SPECIAL DIET CASES TO HAVE NUTRITION AIDS SERVICES

Better food service for the infants and those in the blocks who require special diets is the goal of the new class of nutrition aides learning to cook and serve prescribed food appetizingly.

Because the doctors and the hospital staff felt the past methods have been inadequate, the system of feeding these people is being reorganized. A nutrition aide is being assigned to each block as fast as workers can be found plus an extra nutrition

aide for each 4 blocks. The extra aide allows the regular aide to have a day off without disrupting service or the kitchen crew being called upon to do her work.

Classes in English are taught by Virginia Turner, center dietitian, classes in Japanese by Yoshiko Konzo, assistant dietitian.

If there is no nutrition aide in your block, you or your neighbor will be rendering a valuable service to the community by applying for this position.

OVERSEAS MAIL RULES

Christmas cards and parcels for members of the armed forces overseas must be mailed between Sept. 15 and Oct. 15, the earlier the better. Christmas greeting cards for soldiers overseas must be sent sealed and prepaid at the first-class rate.

addresses are required for Christmas parcels mailed only during this period. Each gift parcel should be endorsed "Christmas Parcel."

These Christmas parcels shall not exceed the present limits of 5 pounds in weight or 15 inches in length or 36 inches in and girth combined. Since members of the armed forces are amply provided with food and clothing, the public is urged not to include such matter. Only one Christmas parcel or package shall be accepted for mailing in any one week when sent by or on behalf of the same person or concern, to or for the same addressee.

It is absolutely necessary that all articles be packed in boxes of metal, wood, solid fiberboard reinforced with strong gummed-paper tape or tied with

strong twine, or be securely wrapped in heavy paper, as boxes without an outer wrapper often become crushed or spilt, allowing the contents to escape. Furthermore, as each parcel (Continued on page 3)

(Continued from page 1) is subject to censorship, delay in handling may be minimized by securing the covering of the parcel so as to permit ready inspection of the contents.

When combination packages are made up, including miscellaneous toilet articles, hard candies, soaps, etc., the contents should be tightly packed in order that the articles may not be loosened in transit, damaging the contents or the covering of the parcels. Christmas boxes should be enclosed in substantial containers. Hard candies, nuts, caramels (including those covered with chocolate), cookies, fruit cake, and chocolate bars, individually wrapped in waxed paper, should be enclosed in inner boxes of wood, metal, or cardboard. Soft candies, whether homemade or commercial, do not carry well. Sealed packages of candy, cigars, tobacco, and toilet articles in simplest mercantile form may be placed in parcels

without affecting the parcel-post classification of such packages.

Perishable matter will not be accepted, and the sending of fragile articles is discouraged.

Intoxicants, inflammable materials (including matches) of all kinds and lighter fluids, and poisons, or compositions which may kill or injure another, or damage the mails, are unallowable.

In typewriting or ink, the complete address should also be shown on a sheet of paper inside the parcel in order to permit identification of the addressee in the event the outer wrapper is damaged in transit. Parcels addressed to overseas Army personnel should show, in addition to the name and address of the sender, the name, rank, Army serial number, branch of service, organization, A.P.O. number of the address, and the post office through which the parcels are to be routed, C. Bricker, post office head, said.

LANCERS DOWNED BY BOMBARDIERS
