FRIENDS AID NISEI

Return To West Coast Pledged

Aid to Americans of Japanese ancestry in returning to their former homes on the Pacific coast was pledged today by the Pacific Coast Association of Friends, representing Quaker groups in California, Oregon, Washington, and British Columbia. The Association recently closed its annual session at Palo Alto.

"Our task is helping Americans of Japanese ancestry to return to their homes on the Pacific coast," the Friends declared. Approval was given for any plan that makes possible a just and fair relocation of these people in their former homes or at some other place of their choice.

The Friends also went on record as favoring the establishment of some form of world order in which the United States would take its share of responsibility, than by military domination. It was proposed that school system develop plans to make it possible for each student to devote one year to some form of constructive service of civic or national significance.

Peter Tennant, a member of the Friends Ambulance Unit serving in China, reported to the conference that ninety per cent of the medicine and drugs reaching China are transported by the 109 British, Canadian and American men of this unit.

Miss Dohi's pre-evacuation home was in San Luis Obispo, Cal., and she was attending the University of California prior to induction into Poston. Relocating from Poston in Oct. 1942, she was the second nisei student to enroll in Swarthmore College, arriving about two weeks later. She graduated in June 1944 after taking a major in psychology.

After graduation, Miss Dohi was employed at the school until she offered her services as a spokesman for the Student Relocation Council in Philadelphia.

She will remain in this Center until Sept. 5, after which she will journey to Poston to talk to students there, and interested persons may contact her at 35-12-C, high school office.

T.CAMPBELL ON ROUTINE VISIT

Thomas Campbell Refrigeration engineer from the Washington WRA office arrived in this Center Monday morning on a routine visit.



Bridgeton, N. J.--I am visiting the much-publicized Seabrook Farms, which are actually located five miles from the city of Bridgeton. Philadelphia is 42 miles to the north, while a similar distance away to the east is Atlantic City, noted for its famous boardwalks and Miss America bathing beauty contests.

The Seabrook Farms--which might be more accurately referred to by the name of its subsidiary, Dearfield Packing Corporation--cover thousands of acres of farmland, apple orchards, quick-freezing units, cold storage houses, and packing and shipping plants. Here are grown, frozen, and packed about 80% of the popular Birds Eye brand frosted food products, much of which is shipped to our armed forces overseas.

There are also six large greenhouses here, where roses and other flowers are being grown. A total of 6000 workers are employed here. Of that number, about 300 are Japanese Americans, including a few girls and several men. The Japanese live in the dormitories and apartments located a short distance away from the plants. These living quarters were constructed and are being maintained by the Federal Housing project.

I inspected the living quarters thoroughly and found them very livable, much better than I had anticipated. The dormitories have single and double-size rooms, all equipped with new furniture, comfortable, and satisfying. The showers and washrooms are kept fairly clean. Each dormitory has a central lobby or reading room. Maids clean the rooms and change linens once a week.

All in all, the dormitories seemed very satisfactory. Chief complaint of the dorm residents, however,

(Continued from page 2) ever, is that the hot water tank is apparently too small. After about 20 people have taken showers, there is no more hot water. Late bathers have to take cold water showers. Which might be all right now when the weather is warm, but a bit uncomfortable when the mercury drops to around freezing in the winter months.

I liked the apartments much better. Each apartment has a roomy kitchen, a living room, a bathroom (equipped with a shower but no tub), and one, two, or three bedrooms, depending on the size of the family to be accommodated. The furniture is the same as those in the dormitories. Made of wood, they are all new and well-constructed. The beds are comfortable, so are the chairs.

A drawback here is that the floors are cement, which might prove rather chilly in the winter. Good linoleum overlaid on the cement would help immensely. Elec-

The cafeteria, located near the dormitories, is a large, roomy affair. The food is fairly palatable, and the prices are reasonable. But the cleanliness of the eating utensils leave much to be desired. The presence of swarms of flies prompted one wag to remark he would prefer to
