NO PLANS TO EVACUEE PROPERTY IN CLOSE CENTER CALIFORNIA ASSESSED

No plans are underway to close any relocation center until the West Coast exclusion ban is lifted, and even then a reasonable time will be provided for relocation before centers are closed," Dillon S. Myers, WRA national director, stated in the Information Digest of Aug. 1 received by the Rohwer Community Council yesterday.

BOY HIT BY DUMP TRUCK

Henry Yoshiro Taniguchi, five year old son of Mr. and Mrs. T. Taniguchi of 27-2-E, was fatally struck down by a dump truck last Friday afternoon at 4:30 between Blocks 19 and 20, in Rohwer's second truck-pedestrian fatality.

The dump truck, which was traveling north from south struck Henry, who either from excitement of play or intuition tried to cross the road without observing traffic and ran directly into the right dual rear wheel which passed over his head, according to the official accident report.

The child died soon after reaching the hospital.

The driver had failed to see the child and after feeling a bump stopped to investigate as he had seen nothing on the road. The evacuee driver was absolved of blame.

UN-MAILABLES

Upon a request from the War Department, candy and food stuffs in 8 oz. packages cannot be accepted for mailing, C. R. Bricker, post office superintendent reported.

This does not affect the sending of those things in the regular request from addressed parcels.

Many California counties are mailing out assessment blanks to give owners of personal property an opportunity to report its value for assessment. If these plans are not filled out by the owner, the California Assessor will fix the value, L. S. Forrest, project attorney, reported.

The blanks also have a space for the owner to claim Householders Exemption. No person should neglect to fill out this blank and send it in. There will be a penalty if it is not received in California by Aug. 31.

The Householders Exemption allowed is \$100 and the WRA Attorney in San Francisco advises that California will allow that exemption to evacuees even though they are absent from California. Thus, each person should be sure to claim the \$100 exemption and send in his assessment blank immediately.

OVERSEAS MAIL MEMO GIVEN TO RESIDENTS

Persons wishing to send Christmas cards and parcels to members of the armed forces overseas without requests from the addressees are reminded of the dates Sept. 15 to Oct. 15, the period during which Christmas cards sealed and prepaid at the first class rate and packages must be mailed.

KAWASAKI TO LEAVE FOR CHICAGO WED.

Karl Kawasaki, Internal Security captain, will leave for Chicago tonight. On the IS force since October, 1942, Kawasaki succeeded his brother in captaincy in July of last year. Kawasaki, who has been a competent worker, leaves behind him a honorable record.

Replacing Kawasaki will be George Yoshida, formerly Block 2 Manager.

WASHINGTON, D. C. This is a beautiful city: lovely parks, fine buildings, nice roads. But the weather is something else again. It's the sultriest, muggiest climate imaginable. Just as bad as Rohwer's, if not worse. Aside from being the nation's capital, the city is also known as the sinus capital of the country. Nearly everybody and his cousin Lulu has it. But it's a grand city just the same, and I frankly like the place.

The YMCA, where I'm staying, is only about three blocks from the White House on famed Pennsylvania Avenue. That makes the Roosevelts practically neighbors of mine... Haven't had much chance to glimpse the sights, but have seen the famous Potomac, the 555-foot Washington monument, and the Capitol, that glistening white dome looks like it belongs in the first row of a burlesque. Also saw the Internal Revenue building. That's where your money eventually winds up.

Tried to see three former L.A. girls who are government-girling here. Ex-Granadans Kay Fujikawa, Jaine Oi, and Mary Oi (no relation) like it here. at their large home, where they are staying with several other girls. I ran into six soldiers on a one-night visit from nearby Fort Meade in Maryland. The girls threw a grand feast for us, featuring (among other things) rice, takuan, and nori-nó-tsukudani.

Visited the national WRA offices next day. Director Dillon Myer was out but met M.M. Tozier, who succeeded John Baker as chief of the reports division when the latter joined the Marines. I had met Tozier nearly two years ago at Rohwer. He remembered me... Working in his department are Frank Cross and Charley Lynn, who was

NISEI GIRLS IN WAR JOBS

Cleveland, O., Aug. 16—A job offer in a war plant making parts for rocket ships and bombers has just opened for a large number of Nisei girls in Cleveland.

Inexperienced girls will be taught drilling, deburring, assembling, packing, and inspecting operations starting at 70¢ an hour, 75¢ after 30 days, and then 80¢ after 30 days. After these increases, further pay raises are possible based on merit. Time and a half is paid after 40 hours and a 58-hour week can be worked although it can be adjusted downward if the girls do not wish to work that many hours.

Working conditions in the light and airy factory are good. Excellent food is served by the company operated cafeteria at reasonable prices, and the woman in charge of the personnel department will assist girls in housing and transportation problems.

At present five Nisei girls are already employed at the company.
