SPECIAL SERVICE ON SAT. TO HONOR CENTER'S SOLDIER DEAD

WAR VET WITH SILVER STAR FURLONGS HERE

Ball, courteous T/5 Shigeru Inouye, who was seriously wounded in Italy during the Cassino engagement, visited his sister, Mrs. A. Umeda of 12-4-E, last week when on furlough from the General Hospital in Clinton, Iowa.

T/5 Inouye, who went overseas from Camp Shelby with the Medical Detachment of the famous 100th Battalion, smilingly declined to relate his experiences at the front lines for which he was awarded the Purple Heart, the Silver Star, an award for gallantry in action, and the Combat Infantry Badge, among others. He returned to the United States last April, following a two month hospitalization in Italy.

T/5 Inouye left Friday for Clinton where he will undergo further treatment on his wounds, but not until he had spoken briefly at the Wednesday USO meeting to let the residents, especially parents, of Rohwer know how much the boys in uniform appreciated the services rendered by the organization.

His home is in Honolulu, Hawaii. Mrs. Umeda was residing in Los Angeles, Cal., just before evacuation.

T/Sgt. Ted T. Tanouye, son of Mr. and Mrs. Mikuma Tanouye of 16-1-F, succumbed to wounds received while serving in Italy.

A telegram came last Friday notifying his parents of his death on Sept. 6. Transferees from Jerome, the Tanouyes were formerly truck farmers in Torrance, Calif.

LUMBERJACKING IN SWING AGAIN

Divided into three sections, Center male power began their annual lumberjacking expeditions.

Blocks 29, 17, 16, 1, 2, 15, 3, 14, 4, 13 and 5 in the first group are headed by Nakayama and Mogi; group 2 including Blks 12, 11, 6, 7, 8, 9, 10, 23, 24, 25, and 26 by Izumi and Horiguchi; group 3--19, 20, 27, 28, 32, 33, 40, 41, 38, 34, and 39 by Ito and Miyake. Ogawa will be in charge of the mechanics, and Takemoto, powersew. Each group is expected to go out two days a week. If rain interferes with the schedule, workers will be notified of change. Block managers will act as time-keepers for their own blocks.

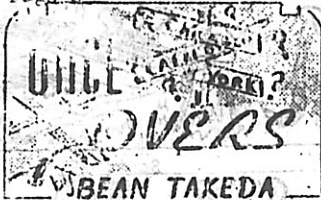
Unless holding key positions or specially excused by the Project Director any worker who does not go lumberjacking will have his pay deducted for that period.

My friends in the Center are quite elated over the prospects for returning to the West Coast soon. Which is quite natural. I was too, at one time. I would still be, if it weren't for two or three things that have to be seriously considered.

Now, I am not a pessimist and have never pretended to be. But I think that there are some cold, hard facts that we should think about before we get too excited over the good news.

First, we must imagine the tremendous change that has been wrought on the coast since we were there last. It is not the California that we knew before the evacuation.

About three million people have moved to the coast from the inland states since the beginning of the war. Nearly half that number are in the Los Angeles area.

For the first time in their lives, most of these newcomers are making good money, have a decent place to live, and enjoying the things that money can buy. They are enjoying the mild weather, too, which they find is very conducive to pleasant living.

When the war is over, it is a safe bet that most of these people will remain right where they are. They will have no desire to return to their inland or southern homes.

As a result of this tremendous population movement to the West Coast, the housing situation there is tighter than a two-bit nickel. Outside of the few who own their own homes and farms, most of the Nisei and Issei have no place to which they can return.

They will find most of their old Caucasian friends or neighbors gone. Familiar faces will be few and far between. Many will have moved to different parts of the city or to other cities. Their young (Continued on page 3)

Since a considerable number of both Issei and Nisei men and women work at Shoreland, many of the children in the hotel-nursery are Japanese Americans and it is expected that additional resettlers will seek employment with the hotel.

It will be entirely different California, or Oregon, or Washington to which the evacuees will return. In the face of such a tremendous change, will there be a place for the Nisei and Issei?

Please do not misunderstand me. I am not saying that the evacuees should not return to the West Coast. I sincerely think that a certain number of us should go back. A certain number, I said. Most of us should not, if for no other reason than that there will be no room for us.

I am not a pessimist, as I've mentioned before. But I do think that we

should think about the problem in the light of cold, sobering facts before making any decisions.

We have suffered enough heartaches, frustrations, and disappointments. We don't want to experience any more of them, if we can help it.

Deep down in my heart, I, too, have a soft spot for my native California. I have a strong sentimental attachment to my home. I want to see my Caucasian friends again and experience their warm friendship.

But I am going to do a lot of thinking on the subject, before I make any decision that will have a decisive influence on my future life.



RELEASE RULES FOR FOOTBALL

Eight runs were brought in by the Goombas in the second inning, 1 being made in the first and 4 more added in the 3rd.

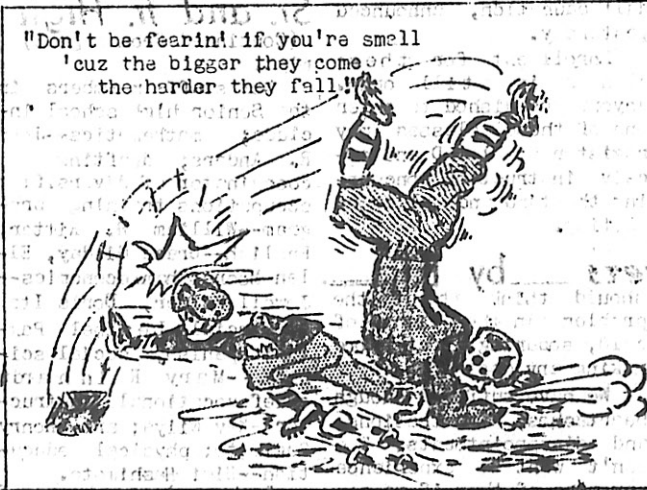
Pitcher Toshiyuki of the Goombas yielded only one hit to the Double C's.


