

LEAVES ADD UP TO 400 A WEEK

More than 400 Japanese Americans leave relocation centers on indefinite leave each week to widely scattered places, Dillon S. Myer, Director of the WRA, reported to Acting Secretary of the Interior Abe Fortas.

The figure for the four-week period ending August 26 was 1,717, bringing the total number of relocated persons to 30,572. About 60,100 evacuees remain in the eight relocation centers, mostly elderly persons and young children.

"Approximately three-fourths of the August total left the centers in response to many community invitations. The remainder were those who left to join family members already relocated and those who left to accept specific job offers," said Myer.

In addition to the 30,572 persons permanently relocated, 5,233 are outside the centers on seasonal leave, working in activities such as canning, beet thinning and harvesting.

The number of indefinite leaves granted during the August period from each of the centers follows: Central Utah (Utah) 150; Colorado River (Ariz.) 325; Gila River (Ariz.) 298; Granada (Colo.) 200; Heart Mountain (Wyo.) 180; Manzanar (Calif.) 70; Minidoka (Idaho) 155; Rohwer, Ark.) 359.

Oversea Parcels

Residents with friends or relatives overseas should remember that Christmas cards or parcels for such men must be mailed between Sept. 15 and Oct. 15.

Each gift parcel should be endorsed "Christmas Parcel".

These Christmas parcels shall not exceed 5 pounds in weight or 15 inches in length or 36 inches in length and girth combined. Only one Christmas parcel or package shall be accepted for mailing in any one week when sent by or on behalf of the same person or concern to or for the same addressee.

ONCE OVERS by Boon Takeda

NEW YORK - Before the war with Japan, there were 1200 issei and 500 nisei living in New York. Now that number has been almost doubled with the influx of 1934 evacuees who have resettled in the city and immediate environs. The relocation program here has been stepped up considerably in recent months. Whereas a year ago the mention of New York aroused little interest among prospective relocators, the city is now one of the bright spots on the resettlement map.

New York is not an industrial city in the sense that Cleveland, Detroit, or Philadelphia is. Neither does it have the wide diversity of jobs that Chicago has. But for people with certain skills or talents, this city is hard to beat. Artists, seamstresses, fashion designers, radio technicians, architects, and other "specialty" people are drawing good pay here. Most of the unskilled and semi-skilled are not.

While in Cleveland, I had been told by many people that the pay for secretaries, stenographers, and typists in the New York area was far lower than that for corresponding jobs in Chicago, Cleveland, Detroit, and other midwest cities. I inquired about that at the local WRA offices, and Price Stealing, head of the New York district office, said the information was incorrect.

He called in Gordon Berryman, in-charge of office placement, to prove his point. Berryman claimed that the average pay for stenographers a little over \$35, which is certainly no hay as stenog jobs go. He added that many of the girls were drawing forty bucks and upwards, which, if correct, is terrific pay for typewriter messengers. However, I talked to 12 girls who are working as stenogs, and their average pay was \$27. Which may, or may not, prove it. (Continued on Page 3)

Housing seems to be a problem here as elsewhere. Most of the nice sort to be living in upper Manhattan, in the area between Central Park and Columbia U. Most of them are residing in very livable apartments, certainly much better than the nice abodes in Chicago. It is only fair to mention, though, that some of the nice nice apartments are inferior to Rohwer's bar-ack units.

Four months ago, the local Japanese American

Organizations formed a Council to coordinate the resettlement work in the New York area. Known as the Resettlement Council of the Japanese American Organizations in New York City, the body is chaired by Minoru Yamasaki, local architect, and its executive secretary is Masumi Toyotome, senior student at the Union Theological Seminary.

The Council is composed of representatives from the following eight organizations: Arts Council of Japanese Americans for Democracy, JAOL (N.Y. chap-

ter), Japanese American Committee for Democracy, New York Buddhist church, Japanese Christian association, Japanese Christian institute, Japanese Methodist church, and the Japanese American Young People's Christian Federation of New York.

The body seeks to advise and cooperate with the WRA in promoting relocation and to coordinate the work of the various Japanese American organizations into one united, activated program. Harold Fistero, New York area WRA super-

taught us that personal gain, glory and power should be subordinated to mutual cooperation and that getting the job done is the main thing, now who does the job, then I say we are growing up and have profited by our past experiences. If the evacuation has not done that, then I wonder what it will take to pound that into our stubborn heads.
