REVISE REGULATION SHIPMENT OF EVA. PROPERTY

A recent Washington revision in regulations provides that commercial equipment belonging to evacuees and weighing not more than 500 pounds may be shipped by express rather than freight.

The 500 pounds of equipment provided for by this change in ruling will be included in the maximum 5000 pounds of commercial property shipped for an evacuee by the government upon justification of need.

The occasional need for faster delivery of tools, equipment, or fixtures of an evacuee's trade or business than is possible under freight shipments, and the nature of some equipment has, according to Project Property Officer Elmer F. Owen, necessitated a change in regulations governing free Government shipment of evacuee commercial property. In the future 500 pounds of such property may be sent express under the following conditions: (1) If the items may be sent safely by freight, or (2) if the Project Director or Relocation Officer certifies that express shipment is necessary in the interest of the relocation program. This should prove of value to evacuees.

NEW YORK - After five days here, I'm perfectly willing to admit that New York is a pretty big city. I had always imagined myself a big city slicker, having been born in Los Angeles and lived there all my life. But I must have looked like the greenest of country bumpkins, as I walked down Fifth avenue and gaped at the tall buildings on my first day here. I had a stiff neck the next morning.

The city is a maze of skyscrapers, crowded streets, hotdog and orange drink stands, and mad-dashing taxicabs. I've never seen such wild-driving cabdrivers in all my life. Every one looks like an accident going somewhere to happen. The ride I had the first day eclipsed the wild one I took down Michigan avenue in Chicago last year. The drivers keep the pedestrians hopping.

Jaywalking is a popular sport here. Nobody pays any attention to the signals. New Yorkers can always tell newcomers, because they always wait to cross on the green light, which practice the natives look upon with something akin to contempt and scorn. New Yorkers are the fanciest car dodgers I have ever seen. They have to be, in order to live to a ripe old age.

I didn't have much trouble getting a room here. I couldn't make up my mind whether to go to the Ambassador, Ritz-Carlton, Lexington, Park Central, New Yorker, or the Waldorf-Astoria. But I finally decided upon the William Sloane House YMCA, because of its extremely convenient central location. Of course, the matter of price probably had something to do with my choice, I admit.

The Empire State building is certainly some baby. It's so high that, unless you stand a block away, you can't see the (Continued on page 3)

(Continued from page 2) top. The structure is a mere 102 stories and stands 1250 feet high. Its express elevators carry people up and down at the speed of a thousand feet a minute. I rode from the 45th floor to the bottom in 28 seconds flat. That ride is so smooth that you hardly feel any sensation, except the pressure on the eardrums.

The views from the WRA offices on the 53rd, and 55th floors are really something. You have to see the thing yourself to know what it is. You can't describe it. It's such a grand sight that you gasp when you first see it. It's an odd feeling you get, when you look down from such dizzy heights. You have half a notion to jump off. I asked others about it, and I felt better when I learned that the strange urge was not uncommon.

With most people, the urge is not great enough to cause them to actually jump. A seaman, a few weeks ago, couldn't resist the strange notion and jumped from the 68th
