteen. Mrs. Grace Kurata advises this group.

The publicity committee headed by Nellie Utsumi is sponsoring a name contest open to all teen-agers. Details will be announced later.

The following basic rules were set up by the committee headed by Ruth Hiroso:

The Junior group, composed of 13 to 15 year-olds will have use of the canteen from 7 p.m. to 10:30, while the senior group, those from 16 to 19 years of age, will have it from 7 to 10 p.m. on week days, and from 7 to 11 on weekends for the summer.

Violators of Club rules will be suspended membership for a set length of time.

ONCE OVERS

CHARLESTON, W. Va.—Kanawha Valley, in which Charleston is nestled, is the leading soft coal-producing center in the country. The famous bituminous coal strikes of several months ago had their principal settings in the prolific, hillside mines of this area. And much of bushy-browed John L. Lewis' labor power stems from this region.

AMERICA'S RUHR

This is also one of the top chemical-producing centers in the world and, all in all, one of the world's richest valleys. In fact, Kanawha valley is often referred to as the Ruhr of the Americas. Here, on the banks of the soft-flowing Kanawha river, are located some of our vital war production plants.

PLANTS

Sprawled along here are Dupont's mighty works, National Carbide, Navy ordnance, Carnegie steel, and the government's tremendous new synthetic rubber plant. These plants all employ from seven to ten thousand workers. That represents a mighty purchasing power, and Charleston is the hub of it. Stores are doing a great business, and money is apparently as plentiful here as mosquitoes in Rother.

BLACK GOLD

The big reason, of course, for these large plants being located here is the coal. River boats chug up and down the waters all day, towing huge barges piled high with it, for the roaring plants. It's cheap transportation. The last coal strike, which all but tied up production in the east, didn't affect these companies in the least. People living in the surrounding hills never need to buy fuel. They merely go out into their front yard and dig up a bucketful or two.

Sigmund (Jack) Jakuchi, star pitcher for the American League's pace setting St. Louis Browns got his big-time baseball start in the Hawaiian Islands, playing for the Honolulu Braves and with the famous Asahis.

Jakuchi, in an interview by the St. Louis Sporting News, had this to say about the nisei whom he played within the Islands. "Some of these Hawaiian Japanese were really good guys; they were educated, in our schools and their thinking was American, and we had a lot of fun. Some of them now are in our armed forces, as are their younger brothers, and they are giving a good account of themselves."

The Brown's Polish hurler made two trips to Japan with the powerful Asahis before Pearl Harbor and his number one post-war wish is to make one more Pacific jaunt and take the mound in the gigantic Meiji stadium again with his old Honolulu nisei buddies.

Pulitzer Prize winner, Ernie Pyle, whose noted column appears in 310 newspapers, toured Japan in 1919 with University of Indiana's baseball team as an undergraduate publicity man. Catching on Illinois Tech's varsity nine this season is Rohwer's Johnny Hiramoto. Well known in the nisei diamond world, Hiramoto was the player-manager of the 1940 California state champion Lodi YMCA Templars.

Ted Ohashi, University of California Golden Bears' All-Coast basketball star, and who to this day still stands out as the greatest of the many nisei cage greasers developed, is on the staff of the St. Louis Downtown YMCA's as assistant Physical director. Before relocation, the lean Stocktonian was Rohwer's Juniper High's athletic head S.A. Yamasaki, veteran Alameda Tai us' baseball player and basketball coach of Rohwer's 1944 hoop wonders, the Yellow Ghosts is stationed at Camp Blanding, Florida.
